Houston Holiday Open: Bah! Y2K Humbug!


- ●170 Shufflers from Nine States

Dateline Houston: The last major shuffleboard tournament of the millennium came off "without a hitch" in Houston, Texas on Dec. 26-31, 1999. Organizers Jack Scott and Johnny Ballard moved the 4th edition of the tournament to an expanded venue, the Houston Greenspoint Marriott Hotel, and 170 shuffleboarders from nine states followed them. Competition took place on 16 beautiful boards in the hotel's Grand Ballroom. The hotel also offered \$49.95 deluxe rooms and free transportation to and from Houston Intercontinental Airport, located nearby.

Veteran shuffleboard player and large tournament volunteer Lyndon ("Coach") Baize from Austin opined: "This is a good tournament. You folks do a great job. I've seen and worked a lot of tournaments and this is real smooth. Lots of folks are looking for something to do right after Christmas and it's good to get out and have some fun, win or lose, and shake those holiday blues!" Right on, Coach! (Editor's Note: Did you check out Coach's sexy legs on the cover of the January issue?)

Official tournament competition commenced on Sunday, Dec. 26, with a pro-am draw and an amateur draw. In the pro-am, Johnny Wayne Crawford of Dallas teamed with Houstonian Stan Stinson to withstand a fierce challenge from Arlington's Jeri Billard and Houston's Danny Norris and take first place. Mitch Melton and Mahlon Nobles from the Dallas-Ft. Worth area claimed third, while C.W. Walker and Jack Davis of Ft. Worth finished fourth. The amateur draw saw the Houston team of John "JT" Thames and Chuck Leach complete the event undefeated, despite a furious assault by fellow Houstonians Don ("Hitman") Meehan and Jim ("Rainbow") Bramlett. The team of Houstonian Wayne Hammond and


Jason Veal, newly moved to Oklahoma City, placed third, while Len Webster of Omaha and Leon Black of Lansing, Michigan, eased into fourth. Houston players Jim Payne and George Marx, Perla Scott and James Cato shared fifth and sixth place honors.

Day Two featured the ABC draw, an event in which players of all skill levels team up with "A" players playing "A"s, B's playing B's, etc. First place was claimed by Gwyn Orsi and Jim Kosicke of Omaha and Danny Norris of Houston. Johnny Wayne ("The Great One") Crawford led teammates Pete Worsnop of Houston and Jim Coulter of Huntington Beach, California, to second place. New Texas Shuffleboard Hall of Fame member Diana ("Queen of the Jungle") Hagen mentored fellow Houstonian Gilbert ("Silent Assassin") Baird and Marilu Roberts of Omaha to a third place finish. The team of Jim McGee of Houston, Mahlon Nobles of Dallas and Marie Coulter of Huntington Beach, California, claimed fourth.





Shuffleboard Sweethearts 2000

"I believe the weaker sex should certainly get involved in shuffleboard. They could make the sandwiches and serve refreshments at shuffleboard matches and do a very good job. They could even become a secretary of a shuffleboard league, knowing how much they like to gossip..... After playing for 35 years, I could certainly beat any female with one hand tied behind my back. Do you hear me, Billy Jean King?" -- The Bobby Riggs of Shuffleboard, Pennsylvania, January 1987

The World of Shuffleboard has changed during the past several years -- due, in large part, to the important role that women have played, locally, statewide and nationally. They have stepped out of the traditional niches where "Bobby Riggs" preferred them to stay and onto the "main stage" as active participants and worthy competitors in a previously male-dominated sport.

In honor of their achievements and their commitment to the growth of our sport, we salute four women representing those in the East, West, North and South, as Shuffleboard Sweethearts for the Year 2000.... We hope this "Shuffleboard Sweethearts" special will become an annual February tradition.

From the East RITA YANK

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

It was Rita Yank (aka "Billy Jean King") whose article in a 1986 issue of The Board Talk prompted "Bobby Riggs" to respond with his ideas for women's roles in shuffleboard. In her article, Rita encouraged some of the diehard male chauvinists who dominated the shuffleboard scene in her part of the country to give women shufflers who had invested the same time, effort and dedication as they did, respect and recognition. "When a female

shoots a male...he becomes amazed that she can shoot, shocked that she knows the game, embarrassed when she beats him and mad because it was done by a woman, "she said.

According to Rita, there was no reason for allmale or all-female shuffleboard leagues. She also challenged the women to demand respect and recognition. "When these male shooters realize that shuffleboard is for both sexes, that is when we females will get the proper respect and recognition we deserve," she said. In other words, she was nudging the "Little Miss Muffets to get off their tuffets" and take their rightful place in The World of Shuffleboard.

