Andy and Lou (his wife) have a beautiful home in north Springfield, Missouri and their basement in full of shuffleboard history, shuffleboards, shuffleboard parts and Andy's shuffleboard projects. He has two refinished shuffleboards completed and in process of refinishing another one. He has just finished a scaled model Rockola shuffleboard designed from his own home Rockola shuffleboard that he hopes to auction or raffle at one of the upcoming major shuffleboard tournament events.

Andy and Lou have been married for 22 years. They have two children: Andrew, Jr. and Darrah. Andy has lived in Springfield, Missouri all his life. He is a Vietnam Veteran. He then worked for the City of Springfield as a lineman for 28 years and took early retirement recently at the age of 52. We recently had a similar visit with some good friends of ours that we have previously paired with in team events: Eugene and Carol Peach from Bastrop, Texas via Houston, Texas. We live in Austin, Texas and met Eugene and Carol when we first started playing shuffleboard and going to tournaments in the Houston area. We've played in a couple team events with them, plus Eugene & I drew partners at one of the first significant tournaments that Tom & I played in Houston. Eugene had just been moved to a '2' and I had just been moved to a '3' and we ended up in the winners circle (were beat by Diana Hagen and Tom French in our last game). We've had alot of fun playing and visiting with them briefly in tournaments, but had never had a one-on-one personal visit until a couple weeks ago when they invited us to come spend the weekend and visit in their home in Bastrop, Texas. We arrived on Friday night and ended up playing shuffleboard in their 1.200 sq. ft. gameroom which is detached from the home in a separate building. from nickel-dime. The purse totaled more than \$5,000 and a calcutta (buying part of a team) offered almost as much.

People came from many walks of life and many parts of the country. A contingent arrived from Denver, a large group migrated from California and there was even one competitor who showed from Oklahoma.

All came for the sole purpose of competing against the best in a tourna-ment labeled the "World Series of Shuffleboard," the second annual event for the Black Cat.

The best turned out to be the team OF Portlander <u>Ron Harralson</u> and Billy Mays of Sacramento, who defeated Lonny Folger and Doug Buhl of Seattle in the best-of-seven game, three-hourplus marathon that was decided on the final two points (15-13) of the seventh game.

The end result was of little surprise. Mays is regarded as one of the "masters" of the sport — sometimes a syno-nym of "hustler." He's a soft-spoken native of Texas whose nerves are colder than beer on tap. And the nerves, perhaps more than anything else, carried n an t Harralson and him to the title. "I felt confident we could win it;

when my partner made four points (on angurn) when we were trailing 5-6 in the final game," said the 40-year-old Mays, who pointed out he is blind in one eye and deaf in one ear.

Despite the physical handicaps, Mays possesses a fine touch, a techhighe he has honed almost to perfection, over the last 16 years. He has trick shots he saves for exhibitions and "highly skilled" shots he uses on oppo-

"People tell me all the time that I use a lot of my trick shots during "but games," said Mays with a smile, actually I have only two trick shots. The rest are highly skilled, and I would like to emphasize that. They are not trick shots.

The competition is very close at this level, so there's no room for tricks. This type of shuffleboard is like Bobby Fisher-type chess, or golf, or bowling. You have got to use a lot of moves on the other player all of the time." Unlike chess, golf or tennis, though,

etiquette is absent in shuffleboard. The jukebox can be heard blaring over idle conversation, customers yell for more beer or hot dogs and spectators even walk in front of the players during a match.

It doesn't seem to deter from the concentration of pushing a heavy metal disc along a waxed table 20-feet, eightinches long to marks where points are . scored.

During the 16 years in which Mays has competed in an average of 10 tourhas competed in an average of 16 bon-naments per year, he has failed to be "in the money" only twice. A record comparable to that of Min-NESCTA FATS

Bill English, Colorado Hall of Fame (December 12, 1998) and national TSA Hall of Fame (June 22, 2001) inductee was a Pro-level player and promoter of the sport of shuffleboard for many years.

