●150 players from 10 States at Texas Open/Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion ●\$65,000 Pot

Up until September 2, 1998, we thought Dallas was the headquarters for the Ewing Family's oil empire and their posh South Fork ranch was the place to party down. Pure fiction, we found out during our first visit there! Actually, it's shuffleboard -- not oil -that reigns supreme in Dallas, Texas, and the Harbor Point Sports Bar -- not South Fork -- is the place to party down.

Located in the suburb of Richardson, the Harbor Point, with host Greg Hixon and directors Bobby and David Williams, had 12 boards ready to welcome shufflers from 10 states to the 1998 Texas Open/14th Annual Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion Tournament. A total of 150 players participated in 10 events, vying for a share of the healthy \$65,000 pot.

It was an awesome experience and we are honored to be in such distinguished company as Rod Cameron and the late Earl Kelly. Thanks to all you big-hearted Texans who played a role in this. The plaque you presented to us is proudly displayed in our home-office.

Communication has been vital to the growth of our sport -- and that communication is growing, too, and going high-tech! You no longer have to wait for the "Pony Express" to deliver your Board Talk to get information about shuffleboard. The Bowers are on the internet and now joined by Eugene Peach (see Shuffleboard Directory for both) and The Shuffleboard Federation (see center-spread ad). We do not view this as *competition*, but rather *enhancement* of shuffleboard's communication system and urge you to use it.

We call your attention to Page 20 and request your input on the issue of whether a team should have to forfeit when members of that team fail to show up for the next scheduled match, or whether the captain should be allowed to replace the missing players with those of the same or lower ratings (by lower, we mean a 4 for a 3). This is not to say that the "vote" will prevail nationwide, but it will provide guidance to tournament directors in the future.

We heard some grumblings at the Texas Open/ Board Talk Reunion from those who "didn't know" the tournament might extend into Labor Day, even though the last event started on Sunday. The registration flyer clearly stated: Sept. 2-7. Tournament directors go to a lot of expense for advertising. READ THEM! WHOOPS! We can blame it on Ginkgo, which failed to keep us mentally alert; or those pesky computer gremlins that come out at night and enter/ erase/change our input; or on our own stooped shoulders and failing memories. We're afraid it's the latter! Our advice to you, Jerry, is not to waste time and energy worrying about those 18' board tournament promoters. There may be two reasons why they have opted not to catch up with Shuffleboard Today: (1) they can't afford to upgrade to the regulation boards, or (2) they have decided to stick with "tradition," according to their local players. Either way, they are going to lose out when it comes to becoming nationally-recognized as a tournament site and/or their players will have problems adjusting to regulation boards when they venture out into the "big time" tournaments. In the end, it's their decision and they'll have to live with it. If they're happy with that decision, who are we to judge?
