

BACKSTAGE AT THE PCSA EXTRAVAGANZA IX Al Stewart: When Bill Melton Speaks -- I Listen!

We had our boards for the PCSA Extravaganza IX stored at the Showboat. When we set them up, they were all convexed, high center. We split two boards trying to raise the rails. Bill Melton came in and said, "Al, the same thing happened to two boards I put in. I took two boards up and exchanged them and, coming back, they got wet in a rain storm. The next day, they were better than the ones I took up."

When Bill tells me something, I listen. We turned one board upside down and put towels on it and wet them. Twelve hours later, the rails came up. I got under the other one, wet it with a spray bottle about 4 or 5 times in about 6 hours. The rails came up and they were put back in service.

If I had known this in time and wet all of the boards, they would have shot good. If you have poured boards, don't laugh like some people did when they saw the wet towels. Just wet the bottom and step back and let them move.

We missed seeing all of you who participated this year. Our sincere appreciation to Paul Weber for adding our reporting/photo responsibilities to his own heavy ones at this event. Our biggest disappointment was that we were bringing our daughter, Teri, with us, and she was looking forward to that opportunity as much as we were. The outpouring of sympathy from The World of Shuffleboard to her (and to us) for the death of her husband just before Christmas was awesome and we thank you from the bottom of our hearts. We've said it before and we'll keep on saying it: you are very special people!

We don't plan it that way, but as we're putting together each issue, a "theme" seems to surface. This month, it's the involvement of new people in tournaments and new blood for our chosen sport. Check Dick Gorman's report of the recent tournament at the Rendezvous Inn, Maryland: "18 of the 50 (participants) were first-time tournament competitors" and many of those ended up in the winner's circle. And Annie Sloger's report of the women's event in Nebraska: "Many of the women who entered had never played in a tournament before, so some of the experienced players took the beginners under their wings...."

Those kinds of reports herald good news for the future of table shuffleboard and we salute all those who encourage the involvement of new people in tournaments and especially those who take beginners "under their wings."

We received a welcome letter from one of our long-time East Coast friends, Carol Hampton. She enclosed a newsletter entitled "On The Board" by Editor Art Cassata that included stats, news, notices and "nice stories" about Cecil and Harford County Shuffleboard League team members. We were especially grateful for the nice Board Talk "plug" contained in the newsletter, but we also were interested in the news of some of our subscribers (i.e.: we didn't know that our friend Judy Iseman had been in the hospital). There was a time, early on in our efforts, that we thought we could someday serve the leagues across the nation -- the lifeblood of our sport. Realistically,

because of our turn-around time and our space restrictions, that just was an impossible dream. Therefore, we encourage and support the efforts of Art Cassata (who started his newsletter on a gratis basis because there was a need to fill and is now getting paid for it because the league members realized that need) and the Evergreen Shuffleboard Association which serves the Pacific Northwest. You do things we can not possibly do -- and they are vitally important.

Please -- any of you who are publishing league or area newsletters, please add us to your mailing list and include an invoice for the subscription fee, which we'll gladly pay. We can't print league standings, but we can glean news of shufflers which are important to other shufflers nationwide.

Betty Parrish, a member of the Michigan Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Committee, after the death of Chris Passariello's brother in a plane crash, expressed eloquently the need for a national network of contacts that would enable shufflers everywhere to respond to the traumas of other shufflers. She is absolutely right (as she so often is)! Nobody knows more than we do what a heartfelt message from a "stranger" a thousand miles away can do toward healing the wound left behind by the loss of a loved one. Judy Iseman may be from Maryland, but she is loved by shufflers in many parts of the nation. If we had known, if Betty and Slick Parrish of Michigan had known, if Ron and Sharon Huddleston of Oklahoma had known, if Von and Al Stewart of California, had known that she was in the hospital, words of encouragement could have been flowing to her and speeding her recovery.

Thanks, Carol; thanks, Art; thanks to all of you who recognize the value of communications in The World of Shuffleboard. Keep that network working because, believe us, it does work!



Nelson/Foran Tops in Tim's Timber Tavern's 5th Annual Mixed Doubles, Kelso, Washington





control despite entering the deciding game tied at one, John and Richard staged a last-gasp assault to eke out a come-from-behind win.



The Board Talk ESA MEMBERS VOTE FOR CHANGES

At a business meeting of the Evergreen Shuffleboard Association, held Jan. 18-19 at Shotze's Rack-n-Roll, Everett, Washington, in conjunction with the ESA's second annual draw partners tournament, members voted for a number of changes.

According to ESA Secretary and newsletter editor Jim Manders, members voted to award bonus points to the first three finishers of any sanctioned point tournament. The champion will receive five bonus points, with second place getting three extra points, and the third place finisher receives one extra point.

Players also voted to expand the kinds of tournaments that an establishment may hold for points. Previously, players had voted to allow a sponsor a second point tournament per year, provided it was a mixed doubles event, in an effort to get more women involved. The vote at this meeting was to allow a second tournament provided it was a mixed doubles, draw partner, an A-B-C team event, or a tournament using The Shuffleboard Federation's rating systems.

Players also voted to have "power draws" (also known as A-B draws) for Friday night events prior to point tournaments. The format and pairings would be at the discretion of the tournament director and that person's decisions would be final.

It was announced that The Shuffleboard Federation will offer sponsorship to the ESA in the form of awarding money to non-winners at sanctioned tournaments. The Federation will have a drawing after each tournament's results are received and return the entry fee to an individual non-winning player or team, depending on the event.

Dave Arndt 1996 Point Winner

Dave Arndt of Tacoma, Washington, current treasurer of the ESA, was awarded the top point money for the 1996 season. He earned \$157 in point money and an additional \$100 bonus for having the most points. He followed Dan Hitt as the ESA's second season championship.

