Hot Summer Action on Michigan Boards **Hoosiers Sweep First Super** Shufflers Honor Memory of Slammin' Summer Tourney **Rudy Stober**

The first in a series of three Michigan Super Slammin' Summer Sunday Shuffleboard tournaments was held at Stober's Lounge in Lansing on July 24-25. A first-time cooperative effort between three locations -- Stober's, Majestic Cafe in Pontiac and Club Car Lounge in Durand -features a doubles (handicap must total 2 or more) on Sunday and an open singles. Only those teams that signed up and paid for the series of three are eligible for a play-off on Sept. 26 at the Club Car.

There were 12 teams in the doubles and 17 players in the singles for the first in the series and it was Mike Koontz and Dennis Kinsey of Bourbon, Indiana, who shared top honors in both events.







AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE TO OUR ADVERTISERS AND SUBSCRIBERS

As the Puck Turns By George & Donna Wilber

We have been receiving many expressions of concerns regarding our desire to retire as publishers of The Board Talk. First, let us assure you that we are very serious in our quest to find a replacement that shares our commitment and dedication to the sport of shuffleboard. They will have the same philosophy of service to our advertisers and subscribers that has marked our efforts throughout the past 15-plus years.

However, we will also strive to be fair to the incoming publishers by making this publication a healthy one which will not have to be subsidized. That simply is not good business practice and we have not done very well in that area. In preparation for a transfer of ownership, we've been taking a good, hard look at income and expenses and the bottom line put up a red flag of warning. For example, when our printer broke out the various expenses at our request, we found that we have been paying **substantially** more for a 11 X 17 flyer than we were charging for it!

The first thing a new publisher would have to do is increase prices and cut costs — the only way possible to continue bringing you news and views and advertising messages each month. That would likely result in a loss of good will toward the new owners and that's simply not fair. Therefore, we will do it ourselves:

(1) Effectively immediately, only those photos which are sharp and clear will be accepted. Last month, we had so many poor-quality photos that our printer technicians spent 11 hours overtime working to make them reproduce in acceptable form (very costly!).

(2) **Effectively immediately,** if you missed an issue because you failed to let us know of your change of address (form on back page of every issue), or if you failed to respond to your red checks and you have been discontinued, you will need to send \$1.50 each for any missed issues you want sent.

(3) Effectively immediately, if you are on our comp list for past contributions to the current publishers, you will receive a red check and will be expected to become a paid subscriber.

(4) Effective Jan. 1, 2000, subscription fees will be increased to \$25 a year (\$30 for Canadian). One-year subscription renewals will be accepted at the current price until Dec. 20, 1999, whether your subscription has expired or not.

(5) Effective Jan. 1, 2000, advertising rates will be as follows: 8-1/2 X 11 single flyers, \$100 (same as current); 11 X 17 double flyers, \$250; full-page ads, \$145 (10% frequency discounts to monthly advertisers); half-page ads, \$85; quarter-page ads, \$50; Shuffleboard Directory, \$100 per year for single space, \$150 for double space (same as current); classified ads, \$7 for 25 words or less per month.

(6) "Play Your Way Across the U.S.A." -- Last year, we reduced the publishing of the *quarterly* listing of the locations which are Board Talk subscribers to an *annual* listing because of the cost, which we were absorbing, and because so many locations were not responding to their red checks. Since then, we have had many requests to return to the quarterly publication of the list which travelling shufflers use on a regular basis. We will return to the quarterly publication **if** we can find sponsors for the list: \$200 (cost of printing only -- not insertion or postage charges) will give you the cover advertising space.

We hope these changes will not be too painful when you consider the alternative -- no publication at all. And we hope you will extend the same friendship and loyalty to the new publishers as you have to us. We are NOT exiting the scene immediately -- only when we find the "right" replacements.






The Tournament of Champions is not a "big" tournament by today's standards, but it is significant for several reasons. First, the payout... Now, don't laugh, but it's true that prior to this tournament, you could play all night Friday and half of Saturday and if you won first, you got maybe a \$70 payout. After you split with your partner and deduct "expenses," you lost money! Well, this tournament changed all that. The money was bigger and it was winner-take-all.

Second, participation was limited to eight teams, double elimination, so we could usually finish up in an evening.

Third, and probably most important, the winners get their names and the date permanently etched into the big plaques on the wall for all to see.

Also, this tournament has a distinctively local flavor (who's going to go out of their way for a one-board tournament anyway nowadays?). So, we don't advertise these tournaments, but they are significant to the local community.






A couple of confident veterans, Jerry Hershman and O.B. Brimm, both of Pontiac, had to settle for second.

More Notebook

Dick Responds to Frank on Use of Other's Weights

This is in response to the August 1999 letter from Frank Bentley of California regarding common courtesy and rules in present day shuffleboard competitions.

I am all for courtesy, but sometimes it is only in the eye of the beholder. I don't know how much Frank has traveled around playing this game, but those who have will tell you the rules vary greatly around the country and from bar to bar. Here on Long Island, there is not a single place where you would be allowed to place any wax, at all, on the board after the game has started. You also would not be allowed to walk down to check out the position of your weight, nor could your partner advise you of this or even tell you what shot he might think you should take. These would be considered serious offenses here and yet in most of the country exposed to Federation rules and tournaments, these are common courtesies, by way of rules, and taken for granted.

I was recently upstate New York to a tournament where, during the round robin warm-up matches, I asked to use the weights of my local opponent. I was denied the use of his weights. I have seen this rule both ways, so I checked with the officials and was told this was their rule. I should have gone and gotten my old set of SunGlos out of my car as board conditions were lightning fast. I didn't and lost 15 to 1. Later I had the reverse request from another local opponent and I invoked their rule and won 15 to 1. I played by the rules and the weights made a big difference in both games.

Today's turnaments are no longer just friendly games for a beer, ten dollars, or a trophy. They are for thousands of dollars to the potential winner and their sponsor sale backers. The top players come with many sets of weights and they mix and match their sets to board conditions. They might choose two fast and two slow weights from different manufacturers to play with. They switch tops in seconds so there is no guarantee of borrowing a "similar" four weights anyway.

Do tournament golfers have to let their opponents use their clubs or tournament bowlers their various balls to adapt to lane conditions? Of course not! The same should be the rule at shuffleboard tournaments.

The only way you could avoid this would be to force all players to use the house-provided weights. We all know house weights are not always up to par, as well as many players prefer a particular brand of weight. You might use this for the 3's and up who generally don't own their own set of weights.

Finally, I believe players should adapt to the rules of the house. People then voice their opionions and, as a result, the rules will change from place to place and from time to time. As Bobby Dylan once crooned: "The times they are a-changing."

First place went to the powerful team of Rick Gindt and Tina Olson, both from Washington.




Russ and Sue Miller of Washington took second place honors.