When this was published back in 1986, Rita was not a novice. She had eight years of experience during which she was an essential part of five division championship teams, had shot in all-star tournaments, and had received the most votes for her league's "Most Valuable Player." She had travelled to Michigan in 1985 for the 1st Board Talk Shufflers' Reunion and took second in the women's singles and second in the 4-person team event. Still, she felt like Rodney Dangerfield: "I don't get no respect."

One male shuffler who gave her (and other women shufflers) respect, support and encouragement, was her husband Jim, the first inductee into the Pennsylvania Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. He was proud when the male players in the Northeast changed their assessment of Rita as "just a girl" to a "darn good player." Jim was her teacher, along with local player Jim Camp, when she started playing in 1977. The couple shares the philosophy that all shufflers have the responsibility to teach others what they know about the sport to ensure its future growth.

Together, Rita and Jim started a new program at J & C's Tavern in West Philadelphia. The program's success was its simplicity: teach the basics of the game to new shooters and they, in turn, had to do the same. She continued this program by moving around to different leagues, teaching new players what she had learned. Rita has contributed to the

growth and direction of no less than seven leagues in the Philadelphia area.




While she was the one who issued the call for equality in shuffleboard, Rita (right) is not a "women's libber." No one was more proud than she of husband Jim's (center) induction into the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame. She's also proud Mom to Jean and Jim Jr., who shares his parent's passion for shuffleboard.

In 1995 Rita took on one of her biggest challenges as captain of the newly-formed J & C's "B" team. It is standard practice in the Eastern Delco League to place all new teams in the "C" division to allow unseasoned teams to establish themselves and then work their way up to the stiffer competition of the higher divisions. Rita asked the league to allow her team to be placed in the "B" division because she wanted her players to face the tougher competition from the start. Her leadership transformed a young, unseasoned team into one of the strongest teams in the league. Last year her team swept the "B" division and finished with the second best record in the league. This year her team was awarded "A" division status and is now vying for first place. She is one of two women on the team, but doesn't hesitate to assert her authority when necessary to maintain her team's integrity.

Another big challenge Rita has addressed was getting a league (which in the '90s played by the '60s rules of 21-point games, etc.) to accept the changes the rest of the country had years before.

According to Louise Freer, a Philadelphia-area player who has earned national respect: "Rita and some other women paved the way for those of us who came later and made it easier for us to compete as equals in whatever events we choose. She is a worthy role model for women in the game of shuffleboard. More importantly, she is a worthy role model for ALL shuffleboard players."



Back in the late '50s, Jolene Lembke was not thinking about shuffleboard. She was thinking about how to raise two babies alone after her husband left her with no support. A family friend, aware of her dire situation, gave her a job at his Driftwood Tavern in San Bernardino, California. The Driftwood was a shuffleboard hot spot at that time and Jolene would fill in if someone needed a partner -- if they were willing to wait while she took care of her customers. A lot of the big-name players passed through the Driftwood, such as Glen Davidson, Bob Miles, Al Stewart, and a local newcomer by the name of Billy Chiles (all four now in the National Shuffleboard Hall of Fame).


In the mid-'60s, Jolene started working for a tavern called The Head Hunters. With the connections she had developed, she formed a team that none of the other taverns could match and she earned the unofficial title of "The best lady player around." The '70s brought some lean years to shuffleboard with pool becoming the number one bar sport.

By the time The Board Talk came onto the scene in 1984, Jolene was married to Roy Lembke of Oregon who was a pretty fair player himself. They bought a motor home and started travelling to tournaments promoted in the new publication. And Jolene, along with her brother Woodie Cochrum of Missouri, became the very first Board Talk reporters. Jolene took her reporter responsibilities seriously. She wore a jacket proclaiming "I read it in The Board Talk" and as a birthday present, Roy gave her business cards identifying her as a Board Talk reporter. From every tournament in every state they travelled, there would be new subscribers in the mailbox.

So, what does one classy female shuffler who had earned the title of "best lady player around" in the '60s do as shuffleboard enters the New Millennium? Retire? Not a chance! Jolene is not only still an active player in, and promoter of, tournaments in her area, she also serves as president of the California Shuffleboard Hall of Fame, which has been the "model" for state committees throughout the nation. In this latest, and perhaps most important role, she rules with an iron velvet glove, determined that only those most deserving will gain entry into that special place.

