# Southwest Open 2000 -- Totally Awesome!

•Name Change for National Hall of Fame Repeaters who have made the Southwest Open a 4th of July tradition for the past nine years, and newcomers who have vowed to make it one of theirs in the future, gathered together at the American Legion Post 73, Del City, Oklahoma, July 2-8.

We're in the "repeater" category. Our introduction was in 1993 -- the 2nd Annual SW Open/9th Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion (the first "reunion" where somebody else did all the work). We were impressed with what we thought then was a pretty healthy pot, the 10 tournament boards, and the participation: nine in the pro-am team event, 20 in the pro singles, 25 teams in the pro-am draw, nine in the beginners/just pretty good category, 43 in the amateur singles, 14 in the beginners/just pretty good singles, nine in the 4-person team (then billed as "George's fun event", added to the agenda to please him), and 13 in the open doubles. That was a substantial improvement over No. 1 in 1992 with eight boards, 80 players, and, comparatively speaking, a very modest prize money pot.

Compare that with the Southwest Open 2000 --272 players from 18 states and Canada, competing in 10 events on 31 boards for a share of the big pie!

For the first-timers, rewards in the preliminary round robins had them asking: Would there be money left for the "real" tournament? Yes, indeed! There was even enough to bet on an unscheduled foot race in the Legion parking lot between Rick Gindt of Washington and David Williams Jr. of Texas ("Rick talks, David walks," some unnamed source reported).

### 184 Players in Four-Person Team Events

There were 23 teams in the Div. I four-person team event and 23 in Div. II --- that's 184 players --- a

far cry from the 36 participating in that "fun event" in 1993!

Two years ago I moved to Columbia, Missouri. The first thing I looked for was a shuffleboard; the second was a house to buy. I found a board at the Elks, the Eagles Lodge, and the V.F.W. At the VFW on Wednesday nights, we hold round robins allowing only 20 players because of time. Most of the time we max out. On Thursday nights we hold round robins at the Eagles with the same rules. At present I'm the only rated player because the Bowers Rating System only allows us to rate up to "5". The players around here are not YET that good. We do only A-Bs and A-B-Cs.

These folks have as much fun as anyone at any level. My point is we must all work toward getting people to belly up to the table. The skills will come. Just make sure the skill level is matched.

First, we accepted the fact that, at 70 years old, we can't sustain 10 grueling days of non-stop action. And we realized that when we identify Marty Shepard as Mary and neither the typesetter nor the proofreader catches that error, it's time for someone younger, sharper and more vibrant than us to carry on the tradition we started.

Second, we received an offer from Champion Shuffleboard to purchase The Board Talk with Lynda and Tom French of Texas as managing editors. We admit that we had some concerns at first, fearful that the publication might become a promotion piece for a manufacturer rather than the voice of The World of Shuffleboard. Owner Keyle Stites set those concerns aside, convincing us -and the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Board, that his interest lies in preserving the future of the sport, benefitting all those involved -- players and their suppliers. Having established, highly-regarded players like Lynda and Tom at the editors' helm sealed the deal. Our sincerest wish is that you will extend to them the same support you have given us during the past 17 years.

There is no firm timetable for the transition, which will be a "gentle" one. Business will be as usual until we notify you otherwise. Your subscriptions, advertising, tournament promotions and reports, and other contributing articles, should continue to be sent to us until further notice. At that time, we'll introduce you to the new owner and editors.

We came away from the open meeting of the National Hall of Fame in Del City with a firm belief that the future of that entity (now with a new name -see Page 30) is in very capable hands. The officers and directors were professional as they discussed the future, and there was a "give and take" spirit of cooperation as they exchanged ideas and concerns. A hearty Board Talk salute to them!

It won't be easy for us to give up The Board Talk. We went through the agony of labor pains to give it birth, nursed it through its difficult adolescent years, and guided it through the difficult teens. But we know, like any good "parent," when it's time to let go. One thing we won't be giving up is the friendship of The World of Shuffleboard. During our "tenure" as editors/publishers of The Board Talk, we have made friends across the U.S.A. and Canada, and those are not part of the "sale." We cherish those friendships and will sustain them. You'll see us at upcoming events. We talk a bit and he agrees to come down and shoot against a couple of our top players.

Well, for six hours, he played game after game. The only break was a 20-minute ride from one establishment's board to another. So it turns out he's a Hall of Fame class player. A couple of games were close but no "w's" for the locals. But what a treat it was. For about the price of a drink a game, we got an education in shuffleboard that was priceless. He talked about shooting skills, practice, strategy and the history of the game. I couldn't name a table in New Jersey, New York or Pennsylvania that he hadn't played on. By now, you're probably wondering why I haven't mentioned his name.

