Tourney Talk

The new shuffleboard year opened with a bang at A. J.'s Saloon (Pontiac) on Jan. 7-8, where 10 of Michigan's finest put up \$100 each for a chance to win a spot in the Las Vegas tournament.

Lee McDonald of Lansing captured first place and the title of Michigan's ambassador to the first official world championship shuffleboard tournament. Four Detroit shooters — Lou Herfi, John McDermott, John Myles and John Tischler — finished second through fifth respectively.

The tournament was played as a best 2 out of 3 double elimination and provided lots of exciting shuffleboard. The top two players, McDonald and Herfi, played each other three times, with all three matches going the distance.

The next weekend, 20 teams gathered at the Wagon Wheel Tavern (Lake Orion) for a mixed doubles event. The tournament was a double elimination with the winners on each board advancing to the finals and the runners-up on each board playing for third and fourth places.

The south board champs, Cheryl Collins and John McDermott, defeated the north board winners, Dennis Wilson and Elly Canterbury, two games to one. McDermott and Collins won the tournament by posting a 15-3 win in the final game, giving Wilson and Canterbury second-place honors. Phil and Lenny McGrue took third. The father-daughter team of Marv Foster and Shelly Usik took fourth.

"Women are ruining the game of shuffleboard for men," joked one male participant in the Wagon Wheel's mixed doubles tournament on Jan. 14-15 at Lake Orion. "They're getting so good, they're damaging our egos."

Women are, indeed, proving that skill, rather than physical prowess, can make them keen competitors on the boards. The number of women who are finding that shuffleboard is a sport that can move them out of the spectator seats into active participation is steadily increasing.

And, just as it's a sport that breaks the sex barrier, it is also a sport that breaks the age barrier. . . .

Fun - and Good Therapy

Affectionately known as Grandma by the Wagon Wheel crowd, lively 8l-year-old Elsia Lile was playing in her first tournament and having "a thrilling time." She'd been introduced to the game just a year ago by her daughter, Pat Bayes, and Pat's husband, Leroy, Wagon Wheel proprietors. She played a few times "just for fun" and then became a member of Pat's women's team.

Her relatively young partner, John Nelson, says he likes playing with Elsia "because we're good friends and we play well together." And it's friendship, according to Elsia, that's an important part of the game.

"You meet so many nice people. Just look

around," she said, viewing the enthusiastic crowd that packed the Wagon Wheel. "There's no rowdiness — just good fun. I just enjoy being with these people."

Besides that, Elsia explains, shuffleboard is "good therapy" for her arthritis.

A Family Tradition

"He conned me into it." That's how 26-year-old Shelly Usik describes her entry into the world of shuffleboard. The person who did the "conning" was her father and mixed doubles partner, Marv Foster. Before Marv moved to Reed City, he played for the Wagon Wheel and Shelly was his faithful cheerleader. It wasn't long, however, before she was in the game at his urging, first as a sub and then as a regular.

Because of the reputation as a shuffleboard player he established during his 34 years of involvement in the game (starting when he was 18), Shelly was, and in many cases still is, tagged as "Marv's daughter." That identification has made for some special challenges in becoming recognized as a player in her own right, but one fan knows she'll make her own reputation — her Dad.

"She's a great competitor! Did you see that last game? She made all the points!" Marv said with obvious pride.

Shelly gives her dad credit for teaching her the game, but confides, "He doesn't always practice what he preaches!"

The attractive father-daughter team, clad in identical

bright red sweaters selected by Shelly especially for the tournament, stood out in the Wagon Wheel crowd.

"I made up my mind — even if we don't win, we'll look good losing," she said.

"Women draw bigger crowds than men do," he said, "and that means good business for the host bars."

Nelson Wins World Championship Shuffleboard Title in Las Vegas



World champion shuffleboarder Darrel Nelson took \$17,500 back to Oregon.

Ever watch a cobra respond to the irresistible music of a snake charmer? That's the best way to describe Darrell Nelson's rise to the top in his bid for first place in the first official world championship shuffleboard tournament, held at the Showboat in Las Vegas, Jan.

Nelson, who hails from Eugene, Oregon, rose above names like Billy Mays, "Mac, the Greek," Doug Buhl, Ed Graves, Bill Melton. and many other nationally-renowned players to become the undisputed world champion. Could be that the \$17,500 first-place purse held some of the charm that kept him on his winning course.

You didn't have to be a shuffleboard expert to get emotionally involved watching these players bump heads. One throw of the puck could have turned things

around for most any of the outstanding players in this

Second-place honors and \$6,000 went to Ed Graves (better known as "Portland Eddy" from his former home)

of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, who staged a tremendous comeback after almost being eliminated early in the tournament.

Third place and \$1,500 went to Doug Buhl of Bremerton, Washington, with fourth place and \$1,000 earned by K.D. Makarounis ("Mac, the Greek") of Portland, Oregon.

Bouquets are in order for tournament organizers Billy Mays, Doug Buhl and Bill Melton, tournament director Larry Cowan, and helpers Earl Kelly and Willie Wilson, and brickbats to the editors for not getting the names of all the other hard workers who made it happen in Las Vegas.

Billy Mays, who entertained the enthusiastic crowd with trick shot exhibitions when he wasn't competing in the tournament, requests that participants share their ideas for improvement. Send your suggestions to Billy, U.S.S.A., Rte. 1, Box 117-F, Kemp, Texas 75143.





Not Getting Older — Just Better

For one interested spectator at the world championship shuffleboard tournament in Las Vegas, the event brought back some fond memories. A dapper 78 years young, Sol Lipkin, sales manager for the American Shuffleboard Company, recalls a tournament he arranged in the late 1930s when Congressman Fred Hartley (remember the Taft-Hartley Bill from your history class?), an avid shuffleboard player himself, presented the trophy to the winner. So, if you had visions of being a trailblazer in a relatively new sport — forget it!


Sol knows, from personal experience, the complexities and advance planning involved in staging a tournament. In 1949, he organized a statewide tournament in Illinois. A total of 574 six-person teams participated — both men and women —with four subs per team allowed (that's a potential 5,740 people!). He placed 12 boards in a rented, newlybuilt Armory and used the services of an American Bowling Congress official to run the tournament.

What's bowling got to do with shuffleboard? "We knew in order for it to click, we'd have to run it on frames -10 frames, five on each end," Sol explained.

And click it did. The single elimination, best 4 out of 7 tournament, involving 574 teams, started on a Friday and ended by 4 p.m. on Sunday. It took tight organization to make that happen, including hiring young people for \$1.50 an hour to post scores, verified by judges, on large scoreboards at the end of each board. Sol appointed a five-member grievance committee made up of well-known, highly-respected people in Illinois shuffleboard circles, but,

he reports, "We never had a dispute."

Some \$2,500 was to be split among the top eight teams with \$750 for first place — a lot of money in those days — and a

new shuffleboard for the tavern owner who sponsored the winning team.

Sol has a complete record of the big event, including photos and a letter from then Illinois Governor (and later presidential contender) Adlai Stevenson, expressing his regrets that gubernatorial duties prevented him from attending the tournament.

Could such a tournament be staged today in other shuffleboard states, with the winners advancing to a national tourney?

"No doubt about it," Sol believes. "Shuffleboard is on the move all over the country and the trend will continue."

Sol ought to know about trends. His company is the only one in the United States today that manufactures shuffle-boards and filling the increased demand keeps Sol and the other folks at the American Shuffleboard Company in Union City, New Jersey, pretty busy. Could be that helping to meet that challenge is what keeps Sol so young!
