



The hotel offered deluxe rooms, with breakfast buffet included, for \$49.95 and this year, Jack and Johnny added a free visit to the Hospitality Suite for any shuffleboard player or good-looking woman still standing after 2 a.m.

As promised, organizers Jack Scott and Johnny Ballard had "something for everyone" at the 3rd Annual Houston Holiday Open. Of the nearly 150 players who registered, 78 players were rated 3, 4 or 5. In 10 events held over five days, the casual, average players not only got to intermingle with top-notch pros, but were able to learn from and compete with them in events like the A-B-C Draw and the Bring 4-Person Team. And, guess what? Everybody seemed to have a good time!

On Saturday, Dec. 26, the tournament kicked off with two draw events. In the A-B (Pro-Am), the Dallas metroplex was "Boss" with David Williams of Ft. Worth and Lee Duncan of Dallas topping the field. Brother Bobby Williams and Mahlon Nobles from Arlington claimed second. Locals Diana Hagen and Marshall Partlow placed third, while locals Sylvia Martinez and Ann Walker finished fourth.

In the amateur division, the team of locals "Super Dave" Ramold and Pete Worsnop took first place. Local John Little teamed with Dallasite Jeff Womble for second; locals Wayne Hammond and Jeff Clark claimed third, while locals Lee Stout and Perla Scott came in fourth.


Day Two featured the ABC draw event, in which players of varying skill levels are paired on a three-person team. "A" players face off against "A" players, "B"s against "B"s, and "C"s against "C"s in a single game, double elimination format.

Bob Lewis from Arizona, Tony Pelton from Arkansas, and local Perla Scott claimed first place. Johnny Ballard, Nebraskan Terry Roberts and Morris Moss of Dallas took second. Pat Gainey from Austin teamed with locals Dave Ramold and Danny Norris to place third. Hall of Famer Glen Davidson from Oklahoma, Troy Thornton of Clear Lake, Texas, and local David Andrews claimed fourth place. Fifth and sixth places were shared by the teams of Eddie Woods of Ft. Worth, Jim McGee of Clear Lake and local Lynette Ammermann; Dallasite Bobby Wright and locals Tre Cameron and Clay Moore.

On Day Three, the four-person team events were held. The Pro Division (min. 5 points) saw the team of David Williams, Eddie Woods and Dallasites Gary Nelson and Key Nelson, battle into the wee hours

National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Celebrates 4th Anniversary

On Feb. 4, 1995, at the Pacific Coast Shuffleboard Association's Extravaganza VII in Las Vegas, an idea that had been brewing in the minds of serious shufflers across the nation for many years finally reached fruition. On that historic date, the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame was born.

The six volunteers who agreed to serve on the NSHF Board of Directors were: Glen Davidson, Oklahoma, president; Hal Perry, California, vice president; Bob Hunt, California, chief financial officer; Louise Freer, Pennsylvania, secretary; Larry Creakbaum, Indiana, and Jim Foran, Washington, directors. The purpose they adopted for the newlyformed non-profit organization was: "To serve the shuffleboard community with dignity, honor, and prestige in its quest to seek out and recognize excellence for all deserving participants in the world of shuffleboard."

Their goal for the first year was to make the necessary preparations in order to accept nominations for inductees into the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. Their beginning guidelines included submitting a petition with at least 20 names endorsing the induction of a person, a history of the nominee's accomplishments, and a list of reasons why the person should be inducted. The board literally begged for feedback and input from the shuffleboard community. You'd think, with a long-held dream finally becoming a reality, that would be an easy task. Not so! While there were financial contributions from a dedicated few, most either adopted a wait-and-see attitude or shared their ideas and concerns -- not with the board -- but with the guy sitting on the next bar stool.

By the end of its first year, the NSHF Board began getting a trickle of feedback and, based on that input, adopted a temporary "over 60" requirement at their second annual meeting in Vegas in February 1996. Once all the worthy individuals over 60 had been recognized, that requirement would be dropped.

A more controversial issue addressed at the second annual meeting was an application fee to accompany petitions for induction. The board based this requirement on two reasons: (1) an indication that the people who signed the petition were convinced that the person was worthy of induction, and (2) the need for raising money for a permanent home for the Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. No set fee was required --just a "small donation" along with the signatures. Some interpreted this fee as "paying your way into the Hall of Fame." Others thought it was appropriate.

