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Bowers Rating System Works Well at Harvey's Place

As announced the end of last year's shuffleboard season at Harvey's Place, Street, Maryland, things would be different with the new season. Owner Harvey Comer has been striving for several years to improve the tournament format to promote The World of Shuffleboard and improve on his scheduling of events. After many trials and errors, it was rationalized that there was a difference in the skill and ability between players to the degree that the lesser skilled and ability players were staying away from the tournaments primarily because of cost (money) without a great deal of chance to participate in the rewards.

After many trials (and failures), it was decided to adopt the Bowers Rating System and use it as a handicap system. It was realized that this would not be met with a large approval from those with the most skills and ability (matter of fact, they felt they were being penalized). But the overall intent was to make a more level playing field. We did not want to exclude any participants, but we wanted to give the lesserskilled a better chance to compete. The system was designed that a team must have a total score (Bowers) System) of 2.00 to compete (no one excluded). In a doubles event, the (Bowers System) ratings are added together. The difference between the opposing teams is reduced to the nearest whole number and that result is the handicap, with a maximum of 5 points. (As a matter of fact, only once during the twoday tournament was a handicap of 3 points given -the rest were less.)

The result of this innovation was almost exactly what was anticipated. Players were not intimidated by the more skilled players and the atmosphere among the crowd was most pleasing. Obviously, when a change of this drastic proportion is made, many of the former players and potential new players stayed away with a "wait and see" attitude. The results were good and we believe we are on the right track. We intend to stay on this course and follow the schedule published in the October Board Talk.

Friday night's draw partner event of the Oct. 9-10 tournament was not up to the previous number of participants, but more than adequate to say it was successful. The participants agreed they liked the new format -- but were surprised that there weren't more handicap points between matches.

First place was won by Lindsay Hall, Baltimore, Maryland, and Billy Pollock, Philadelphia, Pa. Second place was won by Don Casula and Wendy Davis, both of Wilmington, Delaware.

Saturday was the scheduled bring partner event and again, participants stayed away for the same reasons. But we had enough to go on with the event using the handicap system. It was won by Jim McDaniel, Darlington, Md., and Faye Todd, Newark, Del., with the second place money going to Don Casula, Wilmington, and Herb Forster, Ridley Park, Pa.

Saturday night concluded with a draw partner event still using all four in-house boards. It was won by Gene Long, Lancaster, Pa., and Bob Overbay, Darlington, Md., with second place going to Dick Gorman, Wilmington, and Lindsay Hall, Baltimore.

Of course, our hosts, Darlyne Belcher and Harvey Comer, were up to their usual talents and were most gracious with their hospitality and open buffet for the participants.

Harvey Comer said: "I think we have found the format we want for good level playing field tournaments and we intend to stay with it."

They were on odds-on favorite; however, they didn't have a "lock" by any means, considering the field they were up against. Several of the best players from Southern California had shown up for this event now, and also for the singles games on Sunday.

Eddie had a couple of "belts" before the play began, just to "smooth him out" a little. Shelli frowned when she saw that, but she didn't say anything. The games went well for them, although initially Shelli had to carry most of the load. In the final game, they were matched against "Quickshot" Malone again, but this time he had his regular partner, "Fats" O'Brien. They were a very tough pair to beat.

On the final game, it came down to a tied score of 12 all. It was Quickshot's hammer and Shelli had left him with a clean board to lag on. The room was deadly silent now. He sized things up and then made a right-hand "Jersey" release. The weight looked perfect on its way down, and it came to rest in the middle of the 3 zone! There was some clapping beginning to start, but it wasn't over just yet. The weight was still spinning, and on the "high-end" board they were on, it spun back gently, and came to rest, just barely touching the 2 line!

With the score now 14 to 12, Fats, in an effort to put up a deep 1 for Eddie to lag against, went too far and it ended up a middle 2 on the left side of the board. There was no doubt what Eddie's task was now. He thought things over briefly and then shot the right hand. As predicted, it took out Fats' weight and slid over into the 3 zone. He was grinning a little as a cheer went up from the crowd. Also as predicted, Eddie took the singles event the following day. It was one of those days that he was so connected that the weights were merely "extensions" of his hands. He didn't have to think hardly at all about what he was going to do. He shot with "methodical magic," it seemed! He beat his final opponent, "Five Finger" Freddie, by a score of 15 to 11.

They were totally worn-out on the drive home, but there was a very wonderful and warm feeling between them. The whole thing was great -- so great! They took the next day off to rest, although Eddie had a little more than "resting" on his mind!

The weeks and months slipped by. They played mostly in the northwestern states when they went to the tournaments. Lil did most of her playing in the South and Midwest during those days, and they never did cross paths. However, it was now time for the Reno tournament.

Eddie and Shelli decided to take the four-hour drive up. They were making this their "vacation," and had also arranged for something else while they were in Reno. Eddie had finally asked Shelli if she wanted to make their arrangement a permanent one. Of course, Shelli very excitedly (and very passionately) accepted his invitation. They would be married right after the tournament was over.

It was time. The drive up was fine, except there was some snow when they got to the high mountains. It wasn't enough for chains though, and it made things really look beautiful. Lake Tahoe was especially nice, and their excitement levels began to rise the closer they got to Reno!

They arrived and checked into the Sands Regency. Fortunately, they had a very nice suite in the Towers, which was close to the elevator which led directly to the tournament rooms. There were hardly any people there yet, but Eddie decided he wanted to go down and check things out. Shelli said she wanted to clean up a bit and would be down later. She gave him an exceptionally long and passionate kiss before he left.

On the ride down the elevator, Eddie had mixed feelings. He was intensely anticipating looking at all those great shuffleboards and all the action that would soon take place, but he had another sort of

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premonition as well, and wasn't entirely sure what it meant.