Shotze's contributed \$1,000 to the ESA for the right to host the second annual draw partner event. Half of that money went into the tournament with the remaining \$500 added to the prize fund that is distributed for points won during the season.

Winners of the 2nd ESA draw partner event were Paul Major and Darrol Nelson, who now lead the '97 point standings with 42. Second place finishers were Billy Powell and Carl Roush, putting them in second place for the new season with 36 points.






The father and son team of Bill and Billy Melton of Oklahoma took second place.

Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

A series by Balboa Ron Schweikert

(In the last episode, after Tacoma Tim and Lil had lost to Indiana and Wrapper at Gee Bee's, near Tacoma/ Seattle, Lil set up a challenge involving her protegee, Frisco Eddie, who was nervous but excited about this opportunity.)

Eddie had made his challenge. Now he awaited the response from the Wrapper and Indiana Joe. After a short conflab, the Wrapper said: "How about we just let you walk this thing for \$200 an end." Eddie glanced over at Lil momentarily, then said: "I'm into that, but how about I shoot a few practice weights first -- and oh, by the way, Lil will be handling the money."

Indiana said: "That'll be just fine, my man," and walked over to Lil and said: "If I remember right, you always like to put up the stake first, right?" She replied: "Yup. Here's our \$400." She placed the money on the bar and Indiana motioned to the Wrapper, who then matched their wager. Lil placed an ashtray over the money.

Eddie had been practicing with his weights while all this was going on. When he had tried out both ends of the table, he asked the Wrapper if he minded if he used four of his own weights. He said he thought "that would be fine," and even let Eddie choose which color he wanted. He chose blue.

After the quarters were in and the board was freshly waxed, the action began. The first few frames were basically weight-for-weight. However, Indiana was outlagging Eddie and, as the game progressed, it began to look bleak.

The game ended with Indiana lagging a 3, which made it 15 to 11 overall. Eddie went over to Lil and Tim, looking for some advice. In the meantime, the Wrapper had picked up their money, leaving \$400 behind for the next game. Lil had time to confer with Eddie while the board was being prepared for the next game.

Lil wasn't excited about the outcome of the game. She told Eddie: "I expected things to work out this way, Champ. You didn't have the feel for the lag yet, and you haven't nailed down the drift. You can beat these guys. I've got a few side-betters on the line here, too, so just settle down and go to work, Babe."

Eddie felt better after that conversation and his next game improved, but he still lost 13 to 15. Indiana and the Wrapper were starting to get pretty cocky now and were filled with self-confidence. That was what Lil was waiting for! She not only "jacked up" the game bet to \$400 an end, but she and Tim also loaded up on some side bets as well.

Then Eddie came alive. About the middle of the third game, he got that feeling that all pros get when they're

"on." He knew he could not only stick every weight, but that he could slide, and place the weights just about wherever he wanted them. In addition to that, his lag was really warming up. It felt like his fingers almost extended clear to the 3 zone, and he could place the weights there at will. What a sensation!

He won the third game by a close margin (as per Lil's instructions). They set the bet for the next game at \$500 an end. Lil and Tim had all kinds of side action as well, so this game was important. Eddie won.

Indiana Joe and the Wrapper went into conference then. They didn't want to break up the doubles, but Eddie had been able to manipulate the hammer, so he had somewhat of an edge there. He had done this through arranging things to where Indiana didn't get the lag. This was accomplished by making sure he would get only a deep 3 or 4 (or off the board) against the Wrapper, when the Wrapper had left a 1 on his last shot of that frame. He felt he could afford to give up a 1 if he had to, as opposed to fighting Indiana's lag. So they decided that the best strategy would be for Indiana to play Eddie singles. They were also in agreement that they should raise the "anti" and take care of this young upstart once and for all!

The Wrapper came over to Lil then and made a proposition. They would put Indiana up in singles against Eddie....for \$1500. Lil told him: "Well, now, Wrapper my man, we're going to have to think this one over a bit." She then motioned to Eddie and Tim and drew them aside. She was smiling as she said: "Well, boys....we've arrived. They've got us -- right where we want them. Let it all hang out now, Champ -- this guy belongs to you!"

The excitement level in GeeBee's Bar was peaked out now. Everybody wanted in the action -- one way or another! Indiana had asked for, and got, the board sprayed for this game. The wax went on then -- and they were off.

Eddie (and Lil) had spotted one weakness in Indiana's game. It was his right rail from the window side of the bar. The game was tight. Both of them were sticking perfectly, making combinations, and lagging 3's almost every time. The score was now 14 to 13, in Eddie's favor, and Indiana's hammer. Eddie knew he had to make him shoot that right rail. The board was clean for Eddie's third weight. He placed it a little right of center, about two feet short of the 1 line.

Indiana made what may have been a mistake at that point. He tried to "go" on the weight, but stuck right on instead. This was the set-up Eddie was waiting for. He shot a left-hand cross -- which just skimmed by Indiana's weight on its right side. The weight ended up a deep

deuce, about two inches off the right rail.

The ball was in the man from Indiana's court now. Should he shoot the right rail, or follow Eddie's left cross shot? He had to stick this one or the game would be tied-up 14 all -- with Eddie's hammer! He sized it up with his right hand. He bent down and sized it up again. The hammer weight was shifted to his left hand now.

The tension was peaked throughout the room. There was a lot of money at stake. You could hear a pin drop in that place right then! Indiana slowly sprinkled some wax on the left rail. He got set for the shot, and then made his release. The shot felt good, it looked good, and it.....