Two reasons: First, I wanted to respect his privacy. He loves to travel to play -- at places and on days of his own choosing. If he were to get bombarded with invitations and requests that he couldn't possibly make, I'm sure it would upset him. He wouldn't want to miss a chance to make a buck .....I mean to make new friends. Second, I wondered if anyone who has been around shuffleboard for a long time could guess who he is. He plays mostly in northern New Jersey these days. In this area, only he and Dennis Leehive are comparable players. Dennis would be familiar to Board Talk readers for his accomplishments in several upstate New York tournaments.

Who was this famous (infamous?) player who came to visit us?

Seriously, though, what steps would we have to take and who would have to be contacted to start working towards a sanctioned New Jersey tournament.

# Alan's Thoughts on the Rating System....

This letter is concerning the rating system that we are now using. The players are rated according to their ability and even though it is a very subjective rating system, I feel that the group of those determining this rating do the very best they can and use all the guidelilnes and information available set out for them, and it is as fair as it can possibly be.

The reason the system was created was to get new players involved and to give the players of lesser developed skills a chance to compete with those who have been able to fine-tune theirs a little more. This seems to me to be a great way to enhance and keep this great competition going and an opportunity for the lesser-skilled players to learn from the more seasoned veteran players. The only problem now is that there has become a maximum number of points to be given and even using a negative spot to lengthen the game which is a definite advantage to the better players. By doing this, the field is not quite as level as it was designed to be.

Nobody wants to penalize the better players at all, but if the ratings are to be used, they should be used in full or thrown out. If throwing them out is the answer, then I think this game will fade into the woodwork as new players will not want to join in and not have a chance to be competitive.

Would anyone else have any thoughts about this subject? Maybe I am missing something.

We agree with all of your observations, Alan. From our own experience, the Bowers Rating System has been responsible for new players getting involved. One of our local tournaments has tripled in participation because those who formerly sat on the sidelines watching the same old veterans win year after year are now competing because they have a chance. The responsibility for perfecting (in terms of history, it's still relatively new) and using the system lies with the raters and the tournament directors. As raters, we take our responsibilities seriously, objectively for those we know and reaching out for the knowledge of others who can better evaluate those we are unsure of. As directors, we use the Bowers Rating System, as you so aptly put it, "in full." This is an area of controversy and needs input from all members of The World of Shuffleboard. We welcome their "side of the story," and we thank you for introducing it.

In the Pro Doubles, players with a decimal rating between -.51 and -1.50 may not play together.

Event Formats: Pro/Am Draft: best 5 out of 9, double elimination, 12 point games; Division II & III Doubles: single game, double elimination; Prc Doubles: 2 out of 3, double elimination; Division I Doubles: 2 out of 3 winners bracket, one 21 point game in the losers. All amateur Singles: single game, double elimination; Pro Singles: 2 out of 3, double elimination; 6 Amateur Team Event: 5 out of 9, double elimination. Pro Crazy Eights: up and back twice on six boards, top 25% make round 2, up & back twice on 6 boards, top four to final round, up and back on twice on six boards. Amateur Crazy Eights: to be determined; Legends Draw: single game, double elimination, Deuces Wild: 3 out of 5, single elimination.

**Pro/Am Draft Team Event:** This example is based on 144 players, which equals 24 six-person teams. The top twenty four rated players would act as team captains and select their fellow team members through a five round draft. The draft order for the first round shall be determined by blind draw. After that the picking order flip flops each round. In other words, the captain that has the first pick in the first round gets the last pick in the second round. By the same token, the captain that picks last in the first round will pick first in the second round and so on.

This event gives amateurs a chance to play for two days with some of the top players in the world, with a format that gives every team a chance to win. Our very popular nine games on three boards format also gives everyone a substantial amount of practice prior to the start of the other events. Twelve point games are used in this event. The Draft is at 12:00 noon on Sunday, October 29; followed by the auction, at 2:00 p.m., play begins immediately after the auction.

Bring your own Six Person Amateur Team Event: Each team must have at least two ladies, but not more than four. Players rated -.01 through -1.50 are not eligible. The 2000 Bowers Ratings will be used, with the exception that anyone who is rated a five must play as a four. When the ratings of the individual players on the team are added, the decimal total must be at least 9.5 and the rounded total must be at least 10. Money will be added to this event as follows: less than 24 teams - none; 24 to 27 teams \$3,000; 28 to 32 teams \$5,000. Fifteen point games will be used for this event.

Legends Draw Partners: You must be at least fifty years of age. There is a possible conflict with the amateur team event (players who are on a team that is among the final six or eight teams in the amateur team event may not be eligible). The full entry fee will be refunded if that happens.

