
Grand Masters Plus Another Hit!

- **●100-Plus Players Participate**
- ●\$24,000 Total Pot
- ●Jim Foran Inducted in Hall of Fame By Bill Bailey

Teamwork -- the key word for success here! That's what it was all about during our 8th Annual Grand Masters Plus at the Whistling Oyster here at Quilcene, Washington.

They started arriving a week prior to our first event on Wednesday, July 30. They came in cars, trucks, trailers and motor homes. The "jungle" was full by Monday, July 29, the parking lot full by Wednesday, July 30, with 100-plus players all trying for a piece of the \$24,000 in cash prize monies.

After about 40 round robins, we got underway by Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. with an A-B-C Draw, with 19 teams participating. By 11:30 that evening, we were finished, with the team of Billy Melton, Oklahoma; Winston Jim, Oregon; and Norm McVeigh, Washington, taking first place honors.



Paul Weber of California, Mike Thorpe and Dean Mako of Washington took second in the A-B-C Draw.

Third place went to Darrol Nelson of Oregon and Jim (Caveman) Ward and Rich Shaw of Washington.

This event is growing in popularity here in the

Northwest. This was our second year for an A-B-C Draw and you will see it as a regular event on our tournament schedule.

By 11:00 a.m. Thursday, 23 players had signed up to do battle for the first six places of a \$10,000-plus purse for the open singles competition. By Friday afternoon, we were down to the six money places. As some of you may have already guessed, Oklahoma took home the biggest portion of the purse in that event.



Sparky Sparkman and Chuck Norris, both of Oregon, took third and fourth. Fifth and sixth places went to Mike Thorpe and Jim Manders, both of Washington.

We got a late start on our Friday night "Animal Draw," so we set the format to single elimination. By the time the smoke cleared of 30 teams, we had our first through third place winners. Taking first spot were Dan Hitt and Rick Gindt of Washington. D.K. Kerr and Mark Minium of Washington took second, with Larry Pearson and Chuck Anthony of Washington in third place. Do you suppose that the Washington players have this Friday thing figured out?

Rudy Stober: 1st Inductee in Michigan Hall of Fame

In a ceremony conducted at Rudy's 2nd Annual Memorial Tournament at Stober's Cocktail Lounge, Lansing, on July 26-27, the late Rudy Stober became the first inductee in the Michigan Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

The plaque, complete with the Michigan Shuffleboard Hall of Fame logo, (see Page 16) designed by shuffler John Egan of Pontiac, read:

"Rudy Stober, one of the greatest sponsors in the history of our sport, for his unparalleled dedication to the growth of shuffleboard, his commitment to its future, and his caring and compassion for everyone he encountered. On behalf of everyone whose lives were enriched for having known him."

In a from-the-heart message, Betty Parrish told an appreciative audience that she was proud to be part of a team that is recognizing the leaders in the game of shuffleboard. "Rudy Stober was a leader, a promoter. Whether you were a pro or a beginner, he pushed, pulled and carried you and the game of shuffleboard in Lansing, the state of Michigan, and the country," she said. "Personally, Rudy was my mentor. He loved life and he loved people. He didn't categorize his customers; he treated them all with respect. He wanted to know about you, what made you happy or sad, what your dreams and ambitions were. He encouraged you, gave a little advice, and most of all, he made you smile. He wanted everyone to be happy and I was always happy here at Stober's. A lot of you I love like family, and Rudy made that possible."

In her gracious acceptance of her father's honor, Linda Stober Humbert told participants that while they shared her wish that Rudy could be there for this special occasion, every puck they delivered, every handshake or words of encouragement and/or congratulations they shared with fellow shufflers, would be a tribute to the memory of her Dad.

We know it's going to be a lot more efficient this year because of the Bowers Rating System. At the risk of sounding like a broken record: Thanks, Ron and Debbie of Texas and your nation-wide network of raters for the great contribution you have made to The World of Shuffleboard.

While growth is vital to the future of shuffleboard, so is maintenance. We all recognize that leagues are the backbone of our sport and every area that has leagues is aware that maintenance is a problem. The stronger players always seem to band together to dominate the league and soon, those who finish last or near the bottom of the standings year after year get discouraged and drop out with a "what's the use of trying" attitude. And who can blame them?

