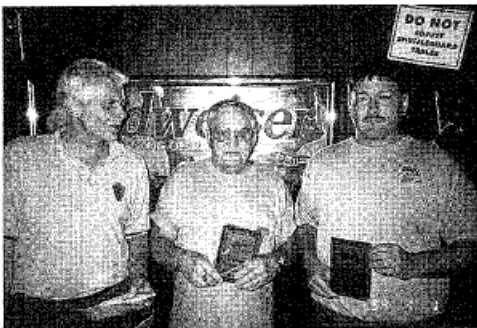
Indiana's 1st Hall of Fame Classic is Success
