

# Pros, Amateurs, First-Timers Make '98 Southwest Open Another Record-Breaker

More than 200 Shufflers

●669 Entries in 10 Events

●Rick Boyer Named MVP

Shufflers from 18 states made the 7th Annual Southwest Open their own personal 4th of July tradition as they gathered at the American Legion Post 73, Del City, Oklahoma, for a week of camaraderie and competition. Outside, the Legion's 5-acre park looked like a campground with RVs of various shapes and sizes hooked up for the duration. Inside the spacious, air-conditioned facilities, there were 24 boards that didn't get much "down time" before and during (and in-between) the 10 events on the agenda.

#### 136 Players in 4-Person Team Event

When you have over \$32,000 in the pot for the so-called "warm-up event," two thoughts come to mind: (1) there won't be any sponsor money left for the "main" events, or (2) potential sponsors came well-prepared with deep, deep pockets. Which would it be? There were 19 teams in the Division I and 15 in Division II 4-person team events which started on Sunday (that's 136 players!).


# Billy Chiles Inducted By Chris Brown

# Shuffleboard's "Reach Out & Touch Someone" Network Works for Kentucky Couple

Among the "first-timers" at the Southwest Open in Del City, Oklahoma, over the 4th of July week were Mike and Susie Halstead of Shelbyville, Kentucky. How they came to be there, how they were received, and what will happen as a result of that reception, is a testimony to the power of the national shuffleboard network.

It all started when Mike was born and raised in Dayton, Ohio. After his family went to church on Sunday mornings, they would stop at a local shuffleboard bar on their way home. To give themselves a break, Mom and Dad would let the kids shoot the pucks up and down the board. It was then that Mike "fell in love" with shuffleboard.

After Mike and Susie married, they went into business together, and later moved to Kentucky (where shuffleboard is nil), but he never forgot his early indoctrination to the sport. When he and Susie went to Vancouver, Canada, last summer and found a shuffleboard bar, his interest was rekindled and Susie, during her introduction to the game, became "hooked."

#### A Can of Cleaner Provides a Clue

The Halsteads became active in their local Moose Club in Shelbyville and, as an administrator, Mike convinced the "powers" there that installing a shuffleboard would be a good idea. The board was installed and, along with it, came a can of cleaner with The Shuffleboard Federation address and phone number on it. It was the first clue he had that there was an organized nationwide shuffleboard network.

Mike called The Shuffleboard Federation number and reached John McDermott. John told him about The Board Talk and the upcoming Southwest Open (in case they were really interested in getting involved in tournament play). When the Halsteads called The Board Talk to "sign up," they became the very first subscribers in Kentucky.

In June of this year, Mike reached a landmark -his 50th birthday. "What would you like, honey?" asked Susie. "A shuffleboard," replied Mike. So, again, they called John McDermott, who encouraged them to contact Lou Decker in Toledo, Ohio. Lou responded with a refinished American board which is now in the Halstead's basement recreation room (replacing their pool table). They became the second location in Kentucky to have a shuffleboard. "It's become a neighborhood attraction and a family affair with our kids playing and bringing their friends," said Susie.

Shuffleboard at the Moose Club is not very progressive and the Halsteads were accused of "cheating" when they brought their own weights. They were ready to seek out something more advanced. In The Board Talk, they read about a tournament in Pendleton, Indiana, just 2-1/2 hours north from home. There, they met Terry Dowell and Pam Worsham, Mary and Larry Brown and Larry Creakbaum, and learned the principles of tournament play by watching. Those friendly Hoosiers also encouraged the Halsteads to attend the SW Open.

#### "It's Like Being Part of a Big Family"

They came, they watched intently as the pros and so-called amateurs did their thing. Like sponges, they soaked up every little tip, each bit of information passed along by the helpful, sharing and caring shufflers they met in Del City. And -- like "baptism by fire," they jumped into the amateur singles event, learning all the way. In her first match, Susie had the thrill of her lifetime by beating highly-rated Jerri Billard of Texas, a victory enthusiastically shared by Mike, who didn't fare quite as well.

They went home richer -- not in money -- but in knowledge, new friendships, and an eagerness for shuffleboard experiences in the future.

What did these new members of the shuffleboard network think about you?

