Indeed, what with bars, restaurants, and room service, exercise room, pool and sauna, the hotel made it easy to forget the world outside and concentrate on shuffleboard.


After an initial and successful premier last year at Danny's Sports Bar, organizers Jack Scott and Johnny Ballard decided to expand the tourney to a hotel venue. Twelve beautifully conditioned boards, along with ample seating for viewing and socializing, filled the Grand Ballroom. A fully-staffed bar and table-side food service complimented the scene.

The tournament officially kicked off on Saturday, Dec. 27, with the first two of nine events to be played over four days -- an A/B draw and an open draw for 3's, 4's and 5's.




Hostess Gwen Vogt gives singles winner Morey Balins a congratulatory hug and an envelope with the biggest share of the \$1600 pot in the first event.






Chuck King was a three-time placer, and Joyce Pyle and Connie King were two-time placers in this tournament.


Finishing third were Dick Gorman and Wendy Davis from Delaware.

Ed Graves: "Remember the Man Who had No Feet"

Just a short note to bring recent happenings up to date. Maybe you have read in the newspaper or saw on television how cushy and soft incarcerated inmates have it -- living in air-conditioned cells, eating the best of food, watching color TV (just imagine, COLOR TELEVISION -- whoever would have thunk it?). To these we might add: personal telephones, lap top computers, inmates running their own businesses from their cells and making more money than most people ever dream of earning, and last, but not least, the unmentionable conjugal visits.

Well, folks, I can tell you for certain, I have seen none of the above during my 10 years here at Mack Alford Correctional Center (MACC), except of course, my \$275 13-inch Toshiba color TV set which my dad bought for me three years ago. No, I can tell you quite honestly, here at MACC, we make money the old-fashioned way. Once more, we don't need any fancy gadgets like air conditioners or computers. After all, what did people do before we had those things anyway? A lot of the folks who work here were raised up on beans and cornbread and, if it was good enough for them, it's darn well good enough for us.

The purpose of this letter is not to sound negative or to violate the spirit of Christmas. Christmas is my favorite time of year. Rather, I just want to give everybody an update on my status. I get questions like, "When are you getting out?" or "When do you come up for parole?" Chances of parole in Oklahoma

with the incumbent governor are about the same as a camel passing through the eye of a needle. Only God knows if I will ever get out of prison -- or when.

I do, however, have a shot. I am presently in the Eastern District of the United States District Court. That is, I have a habeus corpus filed with some very good issues. The chances are very good that I will get my case overturned in the very near future, probably some time next year.

You have to understand that getting my case overturned or reversed does not mean that I am free to walk out of prison. That, in fact, happens in only a small percentages of cases (contrary to what you see on television or read in the newspaper). In the majority of cases, the Petitioner (i.e. me) is remanded back to the District (county) Court where he was sentenced, and then it is up to the District Attorney of that county what action is taken. In some cases, he opts for retrial; in others for plea bargaining.

If I win a reversal, I can probably expect to be sent back to the county jail (as I am no longer DOC property), thrown in a cell by myself and made to wait until they decide what to do At that point, I will sort of be in limbo, no charge against me, yet cannot walk free. County jail prisoners in this situation have been known to remain in this limbo state for extended periods of time in Oklahoma, where the wheels of justice turn very slowly and usually turn in favor of the State.

Like I already said, I don't mean to sound downbeat. I just want to tell it like it is. If you think you're not going to have a merry Christmas, just remember the man who had no feet.

This word of advice: your committee picks the person they want inducted. Get 20 signatures (endorsing the induction) or 10 or 15, whatever the committee decides upon and then have the induction at the next tournament or have it as an induction ceremony just like football, basketball, etc. does. You, the committees, have to make it happen!

Like I've said before, all the members of the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame are at your disposal. One of us in your area will come if you ask us.

Do what you're there to do -- INDUCT! Let all the negative people stay out looking in. That's not what

we're about. Keep moving forward. Walk into the sun and the dark shadows will never cross your path.







N.A.S.C. UPDATE

From The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc.

One of the great things about computers is that when you write something, you have the ability to move text around from one place to another within your document. One of the bad things is the ability to lose text during that process.

In the rush to put together information about the North American Shuffleboard Championships for The Board Talk, a very important part of the material (the whole story of procurring 12 of the boards for the tournament) got lost in the editing process. Because we send camera-ready material, we know that this was our mistake, not George and Donna's.

We are embarrassed that, as a result, one of the most important members of our team, Harvey Walden, was not mentioned. Also not mentioned was the great work of Matt Melton in loading and unloading boards at Del City, Harvey Kidd's help with truck rental, and the "beyond the call of duty" job done by Rick Boyer. The following should have been included in the post tournament coverage.

Don Crall, who runs the American Legion in Del City, Oklahoma, which hosts the annual Southwest Open and many other tournaments, also owns 21 (and counting) exceptional shuffleboards. All of them have rebuilt cradles, refinished tops, and three-sided scoreboards. When Bob Lewis, who had supplied 12 boards the previous couple of years, told us that due to his continued growth, he no longer had 12 boards available, we turned to Don Crall.

Don was not too enthusiastic about the idea of sending \$60,000 worth of shuffleboard tables cross country, but agreed to rent them to us if we could not find suitable equipment elsewhere. This was, of course, contingent upon us being able to work out all of the logistics to his and our mutual satisfaction.

We knew that Don would have to have total confidence in the person who was driving the truck. This was obviously an important issue to us as well, since we were responsible for returning the shuffleboards in the same condition they left in. For us, it was one of our easiest decisions of the

entire process of putting on the tournament. In addition to being one of the nicest people in shuffleboard, Harvey Walden is a man whose reputation and integrity are second to none. As soon as his name was mentioned to Don Crall, we knew that hurdle No. 1 was out of the way. As it turns out, Don also knew Harvey and felt as highly of him as we do. That confidence was well-founded. Upon arriving in Reno and opening up the truck, not only had all the boards arrived safely and damage-free, Harvey's hat was even sitting of the same box that he set it upon leaving Oklahoma.

In addition to doing a great job driving the boards more than 3,000 miles round trip, Harvey also pitched in and gave us a hand with the set-up process. So, to one of the most important members of our team, we thank you and apologiz for not giving you your richly-deserved recognition in the original tournament write-up.

Harvey Kidd, who is a Ryder Truck dealer, tool great care of us in helping with the rental price an arrangements. We appreciate his support as well.

Last, but not least, in addition to somehow pulling off the miracle of having all the boards set up and playable in only 14 hours, Rick Boyer also volunteered to make a long detour and go to Del City before the tournament to help load the board before hopping on another plane to be in Reno when the boards arrived to supervise the unloading and set-up, and then repeat the entire process in reverse.

Something significant that we did not know at the time of the original write-up about the tournament has since transpired. We recently received a phone call from Don Crall, who was the bearer of great news. Due to the stellar job done by everyone involved in the transportation, set-up and take-down of the boards, Don has told us the his boards will always be available to us for the North American Shuffleboard Championships.

So, thanks again everybody, for your great work in helping to make the N.A.S.C. the tournament that it is.

Ron Huddleston of Oklahoma City proclaimed the Houston Holiday Open to be "one of the best in the country" with "some of the best boards around."


Gwyn Orsi of Omaha, Nebraska, especially liked "the great room deal with free breakfast" along with "great weather" and "Texas hospitality."