Bill played his first game of table shuffleboard in 1947 at the Mission Tavern in San Francisco, California. He had been out of the Navy for almost two years and was working for a vending company until 3-5 PM each day. Bill's lifestyle was pretty ordinary and routine, much like millions of other people. He knew nothing about the subculture of shuffleboard. He had neither heard or read about shuffleboard nor had he even seen the game being played. Little did he know that being in the vending business and getting exposed to shuffleboard that his

whole life was about to change forever.

California had an impressive roster of first-rate shuffleboard players at the time. Before long Bill was wanting to play with the "big guns." In shuffleboard jargon, those "big guns" were also referred to as either the "tigers" or the "sharks," meaning they were the *best.* Then there were the "fish" and pity you if you were one of the fish, as that meant you were at the bottom of the big heap! The sharks would allow the fish to challenge the board and it was just understood that the fish had to pay their dues. Indeed, Bill did pay his dues. He recalled donating most of his weekly

paycheck for the privilege of challenging the board. Bob Miles was a frequent recipient of Bill's hard earned bucks. Bill never forgot that Bob Miles took his first five dollars and many more in the weeks to come, but he never regretted those losses. He often said that Bob repaid him many fold by teaching him the vital winning strategies of the game.

Hours and hours of practice followed those games that Bill lost. Finally, he began to make progress and he soon learned how to swim with the sharks. He traveled extensively to play on other boards -- especially across the city. Whenever he lost a game, he would return to that establishment time after time until he beat the house champ(s).

Bill always identified the Mission Inn Tavern as his home board and base of operation. He was very fond of the owners and they agreed to sponsor his team in league play. He was instrumental in establishing seven other teams to compete in Northern California competition. These teams consisted of five sets of *(Continued on Next Page)*

doubles. They played every Thursday night for 28 weeks. Decades later Bill could recall the names of eight of the ten players on his team: Glen Stewart and Jimmy Mendenall; Clarence Davis and Bobby Daily; Al King and Bob Miles; and Clarence Whitley and Bill (English).

Meanwhile, players in Southern California had organized a comparable league which originated in Los Angeles. The third and final Southern v. Northern championship tournament was held in San Jose. Ultimately, the Mission Inn team won the big enchilada... Bill's team won it all and they were declared the California Shuffleboard State Champions! Bill was absolutely ecstatic. His team then dispersed and each went their own separate ways. Bob Miles went on to win the "Sanctioned World Championship" (sanctioned by American) and held this title from 1953 to 1959.

Bill was now devoting an inordinate amount of time to shuffleboard. He wanted to practice and engage in competitive games daily. As with many dedicated players of this era, his real job became an inconvenience in his shuffleboard pursuit. He decided to quit his job and follow the yellow brick road to where ever it would lead. With that decision, his walk on the wild side began -- as a roving shuffleboard player.

Sketchy details of this odyssey can be noted in the journals that Bill kept revealing the fact that he traveled to many states to compete. When he located a shuffleboard that was in well kept condition, he would make a prediction. There had to be sharp players that were responsible for the remarkable maintenance of the board. Sure enough, his predictions were right on target... those sharp players would soon surface... usually late at night. Most of the time he could beat those home board champs and would say... "winning the money was the easy part... the hard part was getting out the door"!

There were the lean times when he would hitchhike to the nearest relative, seeking shelter and rest. Brother Jack would welcome him into his home (for instance), but Jack's wife (Marcella) did not extend that same brotherly welcome. In fact, the sight of Bill reportedly put Marcella into a state of apoplexy... it infuriated her when Jack would spend most of his nights shuffling in the clubs with Bill. She couldn't imagine a bigger waste of time than watching a bunch of misfits playing that inane game of shuffleboard! Naturally, Bill and Jack both ignored her opinions.

While on Bill's stay with brother Jack and his wife Marcella, the brothers participated in a Thanksgiving shuffleboard event. Turkeys were awarded to the winners of various games. Bill won a load of turkeys during this tournament and they kept his winnings in a cooler until the tournament was over. He retrieved his winnings (turkeys) and took them home to Marcella at a time when he knew she would be home. He thrust the hideous plucked turkeys into Marcella's arms. Jack had to catch her from fainting dead away! Bill always maintained a witty sense of humor greatly enjoyed by his audiences!

