

Rob Hummer (left) and John Arndt travelled all the way from Waterloo, New York, to capture second place.





Michigan FIRST \$\$\$\$ SERIES AT MAJESTIC CAFE, PONTIAC, JUNE 4

The first in the 2000 Super Slammin' Summer Sunday Shuffleboard series, introduced last year, will be held at the Majestic Cafe, 156 Oakland Ave., Pontiac, on June 4. The series of three doubles (which must be paid in advance) will culminate in a play-off with the top point-earners vying for a pot that includes \$5 per player collected from each of the three tournaments.

Entry fee is \$40 per team and the handicap must total 2 or above per team (example: -1 must play with a 3 or more, 0 with a 2, 1 with a 1, etc.) You must keep the same team to qualify for the play-off (may use subs if of equal or more rating but **no subs allowed in the playoff**). The top 10 teams with the most points accumulated (18 for 1st, 17 for 2nd, etc.) will be eligible for the playoff. If there are ties, those will also be eligible for the playoff.

Each tournament will be limited to the first 18 teams signed up and paid. To save your spot, send \$120 (in full only) for the first three doubles to tournament director Dennis Bittner, Club Car Lounge, 111 N. Saginaw St., Durand, MI 48429.

If you do not want to commit to the complete series, you may participate -- if there are open spots, if you meet the 2 handicap criteria, and if you don't mind contributing \$5 of your entry fee to the playoff pot.

The second in the series will be played at the Club Car Lounge in Durand on July 16, and the third at Stober's Cocktail Lounge in Lansing on Aug. 13. The playoff is scheduled for the Club Car on Sept. 3.

Note that the Majestic will hold an open singles on Saturday, June 3, \$20 entry, sale at noon with play immediately following.





"Considering me for recognition is a great honor. I am flattered," said Doc. "In 50 years of playing shuffleboard, I've seen many changes -- short board, long board, free hand to cross board. Now we are allowed to sprinkle the board while shooting, play to 15 and even with our own weights. Forty years ago, we played for \$10 for the winners and a 6-pack of beer for the runners-up. It seemed like the entry fee of \$1.00 was a lot to ask of players then. I have helped start many leagues and encouraged a lot of younger players and female shooters. Playing shuffleboard is a great way to meet new friends, gain self-respect and have fun. I want to thank Seward Harman, Roy Bessinger, the Knox Brothers, Lowell Gard and many, many more."

Skip started playing on the first board put upstairs at the Bourbon American Legion in 1957. His first win came with Charlie Thompson uptown at Sam's in 1960. Dale played in Mishawaka where he met Jim Long. Several years later a foursome was formed of Jerry Knox, Larry Creakbaum, Jim Long and Skip. They were hard to beat and didn't







Rick Gindt played a great tournament, but came up a little short and had to settle for second.




The 1999 Washington State Singles Champion, Larry Pearson, finished third (I guess Larry would know about coming up short).




In his first toumament, Francisco Auhamada took second place honors in the Div. Il singles.

When all was said and done, Bob Jacobson and Alice Arredondo, both of Phoenix, had doubledipped the winner's bracket finalists to win.







Dino Fleming and Dave Fleming took second place honors.







Plans for the 2000 North American Shuffleboard Championships are well underway (see inside spread). Because of your input, several changes -some major and some minor -- are being made to improve the tournament.

The biggest single change is the purchase of 24 brand-new boards for the tournament. The prototype of our new tables has been completed and the table has been inspected and production on the remainder of the new shuffleboard tables has begun. We are very excited about having brand-new equipment for the tournament and very confident that the players will love the new boards.

As far as the events go, there are two changes. The format for the Division I Doubles will switch from single game, double elimination, to 2 out of 3 in the winners bracket and one 21 point game in the losers bracket. After the tournament, we will calculate how much additional time is needed for that format and gradually make the same change in the other amateur singles and doubles events. The other big news is the addition of a Crazy

Eights event for the amateurs. Because of the tremendous number of players who expressed a desire to play in this event, the format is still being worked out.

One of the tournament's main highlights, the 6person Amateur Team Event, will get a little more interesting this year. Bar owners (or anyone sponsoring a team) can win \$1,000 if their team wins. In order to qualify, the team roster, entry fee and registration fee for all players must be postmarked by Sept. 1, 2000. The bonus is based on at least 28 teams in the event. If there are less than 28 teams, the sponsor bonus will be \$500.

As the Puck Turns By George & Donna Wilber