First Hall of Fame Inductions

Despite the "growing pains" experienced by any new entity, the NSHF had inducted six people by the end of its second year: Bob Miles of Oregon, Mickey Mickens of New Jersey, Earl Kelly of Texas, PeeWee Ramos of California (all four deceased), Sol Lipkin of the American Shuffleboard Company, and Glen Davidson of Oklahoma (both alive and well). In July of 1997, the highly-regarded Bill Melton of Oklahoma was inducted, followed by the pride of Washington and the Pacific Northwest, Jim Foran, in August and The Board Talk Wilbers in November. In 1998, inductees included Billy Chiles of California, Denny Busch of Nebraska (both deceased) and the living legend Galen Gaunce of Oregon became No. 13 in the NSHF, followed recently by Rod Cameron and Ray Hartless of Texas.

"Grassroots" Provide the Strength

In her introductory column for the NSHF, Secretary Louise Freer indicated that the ultimate success (or failure) of the Hall of Fame would rest with the grassroots level of The World of Shuffleboard. Time has proven her correct. Slowly, but very effectively, state and area Halls of Fame are setting the pace for their peers across the nation. California, with its dedicated committee volunteers and a talented resource pool, has held classy inductions for seven people. Michigan has inducted five; the Evergreen Shuffleboard Association (Pacific Northwest) has inducted four and working on more; Texas has inducted five; Missouri, 2; Nevada, 1; Colorado, 1; Indiana, 1 with 2 on the horizon; Oklahoma, 3 or more. A tri-state committee of Maryland/Delaware/ Pennsylvania is listed in The Board Talk as the first area committee, but no inductions have been reported. Nebraska formed their Hall of Fame over 20 years ago and have inducted many worthy individuals.

What's the Next Step?

The NSHF has gone through the agony of birth, the crawling period, the first "baby steps" toward maturity. What now? Throughout these various stages, The Board Talk has supported them unconditionally. Now that it's four years old, we have some constructive (hopefully) ideas to share and hope the rest of The World of Shuffleboard will follow suit.

(1) We suggest that the board be expanded to 12 members, with broader geographic representation and tapping the active state (area) committee pool as a top resource.



We depend heavily upon our reporters. Without them, The Board Talk wouldn't be celebrating 15 years of service to The World of Shuffleboard! How well reporters cover events can attract participants and we'd like to help you do just that in the year ahead with a few hints:

- (1) If the host or director of your tournament isn't going to do the report, assign someone who will. Also, ask someone to take photos of the action.
- (2) Send in your reports as soon as possible after the event (reports must be received by the 15th of the month to be in the next issue). Tournaments are hard work and sitting down to write a report after it's over is the last thing you want to do, but if you wait a month or two, memory fades and "color" is lost; most important, your winners will be wondering why their names were not in the last Board Talk. We get a lot of reasons for late reports, mainly "we were waiting for the photos." Most towns and cities have a one-hour or next day service; don't wait until the end of the roll to get them processed.
- (3) Include **what** event, **where** it took place, **when** it happened, and **who** placed. Make sure you have names spelled correctly (people have a "thing" about their names) and include their location (they're proud of their home state/town). Sometimes we can check our mailing list for correct spelling and locations, but that takes precious time and, sad to say, not all winners are subscribers.
- (4) If you use photos (and we certainly encourage you to do so because it attracts readers and pleases winners), be sure to identify them on the back. Do not use color markers which can distort accompanying photos. The best method is to use "Post-It" notes. Avoid Polaroids if at all possible. They do not reproduce well and their size gives us fits for layout. Try for a light background and avoid mirrors.
- (5) Don't be shy about including your own observations/opinions/descriptions. This adds "color" to your report. Our procedure is to use by-lines for reports that meet that criteria; quotes for those that contain just a bit of that "color" and no by-lines for "straight" reports.
- (6) Read every tournament report in The Board Talk. Decide which ones attract and keep your attention, which ones make you want to attend their next event. Then, follow their examples.

We encourage you to clip these hints and keep

them near your computer, typewriter, pen and paper, wherever you do your reports. Help us help you!

Once again, we urge you not to just turn the page when you come to The Shuffleboard Directory, thinking it's just the same month after month. It contains important information about the businesses who serve The World of Shuffleboard. For example, our newest listing is Tex's Mecca Club in Sacramento, California, and note that the Houston Shuffleboard Community is already promoting their 1999 Holiday Open. We encourage you to patronize these businesses because, remember, they are supporting your communications vehicle with their advertising dollars.

