
Congratulations to Pete O'Neill and Lonzo Knight for repeating as open doubles champs. They are a tough team to beat and they will defend again next year





# As The Puck Turns..... By George & Donna Wilber

Upcoming Events (continued on Page ?) -- that gives you just a clue about our April issue, a publishers nightmare! We're certainly not complaining about the biggest issue in 15-1/2 years -- 36 pages and seven inserts. However, it does make for some big adjustments when you're set up for 28 to 32 and have to change page numbers and make sure your continuations indeed continue on the appropriate pages (instead of having a story starting on Page 24 that continues on Page 7, which is not acceptable)! Yes, we can handle those kinds of challenges. It's when our seven-year-old laser printer starts to moan and groan and finally guits entirely on deadline day that we get a little whiney. The repairman's estimate that it would cost \$400 and two weeks to get the relic going again was not acceptable either, so we get a loaner. Works good, except when it comes to printing mailing labels, which it does one to a sheet of 30 -also not acceptable. Back comes the repairman, a different one this time, and after a costly three hours of wrestling with the antique computer, finally gets our labels run. With a lot of prayers and a minor miracle, we got the issue to the Post Office on target.

Once it gets to the Post Office, it's out of our hands. The bulk mailing permit we have (and can afford) doesn't carry a next day service. We received a complaint from California that it takes three weeks for delivery. On the other hand, we received a note from an Arizona subscriber who received his April issue on April 2! Can't complain about that!

Occasionally, subscribers who get discouraged about late delivery suggest we "upgrade" to first-class and charge subscribers accordingly. First, we wouldn't know what to charge per year because the weight varies from a regular 28-pager to a 36-pager. Second, most subscribers wouldn't be willing to pay the added cost. Third, it would take us manpower we don't have to separate the mailings between first-class and bulk rate, even if there are those willing to pay the price.

The staff at the Lansing Post Office is very efficient and accommodating and we know it leaves here in a timely fashion. Therefore, the problem lies somewhere between here and your house. With bulk mail, it is allowed to "sit" at each postal station along the way for 72 hours, but no way should that add up to three weeks! We can't guarantee it will help, but it

sure wouldn't hurt to talk to your local post office or mail carrier if you're having problems with delivery.

We continue to urge you to promote your events early so even though it takes a week to 10 days for delivery, your target audience still receives the news in time to make plans to participate!

You've heard the old saying: "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make it drink." Sometimes we feel like: "You can deliver information, but you can't make them read!" Here are some examples:

- (1) After nearly three years, some subscribers still send mail to our old address, which delays delivery and sometimes misses a deadline.
- (2) After 2-1/2 years, some subscribers still send renewals in at the old \$15 rate.
- (3) Even though, every month, we tell subscribers they must let us know when they move, we still get letters requesting the issues they missed because they failed to notify us.
- (4) There are still a few tournament promoters who fail to remember the deadlines for each issue: information must be received by the 15th of the month to appear in the next issue. For example, information for the May issue must be received by April 15, etc.

Lest this sound like a "bitch" column this month, let us end on a positive note....

#### A Tribute to Don Valk

I had the honor of saying a few words about a very good friend of mine who was inducted into the Texas Shuffleboard Hall of Fame during the Texas State Shuffleboard Championships held in March in Houston: Don Valk. I first met Don in 1988 when I started playing shuffleboard at a little shuffleboard bar called the Horseshoe in Austin, Texas, although I had seen him previously at his U.S. Open Tournaments in

Austin. At that time, the U.S. Open was held as one of several sporting events associated with the 10-day Austin Aquafest Festival, a festival noted for arts, crafts, music, boat races, etc.

Here was this big, somewhat overweight, guy dressed in a white uniform, as if he were a captain of some cruise ship that just docked, directing and playing in a table shuffleboard tournament. I asked Connie Cuyler, an observer at the tournament, where they played in Austin. She responded: "The Horseshoe." And that is where I met Don and several of the local players, vis., Connie, Johnny Ballard, Jim Grove, Don Gunter and wife Sheila, Bill Moody, Joe Rodin, Greg Tedford, a wild-thumb shooter named Lucky, and a couple of San Antonio people, Brenda and Terry Moore. They all said the same thing about Don: "He's good and he will never cheat you; he is straight as an arrrow." Good thing, because Don, proudly donning his U.S. Open armadillo logo on the back of his shirt, would occasionally talk about his two friends, "Snake" and "Whip." Now, having recently met Don, a person should begin to wonder about associating with a new acquaintance who has friends referred to as "Snake" and "Whip."

It was through Don that during the summer of 1988 I met and played with the likes of Rick Boyer, Earl Kelly, John McDermott, Billy Mays, Frank Blade, all of whom spent a few days in Austin playing at the Horshoe (except for Rick who decided to stay more than just a few days). Of course, I wasn't very good, didn't win very much no matter what player drew me. I wasn"t accustomed to losing, hated to lose, but I hung in there.

Don must have figured out that I was really interested in shuffleboard because it was Don who took me around and showed me the mechanics of cleaning and leveling boards and setting up qualifying tournaments for his U.S. Open tournament. It was Don who taught me shuffleboard etiquette and showed me basic shuffleboard shooting techniques, how to dust boards and set up brackets. Yes, I have to blame Don for getting me hooked on this game, but I attribute much of that to the very professional and dedicated manner in which he always approaches the game. Don was very enthusiastic and energetic about his U.S. Open tournaments. I guess that was why it was a pleasure for me to be able to help out in his tournaments in whatever capacity I could.

