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Hale/Wilcox Inducted in State Halls of Fame This One's for You, Bruce! Emmett: "The Obvious First Choice"



Ten years ago, at the 1st Arizona Open, Bellflower Bruce Hale started his tradition of presenting roses to every lady attending tournaments. On April 18, the tables were turned on Bruce as three dozen ladies each gave him a rose and a kiss. It was part of Bruce's induction into the California Shuffleboard Hall of Fame, held at Oskar's in Bellflower.

It's a long road filled with potholes from being broke and building a wood and cardboard shelter in an alley in the Skid Row area of Los Angeles to being the sole owner of a successful plastics company. This (continued on Page 8)

Emmett Wilcox became the first inductee into the Indiana Shuffleboard Hall of Fame at the Bourbon Spring Doubles on May 2. Terry Dowell presented him with his plaque and called him "the obvious first choice" for induction.

Up until May 2, 1998, one of the most memorable wins for Emmet Wilcox was at Bourbon in 1959, where he received a 4-inch trophy and half of the \$280 pot (sale included). This year the pot was \$10,000 and he didn't win a share of that, but he did receive an honor no other Hoosier had captured before -- induction into the Indiana Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. He became No. 1!

Long respected by his peers in the Midwest as a player and a teacher, Emmett charged \$1 each for his lessons during the '60s. He said his advice was free but lessons cost; that way you would always remember them. By the late '70s, his "price" had increased to \$5. Of his new crop of students, he observed: "Show me a good loser and I'll show you a loser."

The '80s brought better players and bigger pots and he still won more than his fair share. "By the late '80s, his interest in playing had dropped a little, but his interest in improving the game had peaked," said a student and friend named Bill. "By the early '90s, he was polishing weights so a player could get the most out of them. He then built a new style climatic that would permit you to change one side of a board, but *(continued on Page 8)*

His funeral was held May 16. As this is written, the cause of his death was unknown.



Denny was first introduced to shuffleboard by Tim Piccolo (Piccolo's Bar in Omaha) in 1981. He soon became a key figure in Nebraska shuffleboard and later earned a "pro" status at the national level.

He was also a long-time supporter of The Board Talk and earned a set of weights for signing up 25 new subscribers when the publication was still a "toddler."

long road that Bruce Hale has travelled also contained some health obstacles to challenge his trip through life. Each time he hit one of those potholes, his unfailing spirit and positive attitude saw him through.

Perhaps it is because he's had to overcome so many challenges himself that makes him such a compassionate, generous man, whether it's encouraging a beginning player, helping shuffleboard establishments (like Oskar's) get up and going, making the ladies who participate in the sport feel special, or financially supporting a worthy cause -charities, organizations and needy individuals.

Marilyn McCracken, who along with Jim Martin, have lent their creative talents to the California Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Committee, summed it up well when she said: "Although his business has been plastics for the past 30 years, this man is truly made of precious metal. He not only has a heart of gold, but also has a silver tongue....."



Bruce's "silver tongue" failed him when President Jolene Lembke officially inducted him into the California Hall of Fame. The sentiments he was too overwhelmed to deliver then are contained in his fullpage ad on Page 3.

Words of tribute to Bruce were eloquently delivered by Joanie Swenson, Paul Weber, Marilyn McCracken, Mike Sanderson, Tim O'Brien, Debbie (Dixie Debbie) Merhoff, Kathleen Wilson, Chris Brown (on behalf of The Board Talk), and Jan Manes. When VCR problems prohibited the viewing of a video salute produced by Jim "The Marlin" Martin, which contained a song called "Bruce," written by Joanie Swenson, The Shufflettes (Joanie, Mary Lou Deering, Jolene Lembke and Audree Rasmussen) were persuaded to do a live performance. As they got into the song, so did Bellflower Bruce, dancing in the aisles with several ladies.

not the other side. Next, he built an indicator with which you could tell how much of a valley or crown a board had in it. Another of his ideas came into being a couple of years ago, thanks in part to The Shuffleboard Federation for their cooperation in building titanium weights. He had the idea about 10 years ago, but didn't have access to the right components. Now he proudly displays his GOLD weights every time he plays.

