Champion Shuffleboard/Texas Open BIG Success!

Indiana Rules!

Over 100 contestants from seven states gathered at The Gold Nugget, Arlington, Texas, on Aug. 30-Sept. 4, for the Champion Shuffleboard/ Texas Open. Eleven events, played on four inhouse boards and eight new Champion boards, netted a total pot of over \$60,000.

The tournament started on Wednesday with a 4-person bring team event.

"I have always contended that the best shuffleboard in the world is played in Texas/Oklahoma, but Indiana may be a close second. The legendary Billy Mays (left) proved he's still got the stuff to be a winner as he took first in the Div. 1 singles. David Williams took second place honors.


The other Williams Brother, Bobby, finished third, with Harvey Kidd in fourth place. All are from Texas.

Successful Return for "Rural American Open" After a seven-year "recess," the Rural American The Doard Tournam The Doard Tour


After a seven-year "recess," the Rural American Open returned to Winston, Oregon, over the Labor Day 2000 weekend. Played on six boards in two locations -- the historical 99 Tavern and Willee's Cafe -- the event attracted 74 participants from four states and two Canadian provinces.

"I thought the tourney went off well. It was our first in eight years and we were a bit rusty; yet, the feedback I received was 99% positive," said host Steve Fisher.

The event started with an ABC draw on Wednesday evening and 18 teams vied for a share of the \$3760 pot.

Ray is president and owner of Transportation Data, Inc. He served as director of Cargo Accounting for Eastern Airlines for 10 years and was manager of Computer Systems & Programming for Eastern for 15 years.

He and wife Carole (also a good shuffler) have six children -- three girls and three boys -- plus five grandchildren and three great granddaughters. In addition to shuffleboard, his hobbies include handicapping football and horses, ham radio, PC computers, and music.

He was active in shuffleboard from 1946-1955, then got involved again in 1989. He helped start the Florida Table Shuffleboard Association and has played a key role in organizing and promoting Florida tournaments which have attracted participants from many states.

Ray has been an aggressive promoter of The Board Talk, actively "hustling" subscribers at the SW Open and the NASC in Reno. The talented statistician authored a 135-page booklet highlighting players' accomplishments from 1997-1999, called

Lynda retired from IBM in February of this year after 23 years of service. Born and raised in Austin, her service as a software analyst led her to live temporarily in the tri-state area of Ohio/West Virginia/Kentucky, and Florida. Prior to her IBM career, she had worked for the IRS as a tax examiner from 1969-1972, then the Statewide Project for the Deaf in Austin, teaching Computer-Assisted-Instruction (CAI) in schools for the deaf across Texas from 1972-1977. Bobby Disagrees with Alan on Rating System

In reply to Alan Cobb's comments (August issue) on using the ratings in full or throwing them out -- I totally disagree!

The ratings are used basically to separate skill levels, i.e.: -1's and 0's play together in tournaments, and then 1's and 2's, then 3's and 4's, or in doubles you usually have to add to 0 or add to 5.

These are fair designations. To have a tournament and have it fully handicapped is definitely penalizing the pros. For example, say Bill Melton and Diana Hagen are playing two good category 2 players. They spot them six points from the start. If the 2's win the hammer and lag a deuce, the score is 8 to 0, more than half the game. I would not like the chances when playing 2's such as Jeff Womble and Tommy McBurnet, or Mahlon and Linda Nobles, or Jack Davis and Gary Nelson, and on and on

I am a rater and believe in the system, and absolutely believe it helps to generate participation in tournaments. As a tournament director, I know that the good, large tourneys could not exist without handicapping.

When there is a limited handicap or a negative handicap tournament and you feel your skill levels are not yet developed enough for you to compete -- come out and watch.

Bud's 5th Labor Day Tourney Another Fun One!



Locals Carol Pittman and Carolyn Johnston took second place.





In the open draw, Fred Boyd and Big B took first place. Lynn Tice and Brenda Watts were second, with Gerald Wood and Snuffy in third place.



The six-person draft team event started on Saturday and, once again, the Hoosiers made their presence known.






Nebraska Stages First State Championships

Next up on Saturday were open doubles and Div. II doubles, single game, double elimination. There were nine teams in the open and seven teams of players rated 2 and above in Div. II.






Food prepared by Sandy was served each day. Teams competed for a grand total of \$4515.


