Shuffleboard Communications Go Hi-Tech

We've come a long way since messages were sent via smoke signals! Telegraph, printed materials delivered by Pony Express and then the U.S. Postal Service, telephone, radio, TV -- each new method was heralded as the "ultimate" in communications. Then, along came the Computer Age and the Internet with a wealth of information at your fingertips with just the stroke of a few keys and a point of your "mouse" in the proper direction. This latest information delivery system is used not just by corporate executives in plush offices, but kids in classrooms, homemakers in their kitchens -- and in rapidly increasing numbers, shufflers across the U.S.A.

The name Bowers in The World of Shuffleboard has meant "that nice couple from Austin, Texas, who (with the help of their raters) compile and distribute the Bowers Rating System." Those ratings are now used by a majority of tournament directors from the East Coast to the West Coast and points in between in efforts to level the playing field and encourage expanded participation by beginning and lesser-skilled players. Several years ago, The Shuffleboard Federation, Inc. developed a handicap system and player ratings for its National Amateur Shuffleboard Leagues. They turned their list of 700 rated players over to Ron and Debbie Bowers and have since provided them with both financial and organizational support. The 1999 Bowers Ratings has 2,154 players listed.

More Than Ratings....

If you want to know how you are rated, log onto the internet: www.jump.net/~ronbowers. If you're not among the 2,154 rated players, ask who your area rater is, contact him/her and let them know you want to be on the next listing.

Thanks to Lynda French (respectfully and lovingly called "Webmaster" by Ron and Debbie) and husband

Tom (who has lost his wife to the internet), also of Austin, Texas, there is more information available on the shuffleboard web site than just the ratings.




SERVING THE WORLD OF SHUFFLEBOARD (from left) Ron and Debbie Bowers, Webmaster Lynda and Tom French.


Majestic Cafe's First Tourney is Big Success!


The whole day ran so smoothly, it's scary. Everyone seemed to have a good time. The games were 15 points, double elimination, and paying four places.




Capturing first-place honors was the team of Jeff Cottrell and Ady Hallgarth (current Michigan women's singles champ). The Majestic recently installed its second board.

\$UPER \$LAMMIN' \$UMMER \$UNDAY \$HUFFLEBOARD

Dennis Bittner of the Club Car Lounge in Durand, Linda Stober of Stober's Cocktail Lounge in Lansing, and Charlee Magoo of Majestic Cafe in Pontiac, are undertaking a cooperative shuffleboard effort this summer. The Super Slammin' Summer Sunday Shuffleboard, an idea formulated by Dennis, will consist of a series of three Sunday bring your partner handicap doubles at each of the three locations, with a play-off of the top 10 teams as a grand finale.

Entry fee for the single game, double elimination events is \$40 per team (\$5 of each player's entry for each of the three tournaments will be set aside for the play-off). Each team's handicap must total 2 or above (i.e.: -1 must play with a 3 or more, 0 with a 2, 1 with a 1, etc.), and you must keep the same team to qualify for the play-off (you may use subs if they are of equal or more rating). The 1999 Bowers Rating will be used. A committee has been assigned to determine ratings of those not listed.

Each tournament is limited to the first 18 teams signed up and paid. To save your spot, send \$120 for the first three events to tournament director Dennis Bittner, Club Car Lounge, 111 N. Saginaw St., Durand, MI 48429. (No partial payments!)

Points will be accumulated throughout the series of three (18 for first, 17 for second, etc.) and the top 10

teams will be eligible for the play-off (ties also eligible). There will be a \$40 per team entry fee for the play-off. That entry, plus a sponsor sale, and the \$5 set-aside from the previous three tournaments should make a good-sized pot.

The first in the series will be held on July 25 at Stober's Cocktail Lounge (two boards), 812 E. Michigan Ave., Lansing; the second on August 15 at Majestic Cafe (two boards), 156 Oakland Ave., Pontiac; the third on Sept. 5 at Club Car Lounge (three boards), 111 N. Saginaw, Durand. The play-off will be staged at the Club Car on Sept. 26. All events will start with a 12:30 p.m. sharp sale and play immediately following.






Congratulations to Mike Simpson and Connie McCall in the first pairing of this I-44 long-distance duo.

Now, to the real action.... Friday night's draw partner, which drew 46 shooters, had some very interesting match-ups, with five boards going at all times.





Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

(In the last episode, Lil's and Eddie's teams were in the final game of the Pro-Am event in Reno. The score was 12-13 in Lil and her partner's favor. Lil was shooting the final weight and it looked like the 2 she needed to win. One of the very interested spectators was Dollar Dan -- the Money Man, who had earlier sent a warning to Eddie.)