The elevator came to a stop, and Eddie walked over to the entrance of the main room. They were setting up the boards, and he really started to get excited at seeing his "workshop" being assembled. Balboa Ron Inducted into Nevada Hall of Fame

"Balboa" Ron Schweikert was inducted into the Nevada State Shuffleboard Hall of Fame at Gabby's Saloon in North Las Vegas on Oct. 10, 1998.

Ron began playing shuffleboard in 1954 at the age of 19. He did most of his early playing at a bar called the "Club Balboa" in El Monte, California. Many of the top players in the nation would come to compete at the Balboa. These included the first inductee into the National Hall of Fame, Bob Miles; Al Stewart, Porter White, Billy Mays, Kid Spooks, Freddie "The Dane," Tommy Workman and Floyd Birch, to name a few. Many exciting, high-stakes games were held there among the best players of that day.

Ron's full-time shuffleboard hustling days were interrupted in 1958 when he started his 24-year career with the U.S. Army, the last 19 years as a pilot. He has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Aeronautical Science and a Masters Degree in Human Relations.

Ron has tried to promote our sport in many ways, including teaching newcomers whenever he can. His most significant contribution, however, is his continuing "Frisco Eddie" series which has appeared in The Board Talk for almost five years. "He writes with such sensitivity and knowledge that readers can relate to the thrills of victory and the agonies of defeat experienced by Frisco Eddie. There's not a single serious shuffler on our subscription list who wouldn't like to share Eddie's 'revenge," said George and Donna Wilber, Board Talk publishers.

This was our first induction and everyone had a great time. Our Hall of Fame President, Frank Zavala, was the Master of Ceremonies and gave a great speech. Jolene Lembke, president of the California Hall of Fame, also gave a nice presentation. Ron was very appreciative in his acceptance speech and stressed the importance of all of us to promote our sport in every way possible and to "bring shuffleboard back" to Las Vegas. Al Stewart: "I Played the Best in the World!"

I have played with or against all four World Champion shuffleboard players and I can't help but wonder how many othere people are out there who can say that.

The first world champion I played with was Kid Spooks. We played partners at the Dog House in Tujunga, California, in 1950. We won every game.

The second world champion I played with and against was Bob Miles. We played together for about 15 years at the Balboa Club. There was one trip Bob and I took to San Diego that I will never forget. I played Chris at the Two-Twenty-Two Club and lagged three hangers in one game. That was the last of three games we played. They would not play if Bob was in the game. Bob told everyone when we got back: "I was lagging deep ones since it was a 20-foot board. They stopped in hangers."

My third experience was when "Laggin' Leroy Waggoner" and I played Billy Mays and some guy at the Blue Star. We beat them, so he got "Long Beach Jim." We played for several hours. I think we came out one or two games up or down. This was in 1963 or 1964.

Now, my fourth and final is true -- but tricky. I played Darrol Nelson in 1988 at Beef's in Waterloo, Indiana, and I won! PLEASE, let me explain: Darrol and I were throwing weights back and forth on the 32foot board. Beef asked me to play him a game on the 22-foot board. He was shooting red and I was blue. Beef was ahead 11 to 5. The phone rang and it was for Beef. Beef asked Darrol to come over and finish his game. Darrol came over and asked what color he was shooting and, of course, I told him BLUE. I AM NO FOOL! I won.

As I was looking back at these games, I was very proud and thought I would share them with you. Is there anyone else out there who has played with or against all four World Champion shuffleboard players? We're glad we were there for at least one of those memorable experiences, AI (you did better playing than driving, as we remember). By the time we met you, you were already on our "side of the hill," with more talent in serving The World of Shuffleboard than beating the Champs. Consequently, we missed out on a lot of your long career and were thankful to Balboa Ron for sending us a tape of your induction into the California Hall of Fame, which gave us the opportunity to hear of your "prime time" escapades. We hope we get some responses to your letter. Not only would it be of interest to our readers, it would also be valuable to the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Board of Directors, as they gather material to preserve the history of our sport. See Glen's letter following...

Help Build the History of Shuffleboard

The National Hall of Fame has inducted three players this year, and I expect two more before the year '99 arrives. Hopefully, the next two will be Rod Cameron and the legendary "Little" Ray Harkness at the Houston tournament in December. They both played in the '50s, '60s and '70s. Rod has won two team events this year (he said: "I'm back!"). Rod and Ray were partners for years. During the '50s and '60s, they traveled across country. There were not many tournaments then, so they played for money, pleasure, or recognition only. A big "score" in the '60s was \$2,000; \$3,000 in the '70s, and \$5,000 in the '80s.

I was told of a match when Mel Currie of Canada walked Billy Mays and Truman Adams. He had them busted and T.A. owed him 10-12 thousand; he was winner of 30-40 thousand so the story goes. The next day, T.A. comes with the money. Billy tells T.A. to sit down and he'd win the money and that's what happened. Mel's big ego cost him at least \$40,000. He was broke and owed Truman. After the singles match, Billy said Mel lagged 34 fours in that match. I think it lasted over 20 hours. Maybe Jim Foran could give us all the information on that once-in-a-lifetime match. That story and many more.

I'm sure many could send in a story about the "old days," a certain match, or 30 hour matches. I have seen Bob Miles, Billy Mays, Leroy Ledford play for 30 hours. Leroy played in two of them. They played dead even. At the end of both events, they played 2 of 3 for \$500 and Leroy won both of them. This happened within a year or two. I got to see both of them. Leroy wouldn't play with me. He said: "No, you're a pro. I want those amateurs."

i played Ron Harralson for 20 hours at the Happy Hour in San Jose, California, in 1974. I was some ahead at the end of that 20-hour marathan.