These were the years before Don and Linda tied the knot. Don struggled at the shuffleboard sometimes as I recall, keeping one eye on the board and the other on Linda. I'm sure they remember those days, too. Seven years ago last October, Don and Linda took off for Reno to get married. As the story goes, this event was supposed to be a well-kept secret but everyone in Austin knew about it. When they returned from their honeymoon, every one in

Austin played along with the hush-hush thing and acted dumb and surprised that they finally got married.

Of course, knowing Don for only 11 years, I wasn't able to talk about any of his shuffleboard war stories of his earlier years, but I do know that he was largely responsible for getting leagues going and keeping shuffleboard alive in the Austin-San Antionio-Canyon Lake area.

Yes, sir, Donald P. Valk, it's been my pleasure to have known you. You certainly deserve the recognition for your integrity, contribution and dedication to the game of shuffleboard. Again, welcome to the Texas Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

# New Yorker Disappointed with Florida Event

He also wanted to charge the guys who came in RV's to park in his lot. He said the lot was for his regular customers.

Well, he should never have had the tournment in the first place!

## Shooter's Tournament Exceeds Expectations



Somehow, I can see him now smiling down on us and saying: "PeeWee and I will meet you at the gate. We'll start off for \$100 an end." PeeWee will say: "Make it \$50 an end; we don't want to scare them off." PeeWee always had to have the last word.

Don Valk of Austin was inducted into the Hall of

Fame at the Texas Championships in Austin. He ran the U.S. Open there for almost a decade. He finally retired a few years back after a heart operation and is looking pretty good on the boards again. We say thanks to Don for his dedication and hard work he did organizing and promoting the big tournaments in Texas at the time. Thanks to Linda for looking after him all these years, too. She should get a medal for that!

I'll be heading to Little Rock, Arkansas, for their tournament at the VFW that Tony Pelton has organized and promoted. Then I'll go to Bourbon, Indiana, for the Hall of Fame induction of Larry Creakbaum and Jim Long.

## Frisco Eddie's Revenge: The Return

(In last month's episode, just before the playoff between Eddie's and Lil's teams in the Pro-Am event, Shelli was given a note warning her to tell her man: "I will not accept second place." It was signed "D.")

After looking at the note that Shelli handed them, Lil exclaimed: "Why, that S.O.B.! He's trying to blackmail you here with this threat! I called Tony, but he just said he'd look into the matter.' What I want you guys to do now is stall this thing for a few minutes, and let me try to contact him again. This changes the whole picture, and I want to let him know that so he can get some backup for us -- right now!" Eddie said: "I'm with you, kid. Get going and we'll take care of things on this end."

Eddie had a little bit of trouble trying to stall things off until Lil returned. The players (and the crowd) were anxious to get going. Just as he was going to make an attempt to dream something up, he noticed that Lil was coming through the door: "No problems, Max -- we're ready to start." He said "O.K." but he remained in the area until things got rolling.

Lil had just enough time to say to Eddie: "Thank goodness, I got through. He said for all of us to be careful, and that he would have his people take care of this business. He said no matter what, for us to stay with the crowd here in the main room for better security, and for everyone to shoot their best, and not worry about that message that Dollar Dan gave us."

And shoot their best they did. Both teams were putting on a splendid performance. All the games were very close and the crowd was loving it! Lil's team won the first series, but it was very close, with a 9 to 5 game finish. They were jumping with joy because had they lost that one — it would have been all over since they had come from the losers bracket. The two teams were now tied in the final series, and the deciding game was in progress. The next couple of frames would determine the first and second place finishers in the whole event.

On one end of the table were a pair of "3" rated players and on the other end were none other than Frisco Eddie and Long Beach Lil. The score was 12 to 13 in Lil and her partner's favor. Eddie's partner had the hammer and the frame went weight for weight. Lil's partner had to shoot against a deep 1, in the center of the board, with her last weight. She looked at Lil for advice and Lil responded with: "Don't worry about sticking -- just make sure you get that weight off the board, O.K.?"

Lil's partner followed the advice and put plenty of speed on her weight, and made the shot, but it was a "hit and go." Now it was Eddie's turn to comment. He met his partner at the center of the board, and asked him: "How do you feel, Champ?" He replied: "Pretty damn shaky right now!" Eddie said: "O.K., don't worry. You can try for a lag, but the most important thing is to make sure you keep the weight on the board so Lil doesn't get a free hammer out of this." "I'll do my best, Eddie," was the reply. Eddie looked him in the eye then and said: "That's all I can ask for, partner. You'll do fine."

He took his time on the open board lag. He released a right cross, which turned out to be a deep 1. It was now 13 all, with Lil's hammer! They traded weights. Eddie went deep, so she couldn't try to hide one on him. Lil hit-and-went on her third weight. Eddie knew that her favorite lag was the right cross, so he measured his shot very carefully, and put up a right cross of his own, which settled into a real deep 1, about a quarter of an inch from being a 2, and about six inches or so off the left rail.

The crowd was really keyed up now, in anticipation of Lil's shot. Just as she was sizing things up for a free hander, something happened. Two men had muscled their way in front on the other end of the table. One was the Ape-man and the other was Dollar Dan -- the Money Man!

Lil's eyes locked with Dollar Dan's for several seconds. The looks were remarkably intense. Lil shifted the hammer to her right hand then. There were basically three options open to her now. 
## Millar/Martin Back on Top at Old Edison Inn




Mike "Sleepy" Waters of Tahuya and Jackie Anderson of Shelton took third place.