- (2) Board officers should be elected annually in executive session by the board members.
- (3) Other than elections, annual meetings should be open with a "public comment" period for input from members of The World of Shuffleboard with an enforced time period. Those who do not wish to comment publicly should be able to submit written comments with name and address required. The time of the annual meetings should be at tournaments of the highest participation, i.e. The North American Championships in Reno, Nevada.
- (4) Any official actions by the board should be reported to The World of Shuffleboard, so that people who are not able to attend board sessions will be aware of any changes in the induction process.
- (5) State/area Hall of Fame Committees should have a process of communicating with the NSHF Board regarding their activities.
- (6) The NSHF should actively solicit promoters/ sponsors of an annual NSHF Tournament to raise funds for the building of a National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.
- (7) The NSHF should assign someone as an historian/collector of information and memorabilia to place in the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

We salute the NSHF board members for their time, dedication and fortitude during these past four frustrating years. You readers can reward them for their continued commitment by providing your ideas, nominations, and financial support for YOUR Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. Congratulations to the second place team of Chuck Muehlhauser, a veteran player, and Melanie Shipp, an up-and-coming shooter. They both made a fine showing.


Third place honors went to tournament coorganizer Pat Marshall and his partner, Robert Kazka.







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Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

A series by Balboa Ron Schweikert

(In last month's episode, after Eddie had rebuffed Lil's attempts to seduce him, Shelli paid a visit to Lil in her room. The two women, unknown to Eddie, set the record straight about the relationships.)

Eddie was really happy over the fact that (so he thought) Shelli knew nothing about his meeting with Lil. Shelli, on the other hand, was overjoyed, knowing that she had won two rounds in a row! She had Lil's verbal affidavit that there was absolutely nothing going on between her and Eddie -- and she had Eddie fooled into thinking that she knew nothing about Lil's propsed tete-a-tete with him in her room...and that she trusted him "without question." She knew that everything would come out in the open soon; but for now, she was on top of the world!

Shelli hadn't been in Reno since she was much younger, and really didn't know much about the city. They had discussed a possible plan for when they arrived, so after saying "hi" to a few of the players and workers that were there that early, they went to the main entrance of the hotel to catch a cab. Shelli figured that might be best, as they had both planned to have a few drinks. They had several hours before the Pro-Am event sale, and Eddie wanted to do a "bit" of gambling.

They had no trouble getting underway, as a cab was waiting for them right outside the door. Eddie told the driver that they were going to the Silver Legacy Hotel/Casino. It was only a short drive and when they pulled into the main entrance, Shelli said: "Wow! This really looks like a class act, honey!" It was a class act indeed. The hotel was only a couple years old and it was huge -- even by Las Vegas Strip standards!

They stopped at the first bar and ordered. Then, with drinks in hand, checked the casino out. In the center of one section was something pretty spectacular. There was a huge mock-up of an operational silver mine with a sky-dome roof. After looking it over for a moment or two, the whole thing came even more to life, with a dazzling lazer light and stereo music display. Shelli was really impressed.

After looking around a little more, they finally found the spot for their real purpose for being there. Eddie checked things out and then selected a seat at a \$25 minimum bet blackjack table. He sat at the far left seat, which is called "third base." There was only one other player at the table -- a rather pretty Oriental lady, and she was seated directly across from Eddie in the "first base" seat. She had some pretty good stacks of black (\$100) and green (\$25) "checks" (or chips) in front of her. As Eddie placed ten \$100 bills in front of the dealer, he asked if it would be alright if Shelli sat next to him as an "observer." The dealer said it would

be fine as long as the table didn't start to fill up. Shelli knew most of the basic strategy of the game, but she. was by no means a "hustler."

Now Eddie had studied and tried out several different blackjack "systems," including the world's best card counter, Kenny Austin, and a whole list of other published systems. Although he wasn't a professional, he was a pretty fair "card counter" and had a thorough knowledge of the strategy of the game. One time, he was even made an offer (through some guy he had met) to join a group of gamblers who practiced what is called "Shuffle-Tracking." That's where a team takes over the whole table, when multiple decks (usually four) are being used, and they're dealt out of a "shoe." It's a technique where they all work together to count, or "track" the cards. Eddie turned down the offer without giving it a second thought. He figured it would be pretty hard to live comfortably....if his knee-caps suddenly came up missing!