<u>Weights:</u> Players may use their own weights, which must have red & blue caps. They may be any brand, so long as the plating is intact and in good condition. The total weight is must be not less than 320 grams, nor more than 340 grams. All weights are subject to inspection by the Tournament Director who may, at his discretion, disallow any weights he deems unacceptable. Weights that are excessively scratched or have or plating that is worn through are examples of unacceptable equipment.

Scheduling/Auction times: The auction time for the Pro/Am Draft is at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 29, with play beginning after the auction. All doubles auctions are scheduled for 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, October 31, with play beginning after the auction. All amateur singles auctions are scheduled for 9:00 am Wednesday, November 1, with play beginning after the auction. The auctions for the Amateur Team Event and Pro Singles are scheduled for 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, November 2, with play for both of these events beginning at 8:00 a.m. on Friday morning. Each event will be played all the way through. Exact times for the individual events will be determined based on the number of players in each event. All players must be present for the auctions for the events they are playing in, failure to do so will result in a \$20.00 fine per infraction.

Added money breakdown: The Sands Regency is adding up to \$12,500 to the prize money for the North American Championships. Of that, \$6,000 is guaranteed, and is allocated as follows: pro singles: \$4,000 added (the top five finisher rated 0.00 through - .50 and the top five finishers rated -.51 through -1.50 will receive \$400 each. However, in order to be eligible for the added money in the pro singles, you must participate in the Pro/Am Draft Team Event. There is \$2,400 in the North American Champion contest (\$600 of which is added by The Shuffleboard Federation for Division III). There is also be a \$200 prize for the Amateur Team which wins the contest for the team with the best name.

Additional added money is based on the number of teams in the Amateur Team Event. 24-27 teams equals \$4,000 of additional added money (\$10,000 total), with \$3,000 of it going to the Amateur Team Event and \$1,000 going to DeucesWild<sup>®</sup>. With 28 Amateur Teams, there will be \$6,500 of additional added money (\$12,500 total), with \$5,000 going to the Amateur Team Event and \$1,500 going to DeucesWild<sup>®</sup>.

North American Champion Contest: Points are awarded to the top 25% of the field in each qualifying event. For example, with sixteen players/teams, the top four finishers would receive bonus points, with sixty-four players/teams, the top sixteen receive bonus points. <u>Cancellation & Refund Policy</u>: The Registration Fee is non-refundable. If you drop out of an event twenty-four hours or more prior to the event, there will be a cancellation fee of \$25. If you drop out of an event less than twenty-four hours prior to the start of that event, you lose your entire entry fee. Refunds will be issued by check and mailed within thirty days after the conclusion of the tournament.

Sands Regency Hotel Casino: At the North American Championships, everybody gets a room in one of the Sands Regency Hotel Casino's three towers. The tournament area has a bar and cocktail waitresses, a players only playing area and reserved seating for players. Located within fifty feet of the tournament area are: rest rooms, cocktail lounge, 24 hour coffee shop, slot machines, keno counter, and elevators that go to our reserved rooms in the tower. The National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame (NSHF) met in Del City, Oklahoma, on July 1, starting with an open meeting at 2 p.m. "Thanks to Don Crall and his wonderful American Legion Post 73 staff for providing a great tournament and space for the directors to hold their annual meeting," said NSHF Secretary Lynda French. "Also, many thanks to those in the shuffleboard community who attended and contributed their thoughts and ideas before, during and after the open meeting."

The most significant action was a majority vote to immediately change the name of NSHF to "Table Shuffleboard Association (TSA)" This change was made to address a conflict: The "Shuffleboard Hall of Fame" and "Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Museum" is already being used and registered by the deck/ floor shuffleboard association/organization which has an international membership of over 25,000 members. New TSA by-laws are being finalized and will be posted on the BOWERS CORNER website for the shuffleboard community to view. The primary function of the TSA remains the same -- identifying and recognizing "Table Shuffleboard Hall of Fame" individual inductees.

Another significant change was the decision to rescind the temporary minimum age requirement that inductees must be at least 60 years of age.

In other action, the directors voted to accept the offer of Kelye Stites of Champion Shuffleboard Ltd., Richland Hills, Texas, for space at his facility for a Table Shuffleboard Hall of Fame Museum. The TSA Board will help set up the museum and all donations and contributions from the shuffleboard community are needed! If you have any historical data to provide, please get in touch with Louise Freer, TSA Historical Committee Chairperson, or Secretary Lynda French. Stites also offered to assist with Hall of Fame induction events, such as the donation of boards to use for potential TSA tournaments.

The directors also met with some "seasoned" players regarding possible induction of those older generation or deceased players and/or promoters. The board thanks Rod Cameron, Glen Davidson, Billy Mays and Bill Melton for their input.