Long-time shuffleboard (and Board Talk) promoter Dan Kelly of St. Louis, Missouri, is going to try an experiment to address that problem. He's going to form a short-term (six weeks) league of four teams using the draft team format that has been successful at some major tournaments. He's promised to keep us informed of the results. We salute him for trying to come up with a solution to what seems to be a common and unresolved problem.

A "wholesome dialogue" is how Jim Wolf of Pennsylvania describes the contributions of shufflers such as Ed Galke (New York) and Jim Manders (Washington) on the subject of gaining sponsorship for shuffleboard (see Notebook on Page 10). Marine/Hitt Winners of Shamrock Tavern's Mixed Doubles



Norma DeBois and Dick Heflin of Oregon took second place.




Rick Gindt and Jackie Anderson of Washington finished third.


Blue Goose Holds 1st ABC Draw

There were 14 shooters in Friday night's draw, with Jake from Canada and Gene Brown from the Goose coming in first.


The next major event at the Blue Goose will be the Sweetheart Tournament on Feb. 14-15, 1998, with a draw partner on Friday, the 13th.







Jim Wolf: Spectators Equals Sponsorship; Try This....

Ed Galke and respondees have generated wholesome dialogue. Kudos to the Bowers for their rating system and to those tournament directors who are offering "rated" event(s) in their format(s). Jim Mander's article (July 1997) is excellent! Sponsors do insist on image.

My question is: How often is the final, climatic game of a league match or tournament played to an empty or an almost empty house? It is too often that we, the shooters, do not even watch that game! Why should we then express surprise and/or dismay when we do not and cannot attract an audience, a fan base, a sponsor? The easy answers for us not to watch are that we are tired, it is late, "I'm shuffled out." And as to fans, we say: "Our game is only a bar game." These answers are too easily given and too easily accepted. I propose that we examine our game in a serious manner and, to do so, we might look to pool for an example.

Nine ball is the game that launched pool onto TV as a sponsored event. Not eight ball, one-pocket, rotation, straight pool, or even the venerable game of billiards. Why nine ball? It is fast; games approximate 10 minutes, ranging from 5 to 15 minutes. It is not repetitive. Each shot is unique and purposeful and leads to the next --simple and straightforward. Strategies employed are predictable and can be anticipated, allowing color commentary.

Nine ball is fast, simple and non-repetitive. It is

viewer-friendly. AND SPONSORS DEMAND AUDIENCE.

How do we change our game to be viewer-friendly? Locally, Ed Hammond has come up with a game that should receive shufflers' hands-on consideration. Ed calls his game "two-weight." It is its title for it is played with two weights per shooter and to the far foul line rather than the short one. Otherwise, this game is the same as "straight." Simply, this game is nonstop third and fourth weights of our standard game. Played to 15 points, this game offers the opportunity to be spectator-friendly because:

- It eliminates the repetition of the first and second weights.
- •It is fast. A game of partners lasts approximately 10 minutes (singles a little longer because of the time taken to walk the board).
- •Strategies are simplified and can be anticipated.

 Try this game! We need to have a game that is viewerfriendly to attract sponsorship and Ed Hammond may
 have given us the game.







He placed a very short right-hand weight just over the foul line. He did this because Eddie had been relying predominantly on the right-hand lag.

With the score 11 to 14 against him on his last weight, Eddie's options were very limited. He could go for it all with a lag, or he could keep the game alive by making sure his hammer stayed on the board, and hope he could salvage something on the next frame. The way Glen was shooting though, it was highly unlikely he could get him in a trap. He decided to go for it all.

Eddie sized up the board for his left-hand lag. He had been hitting a spot pretty good with his left-cross, so he chose that for his last shot. After he sprinkled some wax on the left rail, he got set for his shot. His whole body was tingling as he released the weight. It felt good.

The crowd was totally silent now as Eddie's final shot sailed down the table. There was one muffled voice, though, stating "it's goin' off." The weight didn't look like it would stay at the end, but to the surprise of all -- it stuck. It was a four! Eddie again hollered out loud, "Yes!" as he raised his fist!

Glen was smiling and even shaking his head in humorous disbelief over Eddie's lag. Any time someone can slide a 2" round puck some 20 feet down a slick wooden surface, and leave 1/8th of an inch or more of it hanging over the far end of that plank -- he has had help from above (or from below, depending on who lagged the weight)! He was snickering as he looked over at Lil.