The play began. Eddie started by using a very simple system of Basic Strategy, coupled with an uncomplicated Money Management system, i.e., he started with the minimum \$25 bet, and each time he won, he increased his bet by one "check" or chip. When he lost, he went back to the original bet and started all over again. This was a type of play many non-professionals use because it's very simple, and you can relax while you're playing. Eddie appeared to be doing just that. He was chatting with Shelli, the dealer, the lady on the other end of the table, and was very laid back. He was also very cordial when he got the inevitable visit from the "Pit Boss" who shook hands and acted very friendly. Shortly after he got Eddie's full name, the chit-chat ended and he went right over to the private phone line in the pit and had Eddie checked out.

They were using two decks on Eddie's table, and although he appeared to be very carefree, he was actually keeping a very close watch on how "rich" (a large number of tens and face cards left in the deck) or "poor" (mostly low counting cards -- below 10, but not counting the eights) were left to be dealt. Eddie was doing pretty good with his amateur system and after 20 minutes or so was ahead several hundred dollars. He was really waiting for the right moment, though, when it was time to jack up the bet and give them a good hit or two -- and then run.

Eddie finally felt that the moment had arrived. The deck was over half-way dealt out, and it looked pretty good. He had six \$25 chips in the circle -- and then, just prior to the deal -- replaced them with five black chips. With this change in his wager to \$500, the

dealer was compelled to holler out: "money plays" to the pit boss. He took a glance at the table and hollered back: "deal." That she did, and the hand was on.

Now, the gal on first base was really sharp. When she checked her hand, she commented: "Whew -- finally!" as she looked at the dealer while dipping her hand slightly, showing a pair of tens before she buried them under her chips in the circle. The dealer's "up" card was a six -- which was excellent! Everything was going right on schedule, until Eddie squeezed his two cards apart. He was looking at a pair of eights! The two hands in blackjack that "almost" always had to be "split" were aces and eights.

Eddie followed form and placed the two cards face-up in front of him, along with another stack of five black chips behind the second one. He wasn't too concerned at this juncture, because he actually had a pretty good "proposition" bet going with that six the dealer was showing. The dealer touched his two cards then and rearranged the chips slightly as she said: "You splitting?" It was merely a formality and Eddie replied: "Yup." Shelli's eyes got a little wide when she saw the next card. It was another eight! The dealer had a slight smile on her face as she said: "Well, now, are we splitting again?" Eddie replied: "Let's do it," as he put up another five chips. A few passers-by had stopped now to watch the action as the dealer rearranged the three eights. Shelli had her hand on Eddie's leg and she squeezed his calf really hard when the next card came up. It was another eight!

Even the dealer shook her head a little now as she smilingly said: "Are we going all the way?" Eddie said: "Do I have a choice? Let's go." He only had two black chips left, so he made up the remaining \$300 with the green ones. He was sitting with four eights showing, and \$2,000 on the table! A small crowd had now gathered to watch the outcome of this very unusual hand of cards. The dealer said: "O.K., we're rollin'."

The first card out was a jack. Eddie felt comfortable with the 18 against the dealer's six up card and waved his hand horizontally to indicate he would stay with that hand. The second card was a king. Eddie had a little smile on his face now as he waved his hand for the dealer to go to the next card. Shelli's grip on his leg loosened a bit when the third card came up; it was another king! Eddie thoughtfully hesitated for just a second, then waved the dealer on to the fourth and last eight. The card came up a ten! He was sitting on four 18 count "pat" hands against a six showing. The Pit Boss was standing by now and even one of the cocktail waitresses had stopped to watch the action -- and they don't stop for anything!

Then a strange thing happened. The dealer naturally assumed that Eddie would "stand," so she began to reach down one hand to reveal her "hole," or

down card. Suddenly Eddie said: "Hold it!" Shelli's grip on his leg tightened again, as she excitedly whispered into his ear: "Hold it! Hold it for what? Have you lost your mind?!" The dealer (and everyone else present) gave Eddie and each other puzzled looks.

The dealer had a hint of a smile on her face as she lifted her free hand back up on the deck and said: "O.K. what do you want to do?" There was perfect silence around that table -- as they all waited for Eddie's response. Then everyone got a real "rush" when Eddie looked directly into her eyes, pointed his index finger at his last hand -- and calmly replied: "I want a card...hit the eighteen."

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
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