Several weeks later, Bill had won enough to get back on the road again (and surely Marcella was elated.) This time Bill teamed up with Granville Humphrey for a shuffleboard tour to Michigan. Granville Humphrey was certainly a legend of this era and definitely one of the all time great players in the history of shuffleboard, but unfortunately he could have a rather nasty temper. He was frequently very difficult to deal with, both on the shuffleboard and as a traveling roommate. One day a trivial argument occurred between Bill and Granville at their hotel room. Eventually Humphrey became enraged and told Bill he was going to throw him out of the third floor window of the hotel. Bill grabbed up his suitcase and bounded out the door. While riding down the elevator, he made a major decision ... It was time to guit the road games, terminate this roaming life-style, and get back to work in a real job! (Continued on Next Page)

After making the decision to get back to work (which was highly influenced by the encounter with Granville Humphrey,) he returned to his home town in Fort Worth and reapplied for a job at Midcontinent Oil Field Company where he had worked in the warehouse the year following his high school graduation. He was successful at getting a renewed position in the warehouse.

Oil production had become a booming business by the time he resumed work at Midcontinent in the mid-50's. He remembered alot about those supplies and their application on oil rigs. He was soon promoted to sales and service agent for the company and transferred to Casper, Wyoming. Oil rigs were operating day and night everywhere. Bill was frequently awakened and called out in the middle of the night to deliver emergency supplies to those rigs.

There was only one poorly maintained shuffleboard in Casper located in the Trail Bar with no serious players there, but it was a place to at least practice. During one of Bill's practice sessions, a customer approached him and asked if he had heard about the pro-players that he had seen the day before in Gillette (a town about 45 miles northeast of Casper). Bill had not heard of this prior to this customer's inquiry, but he was out of there in a flash! His spirits were soaring as he headed immediately toward Gillette only to find out upon his arrival at the only bar in the town of Gillette that these pro-players had already departed earlier that morning. The wind left his sails! However, he stayed and played some games with the local fish. Had he known what lay ahead, he would have never opted to spend the night in Gillette.

Bill was awakened the following morning by a violent wind and then a quick glance out the window indicated a fierce snow storm was brewing. There was no time to shave, shower, or breakfast. He had to get back to Casper for work the next day.

Visibility was practically zero when he accessed the highway. He managed to get about half way back to Casper before his car stopped abruptly - as if he had hit a brick wall. His car had gone off the side of the road and he was hopelessly stuck in a huge snow drift. A few minutes later an elderly man opened the passenger door and jumped inside. He had seen the lights of Bill's car and he was also stuck in a snow bank just yards ahead.

Bill retrieved an old army blanket from the trunk and the two of them huddled together. They shared the blanket throughout the storm which seemed to last forever. In addition to almost freezing to death, they had absolutely no food! As the storm continued their windows became completely covered and it was pitch dark inside the car. Neither of them could differentiate between night and day. After what seemed like an eternity, Bill scribbled a farewell message to his parents on a match book ... to assure them that he loved them.

The National Guard finally arrived with plows, patrols, and trucks to evacuate the victims who were stranded in this terrible blizzard. It was amazing to Bill when he learned it was now Thursday! A newspaper reporter accompanied the rescue team to get the story. He selected Bill as the person to interview. This reporter was amused when Bill told him that he was sure they were going to drag him out of the car as stiff as a board and just as dead! The interview resulted in a front page story the next day in the *Casper Star Tribune*. That article confirmed the fact that this was one of the worst spring blizzards in Wyoming's history!

More Stories and History

(the following was written by Bill in his noted journal)

"The notion of becoming a shuffleboard player sprouted the first time I saw the board that had just been installed in 1947 in my favorite bar/lounge located on the corner of Ocean Avenue and Lee Street on the west side of San Francisco. I was employed with a vending company and usually finished the day by 3:00 in the afternoon. I frequently played pin ball and enjoyed that game a lot. But then one day this shuffleboard appeared and I was hooked and became an addict!