"The friendliness of the players and their willingness to share was just fantastic," they said. "Learning about a 'Jersey lag' and a 'Texas T' was just icing on the cake. It's like being part of a big family." (continued on Page 6)

# As The Puck Turns.....








It's always a pleasure for George to challenge "Ryan Sandburg/Sammie Sosa" on sports trivia.

# Forest Heritage Festival Tourney on the Upswing

The Forest Heritage Festival in Shelton, Washington, is a yearly celebration where everyone gets together and pays tribute to the men and women of the forest industry who created this shining example of "Small Town America." There is a carnival, a street dance, parade, logger competition, and -- at the Fir Cone Tavern -- a shuffleboard tournament.

Generally, you would think this would be a bad time for a tournament. Blocked off street, filled hotels, and all the other distractions, could cause a problem - but this is Shelton, and shuffleboard is almost a way of life here. This tournament started out as a way to provide entertainment for the local people. As shuffleboard gained in popularity, so did this tournament. At one time, as many as 26 teams crowded into the Fir Cone for this event. Unfortunately, the last couple of years showed a declining number of teams -- but, this year, things changed.

Most all Evergreen Shuffleboard Association (ESA) meetings end up with a decision on the need for more A-B-C, A-B, or rated tournaments. Most members agree that these events even out the playing field while, at the same time, encourage more new players to get involved. Therefore, based on this theory and the poor turnouts in recent years, the Fir Cone Tavern hosted its first A-B-C draw on May 29. The Fir Cone has three boards, therefore the entire event was finished in one day.

Twenty-seven players made up an evenly-matched field of nine teams which competed for top honors.




# Brunskill's Team Takes First in Billy Chiles Memorial A-B-C



There were 20 teams participating in the opening A-B-C event, paying six places.







In Div. I, after a bruising battle between the three finalists, it was Bill Melton's team of Johnny Ballard (Texas), Brad Lowry (Oklahoma), and Mlke Melton (Oklahoma), that emerged the victors. A last-minute "pick-up" team representing four different states took second place honors: Bob Hunt, California; Johnny Wayne Crawford, Texas; Rick Niblett, Maryland; and Tony Pelton, Arkansas. Near the bottom of the totem pole, as far as sponsor bids were concerened, the valiant "never-say-die" team of Beef Camp and Greg Broka (Ohio), Larry Brown and Mike Johnson (Indiana) fought their way to third place.

In Div. II, the favorites didn't disappoint as the all-Okie team of U.J. and Wanda West, Kevin Talley and Jerry Widdoes captured the crown. That affable gentleman from Tennessee, Harvey Walden, joined forces with Texans Olga Vaugh, Joe Spratt and Pat Gainey to take second place. Considered a bit of a "dark horse," the Full House team from Wynnewood, Oklahoma -- Pat and Don Kinard, Ronnie Grove and Bill Carter -- did themselves proud by taking third.

#### **124 Entries in Singles Events**

In Monday's open singles, there were 34 entries and 90 in the amateur singles (1's and above) for a total of 124 players. The well hadn't dried up yet as the pot for the sponsor sales soared to over \$40,000. Add the graduated entry fees to that and you have a real incentive to win!

In the amateur singles, that incentive drove local Dino Fleming and Hoosier Terry Dowell to the finals on Tuesday night. Terry earned his accolades as one of the toughest players in the Midwest as he wrestled the crown from a determined Dino.

Taking third was a newcomer to the major tournament scene, Marty Shepard from Blair (not Omaha), Nebraska. Marty, who called his wife back home to let her know that he was close to finishing in the money, later called to tell her he was IN the money. Marty said he found a different

That was a new experience for me." It was such a positive experience that after Marty went back to Nebraska after the singles, he turned around and came back the following day. 

#### 48 in Bring Partner

There were 24 teams in the Div. I bring partner event which started on Saturday morning. And the winners were Brenda Moore and Johnny Ballard of

Texas. Rick Boyer and Dennis Bird of Colorado finished second, with Mike Kinney and Darrol Nelson of Oregon in third place.

#### 38 in 2-Rated Singles/45 in 3 and 4-Rated Singles



See you soon at the next tournament but, in the meantime: "SHUT UP AND SHOOT!"






