

#### TOURNAMENT PROCEDURES

- 1. All games 15 points.
- 2. Auction for every tournament.
- 3. Officials will decide whether all and/or which boards will be used for each tournament.
- 4. Practice all you want or have time for -- absolutely no warm-up practice throws when play starts.
- 5. All boards will be open for practice at 9 a.m. Friday, July 1.
- 6. All events will have preassigned times and boards. Participants are urged to check the charts frequently.
- 7. Evening cut-off time to be determined by officials.
- 8. Winner of coin flip may choose to start and have choice of color, or take hammer and lose choice of color. The team that scores shoots first each frame thereafter. Hammer changes if no points are scored.
- 9. You may talk to your partner or look at the weight location at the opposite end; however, unnecessary slow play will be policed -- first, a warning, then a point forfeiture each time thereafter. It shall be the officials' responsibility to make a determination -- not the opposition. More than a minute delay will constitute slow play.
- 10. Rewax board after each game.
- 11. Each team shall be ready to play within 5 minutes after rewaxing of boards. Penalty: 1 point per minute. Unusual circumstances will be considered.
- 12. Altering the level of the table or adding a foreign substance to a weight shall cause a forfeit of game.
- 13. All entry fees must be paid at time of tournament sign-up.
- 14. All auction money must be paid after each sale.
- 15. All weights will be thrown (none carried). Even if player appears to have won game, the last weight must be thrown. Penalty: points forfeited and offender loses hammer.
- 16. Open singles will be played according to Shuffleboard Federation rules which are posted.
- 17. Courtesy and good sportsmanship will prevail.

#### THE HISTORY OF SHUFFLEBOARD

From the American Shuffleboard Company

Back in jolly old 15th Century England, they played a game of sliding a "groat" down a table, a groat being a rather large British coin of the day worth about four pence. The game was called shove-groat and/or slidegroat. Later, a silver penny was used and the name of the game became shove-penny and/or shovel-penny.

The game never died. It was played by the young and old, rich and poor. It was a favorite pastime in the great country houses of Staffordshire, Winchester and Wiltshire.

The game shed its crude beginnings when American cabinetmakers like Hepplewhite and Duncan Phyfe turned out some of their finest inlaid cabinet work on shuffleboard game tables for the homes of New York City's wealthy.

By 1897, table shuffleboard rated as much newspaper space as prizefighting and baseball in all the New York City papers.

Shuffleboard made its way across the country. In 1904, gentleman Jim Corbett, an avid player, had a tavern owner named Croll install a table in his Alameda, Calif., pub. "Doc" Croll, his son, claimed it was the first table shuffleboard in that part of the country.

World War II opened the "Swinging Forties" and shuffleboard really came into its own. The intrinsic appeal of the game — skill, diversity, competitiveness, availability to young and old, strong and disabled, the serious game, the fun game, offered the kind of release needed in those turbulent years.

In the Forties, Hollywood climbed on the shuffleboard bandwagon and took it up, at first, as a source of good publicity. Then when the pin-up girls and bandleaders discovered they really liked the game, shuffleboards found their way into the studios and homes of the stars. People like Betty Grable, Harry James, Merv Griffin and Alan Ladd all had their own shuffleboards.

Shuffleboard is not just a barroom game. It is a game that can be played in a bar but it can also be played at the Pentagon, the White House, hospitals, and Army, Navy and Marine bases throughout the world. You will also find the game on college campuses, hotels, motels, recreation centers, Boys Clubs of America and even churches. And, you will find it in many American homes, from modest to affluent.

Table shuffleboard is no flash-in-the-pan game. It is an integral part of American industry in the field of recreation. It is not a game of the past and though its history is a colorful one, it is not a museum piece. It is a game for the future as recreation and leisure become more and more a way of life.
