

Good-Bye to Denny....

A few months ago, Nebraska lost a very good friend. Most of you knew him; some of you didn't. For those of you who didn't know him, let me introduce you to Denny Busch.

Denny was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on Nov. 26, 1957. He then moved to Omaha with his family, Mom and Dad (Lil and Art), sister Vickie and brother Chuck, when he was seven. And then Denny became very active in sports, especially baseball.

After graduation in 1976, Denny joined the Navy and travelled the world. After his honorable discharge in 1980. Denny returned home and entered the wonderful World of Shuffleboard. In everything Denny did, he was very competitive and hated to lose. Denny was always a gentleman when he lost, which didn't happen very often. This is shown by his many accomplishments in his life. He had so many first and second place finishes in shuffleboard (approximately 30), there are just too many to name. One of his greatest accomplishments was when he was inducted into the Nebraska Hall of Fame in 1994. Denny also won the King of the Hill Tournament in Denver for three straight years. He was also Nebraska's only "pro." He was inducted into the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame in 1998. (See report on Page 16.)

As you can see, Denny had many accomplishments and I've only mentioned a few. But there was another side of Denny.

Old Town Saloon Hosts First Tournament



Winners of the women's singles were Beverly Chaffin (left), 1st place, and Sandy McQuillan, 2nd place.




Nick Chaffin (right) and Ted Fowler took first place in the open draw doubles.



Madge and I attended the Denny Busch Memorial Tournament in Omaha, Nebraska. Denny's Dad, Art Busch, and Joel Rahn finished second in the bring partner event. For a guy who's over 70, Art put on an exhibition for all of us. He lagged fours and threes most of the time when he needed it, along with combos and slides. Now we know where Denny got his talent. (See report on Page 14)

Denny was inducted into the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame on Friday, July 24, 1998. We had three speakers for Denny, telling of his accomplishments and friendships during his brief stay with us in The World of Shuffleboard. All members of the NSHF Board of Directors voted him in, so there are exceptions to the rule of 60 years old and above. At 40, Denny accomplished more than a lot of people ever do. He was a pro all the way and did, indeed, give something back to the game.

I'm looking forward to the Hall of Fame induction ceremony at Medford, Oregon, over the Labor Day weekend. Mike Kinney, one of the directors at Medford, came to the Southwest Open where he finished third with Darrol Nelson in the doubles. This will be the second Hall of Fame induction in the Pacific Northwest.

To date, California has three inductees in the NSHF (PeeWee Ramos, Bob Miles, Billy Chiles); Texas one (Earl Kelly); Oklahoma two (Bill Melton, Glen Davidson); New Jersey two (Mickey Mickens. Sol Lipkin); Michigan two (George and Donna Wilber), Nebraska one (Denny Busch); Pacific Northwest one (Jim Foran); Illinois one (Joe Abraham, who has been voted in by the board, but whose induction will be held in September). We pledged to get five each year, so we are not far behind schedule. Remember, these are NSHF inductees only; there are several others who have been inducted into their respective state halls.

Make it your goal in your area to get someone inducted NOW. All the folks who stand by and watch it happen better get aboard. We're rollin'!


Wayne McGuire and J.R. Lopez, both of Stober's, took fourth place.



There were so many bar owners and businesses that donated things, I would need a whole page to list all of them -- so a big thanks goes to all of you.




