Every time we play it, we hear something new and wonderful, and delight in each and every person who went through the "receiving line" to receive hugs and kisses. We tell every viewer: "That's Bill Melton from Oklahoma -- he's raised a whole family of shufflers." "That's Darrol Nelson from Oregon -- the greatest player in the world." "That's Sol Lipkin from New Jersey -- he's 92 years young and still planning John's 100th birthday."

It's a Christmas gift that will be passed down through the generations of our family. Thank you, John, and each of you who were part of this grandest moment of our lives.

When you enter a 15th year of business, it's natural to look back to see where you began to fully appreciate how far you've come. One of the things we found in the 1984 volume was a feature in the December issue about AI and Von Stewart. That fit perfectly with the recent letter to shufflers that we received from them (see Page 2 of Shufflers' Notebook). We thought you would find it interesting, from wherever your shuffleboard experiences began, to review AI's viewpoints of the sport in 1984.

For that reason, and because Von is currently challenged by the biggest fight of her life, we are reprinting that article. Enjoy -- and respond!

Al Stewart Has More to Celebrate Than 25 Years in Business

Reprinted from the December 1994 Board Talk

'Twas the day before Christmas and in bars across the nation, people were toasting each other with glasses held high and hustling to get one more game of shuffleboard in before Christmas Eve closing.

That will be the scene in a lot of bars in just a few short weeks and many of us will be there when it happens. One person who won't be there is Al Stewart, owner-operator of A & M Amusement Service, El Monte, California, for the past 25 years.

Not that Al doesn't have a lot to celebrate: a successful business, a vocation he loves and a wife he describes as "the sweetest thing God ever created." But the former shuffleboard hustler won't be celebrating with a drink. Instead, he and his "partner, friend and wife," Von, will celebrate Christ's birthday in church that evening. It's been that way for 12 years now, since Al and Von became "born again" Christians.

Before that, the Stewarts didn't have much reason to celebrate. Booze and shuffleboard hustling had taken their toll. Drunken fights threatened their marriage; Al's shuffleboard refinishing business was on the brink of failure because of lack of attention. But all that changed and, according to Al, "Thanks to God. He saved our marriage and our business."

So how does a born-again Christian reconcile his "new life" with a business where 99% of his work is in bars? Isn't there a conflict of interest?

"Absolutely none," Al said. "I'm completely at ease with what I do and how I live. I made up my mind from the first that I would not preach to those people sitting in the bars. I've had some people who knew me before and have asked me about the change. I'm more than happy to tell them how it all came about but I don't throw it at them. Now the people who used to bring me a scotch and water or bottle of Coors come up with a cup of coffee."

Learning Through "Trial and Error"

Al got into the shuffleboard business by "pure coincidence." He was working for an insulation company when his shuffleboard hustler partner, Freddy Anderson, broke off a key in the money box and asked Al to go with him to Los Angeles to pick up a screw lock from the American Shuffleboard Company.

"While I was there, a couple people called and wanted shuffleboards moved from one bar to another. I told John Weiss, who was the West Coast manager

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for American Shuffleboard, that I had a pick-up and could handle it. That's how I started -- just moving boards," Al said.

Then came the demand for refinishing the boards. Since he had neither the facilities nor the expertise to do that, he hauled them to San Bernardino, had them refinished there, picked them up 8 to 10 days later and then delivered them. There had to be a better way, he thought.

"I quit my other job, rented a building, bought all the sanders and spray guns and started from scratch, knowing nothing. I opened the shop in 1962. I was dumb, green," he said. "The first board I refinished was so slow, you practically had to hit the weight with a golf club to get it to the other end of the board. I did seven boards in San Diego and had to redo them all because all the finish peeled off.

"It was trial and error for a period there, but I just kept working at it. But I loved it and I still do. I iove to get those old boards and when I get them fixed up all nice and pretty and someone asks, 'is that a new board?' -- that really does something to me," AI said. "I've built up a pretty good reputation and I'm proud of that."

Al refinishes boards in nine western states and has gone as far as 1,700 miles to Idaho. He averages about eight refinishing jobs a month.

The Biggest Change is Speed

Al has seen a lot of changes in shuffleboard during the 25 years he's been in business and since 1949 when he first started playing.

"The biggest change is speed. They want them faster, faster, faster. We never used to use any silicone or magic glaze. We just used regular powdered wax. Then they came up with what we call half-and-half, then they went to American speed. Now they've gone to the super-glide which is a can of roller bearings and they've got all kinds of silicone and everything else to put on the boards that you can imagine.

