Believe It or Not: It Happened!

The Cecil-Harford County Shuffleboard League started the 1996-97 travel league with 16 teams (one team later dropped out -- didn't want to travel the sometimes 40-45 miles round-trip). After playing for 22 weeks and 352 games, the division leaders one through four play a two-game series until the final two teams are decided -- another 48 games for a total of 400.

The playoffs for league champion are decided by playing each other on each other's boards eight games. The first team to win nine games is the league champion; tie breaker if it ended 8 to 8 was to be total points scored during all 16 games.

Harvey's Place, Street, Maryland, won the first night five games to three and 23 points ahead -- the championship to be decided at George's Restaurant, Elkton, Maryland, two nights later. After the seventh game at George's, Harvey's was ahead eight games to seven and 12 points -- the last game to be the decider. George's "Bulldog Team" won the game. Now it was eight to eight. For the points, the Bulldogs won the last game by 13 points -- thereby winning the league championship on the last shot -- 416 games (potential of over 12,000 points) and won by a total of one point!

What Ron and Debbie and their volunteer raters are doing will be a real benefit to tournament directors for years to come. We're not particularly proud of the change in the "Nation's Top Shuffleboard States" standings on the back panel. Michigan, home state of The Board Talk, has slipped to No. 5, falling through our 13+ years from No. 1 to No. 2, then 3 and 4. Why? Well, there are two opinions on the editorial staff of two: (1) "George is our shuffleboard buddy. He'd never cut us off just because we didn't pay our renewal. He never puts the bite on us and if our name happens to be in the newsletter, he always has an extra copy in his car." (2) With a couple handfuls of exceptions, Michigan players are not travelers. They stick close to home and seldom even support tournaments in adjoining states, let alone those across the nation. Some are "kings in their own courts," but not confident enough to test their skills elsewhere -so they don't really care what's going on elsewhere. Thankfully, those who do make Michigan proud! (You can probably guess which is whose opinion.)

While we're embarrassed by Michigan's fall, we're proud of Washington's continued growth and credit the Evergreen Shuffleboard Association's promotion of The Board Talk. As we've said before, the "secret" to California maintaining the No. 1 spot is maintenance -subscribers respond to their red checks in a timely fashion. Congrats to No. 2 Texas and No. 3 Indiana for maintaining -- and growing!

Bob Has ABC Draw Down to a Science -- CC's 5th is Success!

CC's (Anaheim Ramada Inn, California) 5th Annual ABC Tournament, April 4-6, was another big success, with 45 players vying for \$3700 in entry and sponsor sale monies. In addition to the contingent from Amato's (the Coulter Clan plus Bubba, Kathleen and Ken), 14 players from the Dixie Belle showed up. A welcome addition was the group of five from Blinky's in Santa Clara and the two from Mr. G's in Visalia.

I overheard a comment about the girls from Santa Clara: "They're slim and play shuffleboard, too." Jennifer Rizzi, David Barsch, and Wayne Morgan were three first-time tournament players who, although not finishing in the money, are probably now hooked on the game.

By playing two rounds Friday night, we were able to finish Sunday afternoon at 2:20. The format was 15 point games, 2 out of 3, double elimination, on two boards. Everybody playing helped to do this by showing up on time and paying attention to when they were supposed to shoot, i.e., taking rest room breaks right after shooting instead of right before their turn.

The Federation/Bowers player ratings were used to

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sort the players into A, B, and C groups. I use 3 x 5 cards with the player's name and rating (the 2 decimal place average number) on each card. Using a pool table, the cards are spread out in rating sequence and divided into three equal size groups. This gives a good visual indication of apparent rating errors and helps place unrated players correctly.

Pea pool tokens ("Pills") are then drawn at random for each group and written on the cards. The cards are then sorted into team number sequence and rosters written. The rosters are then used for the sponsor sale. After the sale, the same team numbers are used on the elimination chart.

This whole operation takes about 15 minutes. Each tournament gets a little faster and easier as your 3×5 card file builds.

Thanks to co-director Vern Booth and to Paul Weber of the PCSA for doing a fine job on the sale. The bidding gave no clue to the finishing order with the exception of first place being the high bid.
