Tourney Talk

Tournament play for the 1983 season was wrapped up in November with four tournaments.

The Wintergarden Cafe opened up the month with a bang, using a free breakfast promotion to attract 19 teams. Junior Lopez and Lee McDonald of Lansing took first; Mike Ruby and O.B. from Pontiac took second, and Bud Broka and John McDermott of Detroit finished third. The Wintergarden tourney featured four teams making their first appearance in competition. Congratulations to all you first-time participants.

Jim Fetzer, owner of A.J.'s Saloon, Pontiac, the most recent addition to a growing list of tournament sponsors, took advantage of a two-week layoff from league play for deer season to hold two tournaments, a singles and a doubles. Bud Broka and John McDermott of Detroit won the doubles. Two local players, Gary Giegler and Richard Fabijanski, took second in their very first tournament. Congratulations! Junior Lopez and Lee McDonald of Lansing placed third.

The singles tournament competition was won by John McDermott of Detroit; Neil Fetter finished second and Jim Fetzer took third.

The final tourney of the year was at Stober's Lounge in Lansing on Thanksgiving week-end. Friday afternoon featured two matches between Lansing and Indiana with Lansing winning the first 5-2 and the second 5-4. Jim Long and Jerry Knox of Indiana won the doubles tourney. Junior Lopez and Lee McDonald of Lansing finished second, and Phil and Lenny McCrue from Toledo placed third.

"You mean that's all the president does," yet another question came.

"Yes," I chuckled. "The players and captains make the rules and really, they have the biggest imput and that's the way it ought to be."

"Wow, maybe I should run for the office if there's nothing to do," the guy guipped.

When I told him about the petty little things that go on during league matches and at meetings, he couldn't believe me.

"Well, I thought it was just a fun game," he said.

"It's supposed to be," I answered.

"But how come, whenever I watch two teams play, there always seems to be so many disagreements? After all, it's just recreation, isn't it?"

I agreed. Yes, shuffleboard is supposed to be fun but the enjoyment of the game has often turned into grudge matches for some teams who load up just be beat the other. I have played a lot of sports but have never been involved in such a simple game where at times you become part of arguments and even make enemies. I asked a veteran shuffleboard player why he thought a lot of the fun was gone from the game.

"I think the case is that when one team dominates the league for so many years, it creates an air of jealousy and other teams, tired of losing, go out and pick up the best players they can to try to beat that other team. It's like the Yankees. They win and win and win and all of a sudden, nobody likes the Yankees. I also think too much beer and booze triggers a lot of the controversy. When you play a game, then sit and wait to play the next game, you can consume a lot of alcohol and at times that tends to change a person's personality and all of a sudden, one word leads to another and things get started."

In my two years as the league president, I have seen a tremendous increase in the interest in shuffleboard. We have gone from the one-division format to two division races which I honestly believe has created more enthusiasm. There are more teams and more women players competing. And, the league is much better balanced overall.