"As proud as he is of those weights, he is even more so of the players he helped along the way. So if you are ever in Central Indiana playing a game and happen to make a bad shot or two and hear someone say: 'Boy, I wish he made \$1,000 a week and played me for \$500; we would both make a good living,' you just met Mr. Wilcox," Bill said.

Induction ceremony speakers included Terry Dowell, Jim Long, National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Director Larry Creakbaum and NSHF President Glen Davidson.

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Revitalized Board Continues Service to Senior Citizens By Donna Wilber Service. And, yes, the cost would be kept to the

It was back in the spring of 1984 that George got an S.O.S. from the president of the Resident Governing Council of Friendship Manor, a government-subsidized senior citizen housing complex in Lansing, Michigan. The 14-foot shuffleboard that had given the residents so many hours of pleasure for many years was in bad shape. In their search to find a solution to their predicament,

they learned about George through a copy of the newly-born Board Talk. Perhaps he could help. If he couldn't, what would they do on their weekly "Shuffle Night"?

George agonized along with the senior citizens when he checked the board. It looked pretty serious. Since we were planning a trip to visit the American Shuffleboard Company, at that time the nation's sole manufacturer of boards, we offered to take the ailing 14-footer to the real experts to see if it could be saved.

We wrapped the sick board in blankets, wedged it between the two of us in our old '74 van and travelled 700 miles to Union City, New Jersey. When we unwrapped our "patient" at the ASC plant, the specialists there gave their diagnosis: no hope for recovery -- doomed to wherever shuffleboards go when they "die."

The board wedged between us on the return trip to Michigan was a brand-new one, fresh off the assembly line. We had, in fact, watched the last finishing touches put on its shiny surface.

The Friendship Manor residents were ecstatic -but concerned. What would the new board cost? How many bake sales and other fund-raisers would they have to hold? Would they, indeed, live long enough to pay for it?

"Don't worry until we get the invoice. We'll work it out some way," George assured them. But they continued to worry until word arrived that there would be no invoice. Moved by the plight of these elderly shuffleboard enthusiasts, the generous people at American Shuffleboard Company made a contribution that would give those senior citizens something to look forward to for many years to come -- their "Shuffle Night." In a thank-you letter to ASC, the senior citizens called their "superb board" a "Godsend."

Fourteen Years Later: Another Call for Help

In the spring of 1998, George received a call from a Senior Citizens Community Center in Morrice, a small town not too far from Lansing. They had a wellused 14-foot board that was in sad shape. Could he help? His prognosis was that, with a refinished surface, the board could give them many years of service. And, yes, the cost would be kept to the barest minimum possible to stay within their very limited financial resources.

What should have been a relatively simple job turned out to be a bit more than that. When we moved, we lost our big garage where George had refinished boards before he "retired" from that enterprise. The board had to be brought inside the house through a basement window. Our cats loved watching George sand the board and then cried pitifully when he shut the basement door while he applied the finish and allowed drying time between applications. Who needs cat paw prints and hair on a new finish? In the meantime, he developed a severe reaction to the finish. For weeks, he suffered with red, itchy, swollen eyes and a rash on other body parts -not a pretty sight. Then spring rains flooded the yard outside the basement window where the board would have to exit.

Meanwhile, the senior citizens waited patiently for George to heal and the soggy lawn to dry.

A Cooperative Effort

When the seniors finally got to play their first game on the delivered board, it was thanks to a cooperative effort: Sun-Glo Corporation for a set of smaller weights at a discount price, The Shuffleboard Federation for contributing wax, long-distance advice from Al Stewart in California, George's modest fee for materials and labor, and a neighbor's help in transporting and setting up the board.

