In the "left-over guys" event, Carlos Guzman and Dave Fleming took first, with Jorge Galvon and Tommy McBurnett in second place.

There were three separate singles events on Thursday. Winner of the Division I was Bill Melton, with David Williams finishing second. In the 2's only, Jack Davis finished in first place, followed by Jeri Billard and Mary Koteras. Division II was won by Gary Williams, followed by Linda Nobles, Jack Snell and Mahlon Nobles.

In the draw partner events on Friday, Diana Hagen and Harvey Kidd won the Division I, followed by Ron Huddleston and Rod Cameron, David Williams and Carlos Guzman, Flynt Preston and J.D. Sweet. In the Division II draw partner, Jaye Galbon and Tre Cameron were the top winners, with Jeri Walker and Rob Houchin in second place.

In Saturday's 6-person draft team event, Brain Walker's team of Steve Burkett, Lilly Kidd, Mike Renich, Mahlon Nobles and Jack Snell took first place. Taking second was Bill Melton's team of Eddie Wood, Bob Pfiester, Flynt Preston, Whiz, and Nan Mehard (thanks to Nan and Lile, owners of Harbor Point, a good tournament bar in Dallas, for coming).

Sunday's Division I bring partner event was won by Janet Weidner and Fred Boyd, with David Williams and Tammy Denson in second place. In Division II, it was Jorge Galvon and Dave Fleming in first, with J.K. Plyer and David Veasey in second.

Skip's/Board Talk Fall Bash Breaks Previous Records

Way back in 1990, Skip's Lounge in Houghton Lake, Michigan, hosted the 6th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion. The turnout was so large that it was expanded to the Northway Bowling Alley across the busy intersection of M-27 and M-55 to accommodate the crowd of participants. Instead of complaining about the inconvenience of settling in at one location and getting called to the other, shufflers called for a return to the heart of Michigan's Vacation Wonderland, where the living is easy and the password is: "Let's have fun!"


While the Board Talk Reunion continued to move to other states, the popularity of this particular spot led sponsors to initiate the Skip's/Board Talk Fall Bash. The first such event was held in 1991 and attracted 15 teams for the draw partner and 16 in the singles. Each year since then, participation (and the pot) has grown. People started coming in earlier and earlier and so it was decided that No 7, held Sept. 4-7, 1997, would be expanded to three events: a draw partner, an ABC draw and a singles.

It was a wise decision. The 7th Annual Skip's/ Board Talk Fall Bash had 48 people signed up for Friday 's draw partner, 78 for Saturday's ABC draw, and 38 for Sunday's singles.

Davidson/Kuebler Winners of Draw Partner

The "Cookie" Kueblers of Saginaw, Michigan, proved that senior shufflers can still be a force to be reckoned with in tough competition, placing first and third in the draw partner tournament.

Glen Davidson of Oklahoma, president of the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame, travelled from the Whistling Oyster in Washington to California to Pennsylvania (to help establish a tri-state hall of fame there) to Michigan to participate in the Fall Bash. He drew Bill Kuebler for the draw and came out on top of *(continued on Page 3)*

Hershman/Parrish/Palmer Win ABC Draw

Even with the help of the nationally-accepted Bowers Rating System, it was a challenge for directors to form 26 teams out of the 78 players who signed up for the ABC draw, many of whom had not yet been rated and/or were participating in their first tournament. They ran out of pros, 0's and 1's and had to tap the 2's to serve as captains. The results were rewarding as some first-timers found themselves in the winner's circle, the objective of the ABC format.

The all-Michigan team of Jerry Hershman, Frank Parrish and Ron Palmer took top honors in this event. Jerry was one of those unrated players who became a captain because of his reputation in local competition (according to on-the-spot raters). He drew 2-rated Frank and 3-rated Ron and led them to the major portion of the \$5010 pot for this event.

Before they collected their 1st place cups and jackets (courtesy of Skip), they had to clash in the finals against the team of pro Glen Davidson of Oklahoma, Chris LeMieux (Canadian Chris) and Terry Ramey of Michigan in her first tournament appearance.

Taking third place was the team led by Michigan's Bjerne Sunde, who drew Steve Auten and Leon Black, both of Michigan. Leon was another first-time tournament participant.

John ("one-arm") Myles of Michigan coached his team of John Modglin of Indiana and Lupe Gonzalez, another first-timer from Michigan, to the fourth place finish.

Tied for fifth and sixth spots were: Captain Jeff Cottrell, Michigan; J.R. Bucher, Indiana; and Bill Kuebler, Michigan -- and captain Tom Nolder of Indiana; Ron Bown and Debbie Surfus, Michigan.

A Clean Sweep for Glen Ingram in Singles

With the biggest pot of the weekend at stake --\$6635 -- Glen Ingram, a 1-rated player from Indiana, decided to take on the pros and 0's and win it all -and he did! Competing against a field of 37 other equally determined players, he went through the charts undefeated to take the 1997 singles crown.

Before he claimed his jacket and cup, he had to meet the formidable Buddy Broka, also from Indiana, in the finals. Buddy did his best to challenge the undefeated Glen, with an appreciative gallery still on *(continued on Page 8)*

Texas 12TH THANKSGIVING CLASSIC AT GOLD NUGGET, ARLINGTON, NOV. 26-30


The 12th Annual David Williams Thanksgiving Classic will be held at the Gold Nugget in Arlington, Texas on Nov. 26-30.


FOUR STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS SET FOR THANKSGIVING WEEKEND

As we go to press, four states have set championship tournaments, for players in their states only, over the Thanksgiving weekend, Nov. 28-30.






Being inducted into the Michigan Shuffleboard Hall of Fame was an awesome experience for both of us. Thanks to the state committee and all of you who endorsed the induction.











Jim Foran's NSHF Induction





Jim's kids -- James, Stacey and Frankie -- were there to see their Dad receive his well-deserved honor.




