EXTRAVAGANZA VII REFLECTS WORLD OF SHUFFLEBOARD ''PROFILE'' IN 1995

Shuffleboard players today come in all shapes and sizes, sex and ages, with skills ranging from amateur to professional. They represent a variety of professions -- doctors, lawyers, merchants, chiefs -- and a few who would list "shuffleboard" as their main occupation. With all their varied backgrounds, interests, personalities, and priorities in life, they come together with a common goal: to win!--and to enjoy themselves as they strive for that goal.

There were a lot of new faces in the crowd at this year's P.C.S.A. Shuffleboard Extravaganza VII, Jan. 31-Feb. 5, at the Aladdin Hotel/Casino, Las Vegas, Nevada, and along with those who had been at the previous six, their common goal (whether they were male or female, near 80 or 20) was a share of the \$84,400 pot.



There was a field of 32 teams (the limit) in the amateur doubles and coming out on top were Al Salazar of Arizona and Dan Hitt of Washington. Louise Freer of Pennsylvania and Doug Fridley Jr. of New York took second place honors. Paul Elliott and Brian Collins of Indiana finished third, with George Ostrum and Morey Balins of Colorado in fourth place.

Other winners were: Gordie Smith and Marv Wilbur, 5th; Russ Miller and Jerry Ledent, 6th; Frank Corey and Frank Corey Jr. (Sante Fe Club, Texas), 7th; and John Cowan and Ray Miller, 8th.

An unprecedented 128 players participated in the A-B

Draw, with more on the waiting list. There were more B's than A's, so some "borderline" players were ranked as A's, but were given the opportunity to drop out if they wished. None did and the marathan was on....

There was no doubt about Bill Melton's A ranking and he and his partner, Dave Brennan, took the biggest share of the pot. Diana Hagen and Earl Cole finished second, with Bobby Voorhis and Jim Russell in third, and Larry Vance and Jim Erdley in fourth.

Other winners were: Mike Melton and K. Lloyd, 5th; Bud Hillburn and Betty Brantley, 6th; Dale Koteras and J. Steffenson, 7th; and Louise Freer and Ron Blaylock, 8th.

There was a full 32 entries in the pro singles and it looked, for awhile at least, that Michigan's John McDermott would be a sure winner. He had come through undefeated to meet Darrol Nelson of Oregon in the finals and took the first

Woodie Says: "People Read What They Know About"

In reference to the Dan Kelly article in the January issue, it's true that we have lost subscribers in Missouri. Back in January 1984, when you went to Las Vegas and more or less introduced *The Board Talk* to the world, I knew I had to have it and I have not missed an issue since.

However, I know most of the big name players in Southern California dating back to the late '40s and '50s and have been to some of the big matches in the U.S. When I pick up *The Board Talk*, I see "news." That's because I know a little about the Meltons, Nelson, and Bobby V., just to name a few. Missouri has never had a Texas Billy, Arizona Bill or a Raggedy Don. Everybody knows Balboa Ron, but Frisco Eddie has never made the scene in Missouri. Paul Casula is Missouri's biggest name (by the way, what happened to him?).

People read what they know something about. Missouri runs a lot of interbar leagues. If we could give the standings and winners, Missouri would pick up on subscribers. I'm sure other states would do the same.

You're absolutely correct, Woodie, and this has been a problem we've wrestled with since 1984. There are two reasons we cannot publish league standings: (1) there are thousands and thousands of leagues in the U.S. and we'd have to publish a newsletter the size of a metropolitan phone book to accommodate them all, which would be economic suicide; (2) it takes up to three weeks for each issue to be delivered, plus preparation time, so by the time subscribers received the league standings, they would be outdated.

McDermott Wins Round Robin Singles at Wetlands

The Wetlands Bar & Grill in Royal Oak, Michigan, hosted the first of its eight "Something for Everyone" 1995 tournaments on Jan. 21-22. The worst snowstorm of the season failed to deter 18 shufflers, including some of the "top dogs" from Michigan, Indiana and Illinois, from participating in the round robin singles.

Even though host Mike Papa and directors John McDermott and Rob Kern soon realized you can't please all the people all the time (as do all tournament directors), it was a fast-paced, hard-fought, smoothly-run tournament in pleasant surroundings.

Michigan championship winner Frank Blade finished second, with John Tischler, also of Michigan, in third. Bob Perry of Illinois, who had a long ride ahead of him on treacherous roads when the tourney ended, took fourth place.