When Ruby Dulock, who spearheaded the drive to get a playable board (and many other senior citizens' activities) for the center, presented George an envelope upon delivery, it was a fat one. He didn't count the money until he got home; he'd learned to trust and admire the ever-patient Ruby. It brought tears to our eyes when he opened the envelope. Inside was a stack of bills, mostly \$1 bills, raised through a number of bake sales. The total was the exact amount they had agreed upon.

It's a Small World!

We didn't relate the board we brought back from New Jersey in 1984 with the one George refinished in 1998, except that they were both 14-footers. It wasn't until George asked about the history of the board that we found it had been given to the Community Center Senior Citizens by Friendship Manor after they had purchased another one.

The folks at American Shuffleboard should be proud that the board they donated to the "Shufflin' Seniors" at Friendship Manor 14 years ago is still "alive" and well, and will serve the "Shufflin' Seniors" in the Morrice Community for years to come.

We were out of breath when we finally caught up with him at the "sneak preview" of Dave and Buster's opening of another of their unique facilities, this time just a couple hours away from home, in Utica, near Detroit. It was near 11 p.m. when we left him behind to "flirt" with the female staff that had so efficiently and hospitably served us our dinner. (At Dave & Buster's, you are a "guest," not a "customer," and are treated accordingly.) We wondered if we could make the trip back home; Sol was still glowing from the memories of dancing for three hours at a Detroit River establishment where Dave and Buster had taken their special guest the night before.

Sol's role, besides dancing until 2 a.m. and capturing the hearts of all the staff at Dave and Buster's, was to instruct selected "captains" how to teach guests the basic rules and techniques of playing shuffleboard on the four American boards that are part of this awesome facility. He has done the same at locations across the U.S.A.

"If people shoot their first game and the puck goes off the board time after time, they're not likely to play again," said Sol. "Our job is to show them how to keep those weights on the board and score. Once they do, we believe shuffleboard will become their chosen sport."

"There's No Place Quite Like It!"

That's the slogan for Dave and Buster's and it's one that says it all -- correctly! It's difficult to describe.... In addition to generous drinks and delectable food, served by a staff that treats you like "guests" in their "house," there are rows and rows of games of chance machines in the "Million Dollar Midway" -- like a mini-Vegas except you get tickets instead of coins. It was fun to watch a happy lady hauling a stuffed animal taller than she was, proudly showing it off to all the dining room guests.

If you're a golfer, like Bill Meyer, you can play a hole at some of the best golf courses in the world at D & B's 19th Hole, or visit The Otherside, a high-tech similulator that blows your mind.

Sol Says: "Attitude is Everything"

When we returned from the enchanted world of D & B's on May 3 to our hum-drum Board Talk office to

write this story, Sol remained behind to complete his "mission" that would last for another five days.

The lifelong shuffleboard evangelist was inducted into the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame in May of 1996 on his 90th birthday. He began his career as a salesperson for the National Shuffleboard Company in the '30s, then became a representative for the American Shuffleboard Company (now American International Shuffleboard), where he still remains involved in the business.

Widowed for a number of years now, Sol reports that he's "still looking" (that will be one lucky lady when he quits looking and settles down). Where does he get his zest for life at 92 years old? No mystical Fountain of Youth, no magic elixier. The answer, plain and simple: "Attitude is everything!"

During the first amateur tournament, we gave out trophies, paid for by a local sponsor, and money. For the second tournament, we lost our sponsor, therefore had only trophies to present the winners. This caused hard feelings among some of the players. We looked up the word "amateur" in the dictionary; for those of you who are still upset, look it up.

At the Fir Cone Tavern in Shelton, Washington, we believe strongly in developing new players. There are a few older shufflers who have created some really good players. Just about three years ago, a couple of guys showed up and wanted to learn to play. Dick Doak explained to these guys how the game is played, and how to hold the weights. Two years later, these same two new players won the Div. II North

American Championship at Reno. Grant Manning and Mel Hohn won the games, but they didn't do it alone. Dick Doak got them started.
