STEVE FLOYD



Steve Floyd was born in Roswell, New Mexico on March 26, 1945. His family moved to Bakersfield, CA in 1947 and then to San Luis

He came from a large family with 5 brothers and 3 sisters, so he learned how to compete at an early age. He played fast-pitch softball for several years at short stop and 3rd base. His teams won city and county league trophies. At one time, his team played against the Arizona Kings, a well-known team that included fellow shuffler Gil Aragon.

Steve served in the United States Army for two years. He spent 13 months of that time in Korea. After he got out of the service in 1967, Steve got married and had two children; daughter Denise born April 26, 1970 and son Steve, born March 23, 1977. He worked for the State Highway Department for twelve years until he was injured on the job.

In 1980, the Floyd family moved to Visalia and bought Mr. G's Card Room not long afterwards. Steve worked the card room and his wife Patsy ran the bar. The bar had been previously owned by fellow California Shuffleboard Hall of Famer Bobby Goldsmith, but there was a gap of about three years when someone else had it. The bar came equipped with a shuffleboard, but Steve wasn't a player.

Marion Bailey and Jim McDonald told Steve that if he wasn't going to take an interest in the game of shuffleboard, he might as well use

his board for kindling wood. Marion and Jim taught him the game and he soon found out how addicting the game really is. Steve says: "You have to pay the price to learn the game and when you think you know the game – you pay even more."

It wasn't long before word got out that if you wanted shuffleboard action –Visalia was the place to go. Mr. G's had been a hot spot for shuffleboard for years when Bobby Goldsmith owned the bar. A lot of great players passed through Mr. G's in the 1980's and 1990's for sessions and challenge games when Steve owned it. In a 1991 *Board Talk* article, traveling shuffleboard ambassador Glen Davidson claimed: "Steve Floyd and Larry Newell are the action now in California...Its tough action, but they will play and for a bunch."



Steve feels that his best tournament performance was at Mr. G's 1997 Memorial Day Tournament. He and partner Nick Chaffin went through the Pro Doubles field undefeated including the tough team of Dave Keithahn and Larry Newell who took second place.

Steve played in many of the major tournaments in California, Las Vegas and Reno and often ended up in the money. He also ran large tournaments at Mr. G's

Steve is proud of his part in promoting shuffleboard in Central California and said: "I love the game of shuffleboard and all the people involved with the game."

Oh boy, the stories I can tell you – and the ones I can't tell.

I first met Steve at Mr. G's. I found that we had a lot in common and that's where our friendship started. I was a pool hustler but Steve said: "There's no money in pool anymore; its cards and shuffleboard." He was right. I watched him play horse collar for \$100, then I saw him play another man for \$1,000 a game. Steve then lent the man he beat money to get home on. I asked him: "Why did you do that? You will never see the money again." He said: "Shuffleboard people are not like that." We went to Las Vegas and the old boy was there. He came right up to Steve and paid him.

I took my first road trip with Steve and watched him clean out a guy for \$200 or \$300 a game. Steve gave me and another buddy some action. Steve won about \$3,000 and the guy said he was out of money, so they played on credit. I had some of the action and when Steve won, he paid us right then and there. We told him we could wait until he got his money, but Steve would have nothing of that.

I have seen guys come into Mr. G's and lose their paychecks. Steve would loan them money to get through, he was that kind of guy. He taught me how to play shuffleboard. Steve, Sal and I ran the first shuffleboard tournament at Mr. G's after Bobby Goldsmith's ownership. Steve would take anybody for a partner. Steve was one of the most liked persons around for his competiveness.

One time, he and I lost and I was laughing. Steve came to me and said: "I am looking for a new partner, one who does not like to lose. I do not have fun when I lose at anything."

Steve is a great guy, and is great for the game. Congratulations for the induction to the Hall of Fame. You deserve it.

Steve and I mostly played against each other through the years. We became good friends doing so. We did play in the doubles event together at one tournament in Reno, but other than that, we were mainly competitors.