Just an instant after someone had hollered out, "She made it...she lagged a deuce" on Lil's lag, it suddenly slowed very slightly, and her hammer made contact with the left side of Eddie's weight, which was positioned in the 2-zone, but barely touching the 1line, and about 6 to 8 inches off the left rail. As a result, the two weights split, leaving both of them in the 2-zone -- and so evenly matched that no one could visibly tell exactly which weight was in front! Lil's weight was also partially hanging off the left side of the board.

The call went out for an official after it became obvious that it was too close to determine who was ahead any other way. The crowd was busy speculating now as to who was closest to the end of the board. Dollar Dan -- the Money Man -- was starting to form a look of concern on his face when he saw the lie on the board. Lil looked over at him and they made eye contact. It was now Lil's turn to get a little gleam of satisfaction in her eyes as she watched Dan and his "Ape Man" start to sweat a little when the official (along with Max Dermmot, the tournament director) entered the scene to make the official call on these two weights.

The official took extreme care with his T-square as he made the measurement. There was a hush now while they all awaited his call. Finally, he shook his head, looked at Max Dermmot, then at the crowd, and announced: "These weights are even. I call it a tie. There will be no score for this frame -- and the hammer will be switched. Play will resume on this end of the table."

After hearing that, Eddie had a big smile on his face, and Lil had a hint of one on her face, too. The opposite was occurring on the other end. Dollar Dan, the Money Man, was audibly complaining about the call. He was hollering out: "The blue (Eddie's weight) is ahead; the game is over!" He continued with his antics until Max Dermmot came over to him and the Ape Man, and simply told him to "shut up!"

Things happened pretty quickly then. First, the Money Man responded with "Up yours, Director Man." Upon hearing that comment, Max laid his glasses on the table and replied: "Dan Goldman (he knew his real name) -- you and your Ape are out of here...Now!" Then, just about the time the Ape Man started to

make a move toward Max, a strange thing happened. The same scar-faced man (who worked for Lil's ex, Tony and who had almost blown Lil and Eddie's friend, Tim, away in Seattle) appeared right behind Dollar Dan. He softly whispered something into Dan's ear. He had two other men with him, and then almost like magic, the whole thing was over! Dollar Dan and his Ape Man allowed themselves to be quietly escorted out of the tournament room.

No one (except Lil and Eddie) understood what was going on, but when Max saw that all was clear, he picked up his glasses and announced: "The official has made his ruling. Let the play resume!" Lil, Shelli and Eddie looked at each other then with twinkles in their eyes. The good thing was that the physical threat had been removed, which was a relief to all of them; but almost as good was the fact that the ultimate fate of the game was probably taken out of Lil and Eddie's hands! The weights were now under the control of the two "3" rated players and Eddie's partner had the hammer due to the switch.

The play got underway rather quickly now that the excitement settled down. It was obvious that the lessexperienced players were very nervous, and understandably so. They knew they had been close to a potentially dangerous situation, plus the outcome of the whole event was on their shoulders. They actually played pretty good, though, in spite of things. The frame went weight for weight. Eddie's partner hit-andwent on this third weight, which left the board open.

Lil couldn't restrain herself from hollering out to her partner at this point: "Try for a short deuce, or a deep one in the center, but don't go too deep so he can stick it. O.K.?" Her partner had a look of confusion on her face as she let her weight go. The weight ended up being a deep one, with the forward edge touching the 2-line and about 3 inches off the left side of the board. Lil hollered out once again: "That's fine, dear, this guy will never lag the deuce!"

Now it was time for Eddie and his partner to figure out their strategy. They met at the center of the board, which was the proper place for their discussion. Eddie again looked him in the eyes and asked: "How do you feel, Champ?" The reply was: "Really shaky. I'm nervous as hell!" Eddie solaced him by saying: "This isn't really too critical, you know. Almost anything you do will be O.K. as long as you don't boost her into a two or something. You do whatever you want to do. The only thing I'd suggest you be careful of, is making contact with her weight up there. O.K.?" He patted him on the shoulder then and said: "You're going to do alright, partner. Just try to relax and you'll do fine."

The shooter was really sweating now as he prepared to make his release. He shot almost all right-handed, so he decided to go down the right rail and try for a deuce or a three in the center of the board. It was a very jerky release, and he instantly knew he had gone too far to the left. In fact, his weight had actually become a right-cross. He yelled out: "Oh, no -- don't do that!"

His weight proceeded, though, and did indeed connect with the other weight. He not only hit the other weight, he boosted it......

Teacher/PromoterYank Inducted in Pennsylvania Hall of Fame

In ceremonies conducted at J & C's Tavern in Philadelphia, friends, admirers, and family gathered to pay tribute to the first inductee to the Pennsylvania Shuffleboard Hall of Fame: Jim Yank Sr. Not only was Jim the first inductee, he was also the first inductee in what some might say to be the most important category -- that of teacher/promoter. He's been a well-known mainstay in the Philadelphia shuffleboard scene for many, many years. Quite a number of people gave testimony to Yank's accomplishments as a player as well as a person, and most were his students at one point, proving that this honor was indeed well-deserved. This is his story....

