Along with a set of proposed rules to be voted on by its membership, the Evergreen Shuffleboard Association (serving the players and sponsors in the Pacific Northwest) included a "Code of Ethics," which we think is worthy of consideration by others:

"I will play the game with a spirit of good sportsmanship.

"I will conduct myself in an honorable manner both during and after a game.

"I will never knowingly break a rule, but if I do, I will divulge the breach.

"I will take no action which could be interpreted as an attempt to intimidate or demean my opponents, team-mates or officials.

"I will interpret the rules in an impartial manner always keeping in mind that the purpose of rules is to ensure that the game is played in an orderly and fair manner.

"I will humbly accept any penalty which the tournament director(s), at all levels of shuffleboard, deems appropriate, if I am found in violation of the Code of Ethics or rules of the game."

There are a small number of individuals in our World of Shuffleboard whose main goal in life seems to be to create controversy at tournaments and make the events miserable for directors, officials, and fellow participants. You know who they are. Show those chronic complainers and trouble-makers this code (or make up your own) and let them know you expect and/or demand their compliance. If these individuals cannot be "rehabilitated," then they should look for another sport.

On the more positive side, every sport needs role models and we certainly have one in Bill Melton. We call your attention to the ad on Page 3 in which his professional association salutes him for being a "true champion" -- both on and off the shuffleboards. That says it all for a man who adheres to his own strict code of ethics in his professional, his personal, and his shuffleboard lives. We salute Nationwide Dentures, Inc. for buying the space to pay tribute to their champion -- and ours!

They are looking forward to meeting kindred souls who share their love of shuffleboard, so when you meet them at upcoming events, be sure to give them a warm welcome to our national network.

Betty Parrish of Michigan, whose great idea this was, reports that shufflers in her area think it's a great idea, but have a problem with coming up with the appropriate words. # **MORE NOTEBOOK**

# It Just Doesn't Make Any Sense to Buck Heads!

For a state that has approximately 35 to 40 tournaments every shuffleboard season, we seem to have hit a streak of three weeks without nary a one! But, of course, you just know what happens next -three tournaments on the same Saturday! That doesn't make any sense to me why these bar owners don't get together and re-schedule their tournaments accordingly.

I've heard in the past some of these people saying: "Why should we re-schedule? We were in The Board Talk first." Well, I'll tell you one good reason why they should.....

On Thursday, March 19, I got a call from Bobby V wanting to know if my wife and I were up to playing a couple of round robins in Bourbon on Saturday, March 21. We said yes and after we made a few calls and Bobby made a few calls, when Saturday afternoon arrived, there were 24 players ready to get in the \$10 per player event. Now, I've played in a lot of tournaments that refuse to re-schedule because they "were in first," and guess what? They ended up with seven or eight teams total. If, in two days, a couple of guys making a couple of phone calls, can do it, there is no reason the bars can't.

To get to the important stuff....On the first draw partner event, Bobby V and the shooter in the family (Deb) beat out Terry Wolfrum and me in the first of two round robins to be held that afternoon. Things seemed to get a little better, I think, in the second session. Terry (from Ohio, I should add) and I had the good fortune to draw each other again, except through good luck or good shooting, we ended up taking the first place honors against Bobby V and Dale Gushman -- also from Ohio.

So, come on you bar owners, don't buck heads with each other if there is an open date close to the one you wanted in the first place. Find another one and let the players know. The shuffleboard grapevine is rapid-fire and it does work. You'll only be helping your own cause by bending *just a little bit*.