The usual crowd began to play the game and within a month I was the only consistent winner. Actually, I wasn't playing much better than the others at this early date. However, I soon discovered that because I was left handed that I could manipulate the weights so that I could force my opponent to play to my best shots. My most frequent partner was a plainclothes cop. He was a very big man who always had a .38 under his arm. In years to come there were times I wish he was still my partner ... more about that later. Before long he and I were winning all our games and we thought we were pretty good. But then one day a stranger came in and beat us handily. That is when it occurred to me that there was a great deal more to this game than I had originally thought. The next time I met up with him, I watched and concentrated

on this stranger's every move. I studied the way he delivered the weights, his stance, and his every movement.

Sometime later this stranger returned to play again and this time I beat him! This is when I decided that I was going to play everyone I could find. I would try to learn enough from different players to put together a really good game. I began to scout around other places that featured a shuffleboard. Every time I found a board I would spend night after night until I could play and beat all the players.

My first real partner was Joe Markovich. Joe took me to my first tournament. It consisted of all the patrons putting up a small fee and having elimination play. Joe and I won the first time we played. We were so elated that we began to participate in these small tournaments. We later referred to this play as 'pot games.' We won more games than we lost, but Joe had to guit playing. Joe's wife, Rosie, would not tolerate him being gone night after night, so regretfully his playing days came to an early ending.

My search for a new partner began. One night I met Clarence Whitely at a shuffleboard place in the Valencia district. Clarence and I bucked heads for many a night. At that time, I was a little better player than he was and I did win a few bucks from him. We finally came to a mutual agreement: it would be wise to team up instead of wasting our time playing heads up.

Clarence was a great lagger and I was better at hitting weights. This combination worked real well in those days of California rules. While I excelled at hitting weights my ability to lag became the weak part of my game.

Clarence and I played all over the West and South areas of San Francisco and became known as the very hard pair to beat. Eventually, we heard that the Mission Inn Tavern on 18th and Mission Avenue was organizing a team to play a winter league match against seven other bars. Clarence and I were immediately accepted on this team as we could beat most of the players already selected.

We on the first winter league (28 weeks of play every Thursday night) so easily that the league was almost abandoned. We played this league for three seasons and won each season. We had five sets of doubles which meant ten players. At the time I quit our team had just about the ten best players assembled in all of Northern California. This team consisted of the following members: Clarence

(Whitley) and me; Bob Miles and Al King; Glen Stewart and Jimmy Mendenhall; Clarence Davis and Bobby Daily; Chuck (last name?) and his partner (name?).

After the team split up, Bob Miles went on to known as the "World Champion" when he beat John Favor in a \$1,000 game of 100 points, winner take all. Bob Miles held this title from 1953 to 1959: defending it 16 times and retiring in 1959 as the undefeated champion. This was the last of what was known as a 'Sanctioned World Championship'."

There were six English brothers that all joined the military in various capacities: Jack English (Lt. Naval Air Corp., Lockheed PV-1 Ventura/PV-2 Harpoon); Dick English (Lt. Naval Air Corp., Grumman F6F Hellcat); King English (Private, US Army); Bill Mack English (Navy Aviation Radioman 3rd Class); and twin brothers: Doug English (Cadet Merchant Marine) and Don English (Navy Seaman 1st Class).

He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II as an aviation/radioman and gunner. All five of his brothers were also in the military as noted above. **Bill English - Life Summary**

Bill Mack English was born September 24, 1924 in Grandview, Texas to Mack and Beula Edwards English. He married Bonnie M. Bowan on June 12, 1964 in Lakewood. He lived in Fort Worth, Texas, most of his life. He lived in Lakewood and Fort Collins before moving to Loveland, Colorado in 1987 and was employed as Rocky Mountain regional manager for Houston Oil Field for many years, in the sale of oil field equipment. He retired in 1986. He was resident manager of Silver Leaf II Apartment Complex in Loveland from 1987 to 1992. He was a champion shuffleboard player, starting his shuffleboard career in 1947. After a rather lengthy illness, he passed away on November 4, 1998 at McKee Medial Center in Loveland. He was posthumously inducted into the Colorado Shuffleboard Hall of Fame on December 12, 1998. At his time of passing he was survived by his wife Bonnie M. English of Loveland; two brothers, Jack English of Tulsa and Dick English of San Lorenzo, California. He was preceded in death by his sister June and brothers King, Don, and Doug.