They want the boards faster and straighter and you can't have both. You have to throw the weight so slow that any type of imperfection in the board is going to show. With the slower wax we used in the old days, you had to throw it so hard to get it down there, you didn't notice any of the hooks or crooks in the boards."

Al believes the game of shuffleboard is, without a doubt, on the upswing. "It died out in the 60s when the pool tables came in. Nobody was promoting shuffleboard then. They stuck the boards in a room, sometimes the back room, and just let them set. It picked up a little in the mid-60s, then died out again and stayed pretty low until about five years ago. The last three years, I've been busy, busy, busy," he said.

One of the high points of Al's 25-year career

happened just this past month when he rented a board to Warner Brothers movie studio for a sequel to "Policy Academy." Al got to deliver the board on location, a bar set up in a warehouse in downtown Los Angeles.

"That was quite an experience -- to think that I'm going to have a shuffleboard in a movie that will be shown all over the country," said AI. "I don't go to movies, but I'm definitely going to see 'Police Academy Two."

Pennsylvania Stages 1st State Championships

The 1st Annual Pennsylvania State Shuffleboard Championships were held on Thanksgiving weekend. It was the hope of the tournament committee that shufflers from all corners and areas of the state would join in the fun and competition, meet new friends, renew old friendships, and become a part of history. The committee worked very hard at making the tournament a success. Close to 200 flyers were mailed out to shuffleboard establishments and fellow shuffleboard players. A program was designed and advertising support sought to provide the revenue needed to purchase custom-engraved plaques for the winners. Host establishments provided added money so that each of the five events had \$100 extra given

directly back to the players. The Board Talk provided their usual generous help, as did Sun Glo Corporation when they donated the wax, silicone, and a set of weights to be raffled off. Was all the hard work and effort worth it? You bet it was! It was agreed by all that the first Pennsylvania State Shuffleboard Championships were a successful start for a new tradition.

The tournament directors showed up bright and early at J & C's Tavern on Friday morning for lastminute preparations, only to discover two "earlier" birds. Mike and Christine Tobin from Pittsburgh were already there, rarin' to go, bright-eyed and bushytailed despite their all-night, and often rainy, six-hour drive. *(Editor's Note: See Mike's letter in Notebook.)* Two events were scheduled for that morning: the mixed doubles and the "B" doubles. After the sales of these two events, handled capably by Jim Wolf and Al DiBella (with Regina collecting the cash), we all got down to some serious shuffleboard.

The mixed doubles, played at Gambol's Cafe, was a true round robin format. Winners of this event were Al DiBella of Philadelphia and Louise Freer of Lansdale. Jim Yank Sr. of Philadelphia and Judy Gartland of Northeast Philadelphia finished second, and Mike Tobin of Pittsburgh and Rita Yank of Philadelphia finished a strong third.

The "B" doubles were hosted by J & C's Tavern, Callahan's Tavern, and McFadden's Tavern, and were played in a single game, double elimination format. Bill Pollock and Greg Hager, both of Upper Darby, took top honors in this event. Herb Forster of Ridley Park and Albie Pinner, Upper Darby, finished second, and Regina Smith of Darby and Chris Stillwell of Philadelphia played well enough to place third. By the way, Bill Pollock and Greg Hager will not be considered "B" players in the future.

Saturday morning came much too soon. The open doubles were again hosted by J & C's, Callahan's and McFadden's. After the fast-paced sale, handled by veteran Mike Kennedy, the games got under way. The competition was grueling all through the day and into the night. Louise Freer and AI DiBella survived some tough games (ask Joe Williams and Butch Kelly!) and took their second first place finish of the tournament. Finishing a tough second were Dave Milano and Joe Orfanelli (J & C's owner) of Philadelphia, with Mike Kennedy and Mary Ann Watson of Avondale in third.

Many, many thanks to Ed DiCipoli of the Sun-Glo Corporation for the generous contribution of wax, silicone spray and a set of weights to raffle off the the players (won by JoeOrfanelli). George and Donna Wilber's continuous and generous help to the world of shuffleboard was felt here, too, in the form of ad space, free subscriptions, and additional copies of The Board Talk for distribution.

Same time, same place next year? Well, if what "Hollywood" says is true about a shuffleboard god....we hope he (or she) is listening! We will certainly do our best to make the Pennsylvania State Championships a continued success in the years to come.