Jolene's first induction ceremony was a pleasure for her as she welcomed Al Stewart, a real "sweetheart," as the first inductee into the California Hall of Fame. Appropriately, it took place two years ago on Valentine's Day.



The word "professional" and the name Diana Hagen have become synonomous in The World of Shuffleboard. But it hasn't always been that way....Back in the mid-'80s, nobody at Duane's Ice House in Houston wanted to draw her as a partner because she was still learning the game. So her teacher and mentor, Howard Mouton, told everyone he would take the "girl." She played against such heavy-weights as Mickey Baugh, Dale Koteras, Bill Brady, Rod Cameron and "Little Ray," and started winning those draws more often. The regulars started thinking twice about letting Howard take her for a partner. By late 1986, Diana was the lone woman in The Board Talk's Top 20 Players in the U.S.A. In 1987, she and Chris Monahan Danke of California took on the "big boys" (Darrol Nelson, John McDermott,

Glen Davidson and Billy Chiles) at the Michigan Open and took third place in the open doubles. In 1989, she broke the mold again when she and partner, Sam Summers of Oklahoma, won the open doubles at the Great Arizona Open, a highlight of her then relatively short career.

After several years in the late '80s and early '90s, when Diana dominated the women's division at

Federation tournaments in
Las Vegas and Reno, she
was upgraded to "Pro" status.
The "girl" was now in demand
as a partner and she and the
"master" himself, Darrol
Nelson of Oregon, took



second place honors at the 1997 North American Championships pro doubles. At the same event, she led her team to first place in the Pro-Am.

She continued to show her leadership qualities by taking her Pro-Am draft team and Deuces Wild team to first place honors at the 1998 NASC. At the 1999 NASC, she and fellow Texan, Brenda Moore, took third place in the open doubles and as the lone woman in the pro singles event, Diana made a strong bid to become a "first" in shuffleboard history and finally settled for third. She will keep trying.

Like the other "Shuffleboard Sweetheart" representatives, Diana is a promoter of the game, urging locals to get out and play, and using patience, time and expertise with new players to lead them down the right learning path. She participates in all the major tournaments and is a major factor in assuring healthy sponsor sale pots. The last few years, she has been a key figure in the Houston Holiday Open, which has become one of the highlights of the shuffleboard year for players across the country.

It was at the 1999 Houston Holiday Open that Diana reached her highest achievement to date: induction into the Texas Shuffeboard Hall of Fame.

Brian Walker of Texas summed up the achievements of Diana Hagen: "She has been an inspiration to many women, not only in the Houston area, but across the United States. I can honestly say that Diana is not only the best woman to ever play, but one of the best players in the country --

period!"

This photo of Marie Sweeney, back in the early '80s

when she won the Tri-State (Michigan, Indiana, Ohio) Women's Singles Championship, captures her "winning isn't everything, but it sure is nice" personality. At that time, Marie was already a shuffleboard veteran, not just as a player but a promoter of many tournaments at the Wagon Wheel in Lake Orion, Michigan -- even before The Board Talk was "born." Great competition and warm hospitality were guaranteed and the motels in that small town had a lot of "no vacancy" signs out at tournament times. But, through the years, Marie always found room in her apartment next door to the Wagon Wheel for shufflers who had no place to stay. Many shufflers will testify that she had a heart that was bigger than her home, where the "welcome" sign was always out.

By 1987, Marie had won her spot on The Board Talk's Top 10 Women Players in the U.S.A. Partners for mixed doubles events were never a problem for Marie and she consistently collected trophies with the likes of such "toughies" as Lee McDonald, Rick Boyer, and Jerry Hershman in state championships and Board Talk tournaments in the '80s and '90s. At the same time, she was frequently in the winner's circle for the women's singles events at those same tournaments and other local and state tournaments.

Championships at the Club Car Lounge in Durand,
Michigan, last Thanksgiving weekend. The highlyrespected and much-loved Marie Sweeney was at

Cancer. She is currently undergoing intensive
chemo-therapy.

We hope Marie's "winning isn't everything, but it sure is nice" philosophy will see her through this latest challenge. May it be of some support to her in this difficult period to know that the entire World of Shuffleboard is rooting for her!




To address that challenge, we suggest you use the economical "post-it" notes on the back of your photos.





Final thoughts on the 1999 North American Shuffleboard Championships™ and exciting news about the future of the tournament

Thanks to everyone who attended the 10th annual North American Shuffleboard ChampionshipsTM, and to all of the dedicated members of our tournament staff that make this event possible.