Learning the game of shuffleboard did not come easy for Yank. He started throwing weights in 1969 in various southwest Philadelphia taverns and clubs. Jules, now better known as Yank, learned the game by trial and error for the next eight years. In 1977 he joined the Southwest Shuffleboard League as a player for the Barrel Inn. There he continued to take his lumps and learn valuable lessons from the area's best shooters.

In 1981, Yank started spending time at J & C's Tavern and began a new way of playing the game. This new method was a teaching format that advocated equal opportunity for all players, both male and female (he became an avid supporter of women shuffleboard players way back in 1977). Yank believed that players should share their knowledge and experience, and that all players deserved respect. These concepts have not been evident in all the years he had been playing -- and probably had not been long before his time. So Yank spent most of his time working with players, showing them the basics, teaching strategy, and advocating respect for all players. It was a playing and teaching method that was not especially well-received by the older, better established players who felt Yank was taking away their "easy money."

Within a short time, the program had established itself as a winning formula. His ideas were promoted nationally with the article "Give the Novice a Break" published in The Board Talk. Again, his ideas were met with quite a bit of suspicion, but also a lot of praise. Under Jim's tutelage, the program really took off in the next 15 years.

Several dozen people taught under the original system continued to perpetuate Yank's format by teaching the game to hundreds of novice players. It continued to prove to be a winning formula as evidenced by the players taught and the championships won (30 or more league championships and 15 All Star victories in eight different leagues). Jim started promoting and attending tournaments as early as 1985, and got players from the Philadelphia and Delaware County leagues to re-enter the tournament scene, and his format proved to be successful on a regional and national basis as well. Yank has also set up and maintained the boards for every national tournament on the East Coast in the late '80s and early '90s.

To this day, Yank continues his mission, answering any and all questions asked of him, and goes out of his way to teach the basics of the game to anyone interested in learning and/or getting better at shuffleboard. He has been consultant to presidents from five different leagues and is known as "the goodwill ambassador of the East." He believes in the premise that the game comes first, leagues and tournaments are second, your team is third, and yourself and ego are last. Yank's only reward for his efforts is when he sees other players that have been taught the game teach someone else who wants to learn. Most days, this is what you will find Yank doing: teaching a new generation about shuffleboard.



Florida Open Organizers Repond to Critics

"Southern" and "Hospitality" are words that belong together. Any time a visitor to the South experiences other than friendship and hospitality, the host has broken a tradition and should be embarrassed. The Florida Table Shuffleboard Association (FTSA) is embarrassed. I and other members of the FTSA apologize.

Since we agree that our guests were not given the food, beverage prices, and friendliness by the establishment, we have little rebuttal to some of our New York friends' letters. However, our personal contacts with those players attending the tournament from Maryland, Michigan, and New York had only good things to say about the tournament and the way it was conducted. Their complaints were directed at the "host establishment" and believe us when we say we will correct the situation.

The Florida Open Tournament does not have a home. Acquiring an establishment with the facilities to hold our tournament has always been one of our problems. The establishment we selected had committed to coffee and pastries for our players and their guests each morning, with a full meal on Saturday. We had also been given the assurance that drink prices would be \$2.00 for beer and \$1.00 for cokes with standard prices for sandwiches. In exchange, the monies derived from the sales and sponsor fees would be income to the "host establishment."

The FTSA was surprised and embarrassd when the host establishment did not honor its agreement.

Two points of clarification. The 12 sponsors identified at the tournament were not donors of \$75 each. They were recognized as sponsors for their contribution of services and/or donations. I was identified as a sponsor for the work I did in resurfacing one of the boards. The motel, which gave a discount to our out-of-town guests, was also identified as a sponsor. The monies from this went to the host establishment, not the FTSA.

On the subject of food and parking campers. The entry fee into our tournament does not include any registration fee or deductions from the prize funds for the expense of the tournament. We rely on the generosity of the host establishment for free food and space for campers (if there is space available). We recognize that most tournaments provide one or more of these attractions. Players should not look upon these as something they are due, but rather should extend their appreciation to the host for their gift. Every attempt will be made to provide these services next year at the Florida Open.

Most travelling shufflers are mature enough to realize that any "discomfort" they might experience is due to the host establishment and not the event organizers. As tournament organizers ourselves, we can attest that the host establishment can "make or break" an event and thankfully, most of them fit in the "make" category. You should realize that most of the complainers haven't been in your shoes and so you have to measure the criticism accordingly. We have talked to

2nd Memorial Tourney Would Make Denny Proud!



First place went to veteran player Ron Campbell and first-time winner Sue Webster.







Third place went to the team of Bob Crum and Manny.



On Wednesday evening, the ever-popular ABC event got underway and concluded on Thursday night.


