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

There were 29 teams in Friday night's A-B draw.




Doug Buhl (right) of Springfield, Oregon, drew local Matt King to take first place in the A-B draw.

Third place winners Dick Heflin and Carl Barker (right), with fourth place finishers Everett Perry and Dave Arndt.


There were 24 teams participating in the open doubles.

The Rating System: Where is it Going? How Will it be Financed in the Future?

The Bowers Rating System -- it's not a lot of expense to those of us who do the ratings. We simply add the names of the new players we feel should be rated and rate the players we have seen in action and mail it to the Bowers.

At this time, there are 65 raters. We are rating almost 2,000 players. The last ratings | received from the Bowers had 37 pages. The postage was \$1.80. I rated my players and mailed it back.

All or any of the 65 raters can rate you. Once that has been done, the Bowers mail the new ratings back to the raters. The postage is another couple of bucks per copy. They furnish free copies at all the big tournaments.

I, like most of you, don't personally know the Bowers. They have never asked for any financial help from me. However, if those of us who reap the benefits don't help financially, what will happen to the rating system?

This is what I am going to do. I am going to pass the hat and ask my league and tournament players to throw in a buck or two. How about you?

Mail it to: Ron & Debbie Bowers, 1111 Byers Lane, Austin, TX 78753. If you want a copy of the ratings, I suggest you send them a donation of \$5 to cover the printing and mailing costs.

One of your fellow "Show Me State" shufflers stopped by the other day (our first subscriber visitor to our "new" office) and he was on a "mission" to make sure the Bowers are reimbursed, at least in some small way, for their efforts. We promised him anonymity until he makes his presentation at a future tournament, so we won't mention his name now, except to say that he was getting good reception in his travels.

We heartily endorse your suggestion to order a rating book for \$5. It is well-worth that investment, particularly if you're among the growing number of sponsors who are holding rated events. The time and hassles (after all, it's not YOU, but their peers, who have rated them) you save is worth much more than that! At the same time, you can pat yourself on the back for expanding the World of Shuffleboard and ensuring its future!

And, speaking of expanding the World of Shuffleboard, we salute the Fir Cone Tavern in Shelton, Washington, for focusing on surfacing the "stars" of the future (see Page 3); The Shuffleboard Federation for offering amateurs the opportunity to "shine" in Reno along side their pro counterparts; BZ's in Washington, the Dixie Belle in California, the Gold Nugget in Texas, and all the many others noted in this issue who have recognized and accepted their responsibility to make our sport grow.

Without apology, we admit that we have a vested interest in all this. We recognize that the reason most people subscribe to The Board Talk is to see their names and photos in the newsletter. If we focussed solely on the pros, our mailing list would be pretty meager and we'd last maybe a month or so (and then probably have to use our Social Security checks to get it printed and mailed). Like all the others who have a vested interest, we're looking down the road, the longterm health of this sport, and we know, without taking any spotlight away from the pros who share our goals, that the future lies with the people who have been given opportunities to participate -- and to win! Fir Cone Tavern Committed to "Future Stars"


How many times have you heard: where are the new players -- the future stars? The same faces show up at every tournament. You can count the number of new players who played competitively over the last three years on one hand. These are important questions. But, where are the answers?

So, what would happen if you had a tournament and none of the regulars showed up? Your first thought is that the event would be a flop. Would you believe 14 new players who never played in a tournament would show up?

Shuffleboard is basically a single-tiered sport. You learn to play and then you are thrown to the wolves, so to speak. We at the Fir Cone Tavern, Shelton, Washington, believe that the sport needs an intermediate level -- a tournament where new players can play on a competitive basis with other players at approximately the same skill level.

The Fir Cone Tavern did exactly that. Based solely on the thought of getting new players into the game, the Fir Cone held its first "Amateur Only" Tournament. Any player that placed in the top three in any tournament was not allowed to play. The entry fee was kept low by not having a sponsor sale. The prize: first, second, and third place trophies. The result was a huge success.

The tension was thick in the air. The smell of baby powder to dry sweaty hands permeated both ends of the boards. Wax jobs were challenged, weights were called, and straggly meetings were held in the center of the board. This had the look and feel of a big time event, but the names were different. Instead of Nelson or Melton, it was Usry or Curtis.



You had to be there to appreciate the competitive atmosphere as Jim Thorton and Jack Usry (first tournament) won first place by beating every team they faced by a narrow margin.



The second place team of Bob Herst and Jeanette Hohn lost their first game and fought back through the loser's bracket to the finals.



Third place finishers were Ruben Gonzalas and Dave Curtis (first tournament).

Leroy Austin and Ken Blurgund (first tournament) finished fourth. Fifth place was a tie between Gloria Vonbargen and Danny Owens (first tournament for both) and the team of Billy Hagman and Rocky Harvey (first tournament for both). Seventh place went to Greg Alva and Dwayne Finley (first tournament for both).

In an effort to create an Intermediate Level of Shuffleboard, the Fir Cone Tavern presents its 1998 Amateur Tournament Schedule: Jan. 24-25 Amateur Draw Doubles; April 18-19 Amateur Draw Doubles; July 25-26 Amateur Draw Doubles; Sept. 26-27 **Amateur Draw Doubles Championship** (you must have placed in the top six in any of the three preceding events to be eligible. Winner gets entry fee paid to Division II doubles at the North American Championship in Reno, round trip air fare and one week's lodging.

\$300 per team entry, 4 out of 7, double elimination. Bring partner events for Div. I (\$100 per team) and



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




Kevin Larkin of Washington teamed up with Gwynette Orsi of Nebraska to take second place honors in the open doubles.


"We all had tons of fun meeting new friends and renewing old friendships. Hope to see you in the near future at other tournaments and next year," she said.


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Another Okie Stars at Balloon Inn

Balloon Inn host Ron Vogt (right) presents the fattest envelope to singles winner Ron Huddleston.




Local Kevin Kelly took second place. "Missing in Action" Kenny Hawkes finished third.



On Sunday, Larry Creakbaum came out of the loser's bracket in the singles contest to take first place by beating Brian Collins. Glen Ingram finished third.



John Myles deserves a place in the history of shuffleboard for the handicapped -- a great player as well as a determined one. I think he deserves to be in the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame for the handicapped, don't you?

I just got word that my old friend and competitor, Jack Ahearn, died a few months ago and there was no story about him. He was a man who was handicapped all of his career and was from California, one of the biggest shuffleboard states. This guy was definitely a shuffleboard family member and paid his dues and supported the game for at least 40 years. Jack was definitely a pro player and always played to win. He and Troy Tolbert teamed up for years and won their fair share. Troy, being handicapped himself, still won a lot of tournaments. Jack Ahearn (known as "Crippled Jack") worked as a machinest for 30-40 years and was also a great musician and pianist. I got to play with Jack a few times; we didn't win them all, but we won our share. In the '80s, Karl Spickelmier won a singles at Vegas. He walked the board on Jack and me and never won a game. Remember that, Karl, at the Stagger Inn in Bellflower, California? I think all of you in California should write The Board Talk and send in a story about Jack Ahearn, a great human being and a great shuffleboard player. Rest in peace, my friend. I'm sure by now there is a gathering "up there" for the great shootout: Bob Miles, PeeWee Ramos, Earl Kelly, Billy Chiles, Mickey Mickens, Scratch Todd, Art Ware, and other shuffleboard greats who have passed on.