Of the many hundreds of players who have attended this tournament over the years, including the 268 who played in 1999, eight have been there every year. They are Rick Boyer, Jim Filkins, Bob Hunt, Bill Meyer, Bill Melton, Al Salazar, Bob Shaw and David Williams. We very much appreciate your continued support and hope to see all of you at the next ten as well.

While there were many highlights, there were also some problems, the most important of which were the boards. They did not play up to our standards or to a level fitting a tournament of this stature. This was certainly not due to any lack of effort. We apologize to all the participants and want to assure everyone that appropriate action has been taken to insure that this is not an issue in the future.

Before going any further we want to say that this is not a reflection on the quality of the tables we used, but rather a consequence of the Nevada climate. Those same tables play just fine in their home, American Legion Post 73, Del City, Oklahoma.

We shall always be grateful to Don Crall, who rented us his boards for the last three years. Without his help, it is quite possible the NASCTM would not have survived. If you have never been to the Legion for the Southwest Open, or one of their other tournaments, we highly recommend you visit them.

The NASCTM has become the tournament it is largely due to the excellent work of our tournament staff. Five days before the start of the tournament, Harvey Walden arrived with his all important cargo of twenty-four shuffleboard tables. The next day, the core of our setup team began the setup process. That group, which includes Rick Boyer, Lyndon Baize, Kory Hungerford and Scott Harrington play a major role all week. In addition to set up and take down, they wax and adjust boards for eight straight days in between, and don't get much of a break until the boards have been safely packed back into the truck.

Once the boards are in place, there is a substantial amount of preparation still to be done, including leveling, cleaning and polishing. That's when Bubba Warren, Lou Decker and Ted Fowler join the crew. Caring for the boards is not a task that ends once the tournament starts. Most mornings, by 6:00 a.m., members of the tournament staff were back at it, cleaning, polishing and spraying the boards, vacuuming the gutters and doing additional leveling and adjusting.

It's now the day before the start of the tournament and Kathy Yingst is now on hand and working on some of the many details, including preparing auction lists, taking late entries, organizing teams. Once the tournament has started she moves on to posting prize money, calculating points for the North American Champion Contest, etc.

Sunday arrives and the rest of the team is in place. Bracket man Rob Kern is set to record the first of nearly 1,000 tournament games. Sharon Huddleston is ready for the very important job of handling the auctions and splitting up the prize money into hundreds of envelopes. Our new auctioneer, Jack Davis is ready for the first of more than 400 players/teams he will handle for the week.

As the action begins, tournament photographer Ralph Duarte and video expert Jim Martin are capturing all the highlights, recording eighteen hours of video along with taking more than 500 photos.

In addition to the regular tournament staff were some volunteers, who play an important and appreciated role. We wish to recognize Carol Boyett, Vickie Hunt, Bob Jacobsen, Debbie Kern, Nancy Salazar, Gordie Smith and Tina Wade. So many people stop and offer to help out if we need them, we appreciate all of you and hope we haven't missed anyone.

As usual, our to our Co-Sponsors played an important role in funding the nearly \$24,000.00 in tournament expenses. Thanks to everyone who made a Co-Sponsor contribution, especially our first Platinum Sponsor, Hal Perry, who made a \$1,000.00 donation. Special thanks also to our board sponsors, American Shuffleboard Company, Hillside, New Jersey, The Houston Holiday Open and the Southwest Open, all of which made a donation of \$300.00 to Co-Sponsor a board.

Of the many highlights, the Crazy Eights event was probably number 1. The crowd participation was unlike any we have ever seen. We will work on expanding that for the 2000 Tournament. It was also great to have our first Canadian winner of a singles event, Kabal Bimb.

Looking to next year, the 2000 NASCTM will include our first experiment with a two out of three winners bracket and 21 point game losers bracket. As promised, one of the amateur singles or doubles event will have that format. We will expand that format to other divisions as we get a handle on how it affects the time requirements.

Thanks again to everyone. We hope you are all as excited as we are about the new sponsorship agreement with the Sands, the 24 new boards and the future of the NASCTM.

We appreciate the support and commitment of the Sands Regency Hotel Casino, which stuck with us in the lean years, and look forward to working with them for many years to come. We hope the shuffleboard community will show their support for their huge new sponsorship commitment with a record turnout for the 2000 NASCTM. 





and fasten your seatbelts for another Texas bull ride.




At the same time, we suffer with Bev Lukens and all the people Lois and Freddie have mentioned, plus our home state shufflers who face challenges.


