#### PAUL WEBER

Considered by many as one of the co-founders of the modern shuffleboard mega-tournament, Paul Weber has been a strong supporter of west coast shuffleboard for the past 20 years.

#### EARLY YEARS

Paul was born on December 11, 1939 in Pittsburgh, PA. His father was the City Circulation Manager for the Pittsburgh Post Gazette until he enlisted in the Merchant Marines during WWII. Unfortunately, he was killed when his boat blew up near Anzio. Paul's mother worked as a secretary until she retired. Paul moved her to California in 1972. She passed away in 1989. Paul didn't have any brothers or sisters. According to Paul, his parents said, "This guy's goofy enough. We don't want any more like him."

Paul went to Central Catholic High School in Pittsburgh and graduated in 1958. He worked for the Pittsburgh Post Gazette for three years and then moved to California for the 1<sup>st</sup> time in 1961. This is when Paul first played the game of shuffleboard at a place called The Stein. For the next six years he moved back and forth between Pennsylvania and California, working various jobs such as pipe inspector, car salesman and bar tender.

Paul came back to California permanently in 1967 and worked for Farmer John's in Vernon, California. From 1969-1983 he worked in the freight business until there was a mass layoff. "Haven't turned a lick since," says Paul. "Around this time I got into 'sports speculation' which has paid my way ever since."

#### SHUFFLEBOARD BEGINNINGS

After Paul's brief introduction to shuffleboard in 1961, he didn't have any more to do with the game until he moved to Bellflower, Ca in 1973. He began playing at the Edgewood and met Billy Chiles. He went on the road, backing Billy for six years. Paul says, "This is where I really began to learn how to play the game. When you watch a player like Billy, you learn a lot." Later, he began backing and taking road trips with Jimmy Allis. He started to improve his own game in 1987. He was living in Downey, California and began playing Jimmy Anderson four practice games every day at the Dixie Belle. "Then I'd stay and play about 20 more games. I got to where I was half decent."

#### PCSA

Joe Muniz attended a tournament in Las Vegas that had been run by Billy Mays. He came back and told Paul that he thought they could do a better job. Joe asked Paul if he would be the "money man." They, along with Lou Lucero and Karl Spickelmier ran the first PCSA Las Vegas Tournament in 1989. They had 12 new boards, 6 American and 6 Play Fair. "We had no more idea of what we were doing than the Man in the Moon," Paul remembers. Paul helped to negotiate room rates with the Showboat, and figured out the logistics of the calcuttas, money handling, events and rankings.

"It was a nightmare. We managed to get through it to the doubles semifinals, when the Showboat screwed us out of a day. Three teams were left, Eric Waldeman/Al Pease and Chuck Norris/A.Z. Turnbo in the losers' bracket and Billy Chiles/Bobby Voorhis on the winner's side. We had to start getting the boards moved out. By the time Chuck and A.Z. won the semis, the hotel was already putting up banquet tables around them for another function. There was only time for one more match."

Fortunately, Billy and Bobby won the first match, although it took all three games. The electricity to the boards had been shut off and Carol Bunch kept score on a bar napkin. If it had gone to a second match, the finalists would have been given the option of splitting the money and lagging one weight for bragging rights, or going down the street to Duffy's, challenging the board there, then playing off the finals.

"Louie, being Louie, quit, but the following year went as smooth as silk. We had a good nine-year run with the help of Bob Brunskill, Freddie Thuman, Bubba Warren, Billy Chiles, Kevin Larkin and Jimmy Anderson. Al Stewart was instrumental in setting up the boards."

When asked if the PCSA set the format for the current mega tournaments, Paul modestly defers the credit to Joe Muniz. "Joe organized everything, he just brought me along to negotiate the room rates. Karl is a great bracketeer. He understands when you should be playing, and also why you're not playing."

" I wish we could do it again. A few years ago, I started talking to a couple of hotels in Laughlin for a West Coast tournament, but the logistics for moving in the boards wouldn't work. "

#### THE CRAPS GAME

"What a lot of fun that was. Joe Muniz started it during the second year of the Las Vegas tournament. He was one of the better crapshooters I've ever seen. I would collect \$500 shares. If someone only had \$100, I told him to go in with friends and bring me \$500. Joe would begin at Midnight on Saturday night. The  $2^{nd}$  year, we ended up making \$40,000 and everyone got more than double their money back. Soon, that was the first thing people wanted to do when they saw me was to give me \$500 for the craps game. We won four or five years in a row. The last year that we won, each \$500 share won \$1,170. The last year or two we lost money."

#### THE BEST AND THE WORST GAMES

Paul claims that the worst game he ever played was when he gave up 8 points in one frame to Jimmy Martin. "I'm still mad about that," Paul says.

"I never beat anybody, but the best I ever did was with Joe Nino at the Dixie Belle. It was a huge tournament with the 'Who's Who' of shuffleboard there. "Paul and Joe lost their first match against Larry and Mary Brown from Indiana. After that, they drew Paul's favorite boards 3 and 4 (The Equalizer) from then on. They went on to beat Gordy Smith and Russ Miller, and then Jimmy Allis and Hal Perry in two straight, 15 to 7 and 15 to 8. Paul says, "I got Hal talking to himself on my end." They then beat Bob Lewis and Marilyn Roberts in two straight and then Jim Foran and Dave Arndt in two straight.

"The next morning we were up against Steve Perry and Paul Elliot. I was pumped up and ready to play, but couldn't get enough Scotch into Joe quick enough. We lost two straight, but ended up in the money."

#### TRAVELS

"The trips to Bourbon were lots of fun. Once, we took 18 people out there on an airplane. We rented three or four cars to get everyone around.

"I went to Quilcine (Washington) several times, Bill and Sandy always treated me very well. The Marysville (California) trips were always fun. Once Joe Muniz and I flew to Seattle for a tournament at B.Z.'s. Joe played with John Fischer and Jimmy Allis played with Steve Wilson. We stayed at a hotel that was about 17 miles away and John Fisher came to pick us up in his van. The only thing in the back to sit on was a beer cooler, filled with ice and soda. John saw some girls and gunned the van to show off. I flew off the cooler and it turned over and soaked me. Joe and John went through the losers' bracket and Jimmy and Steve the winner's bracket. The finals came to a 2<sup>nd</sup> match, which meant I had to change the airline tickets. It meant being rerouted through Reno. Joe came in 2<sup>nd</sup> and ended up losing money because of the extra plane fare. "

#### PRESENT AND FUTURE

"I ran the last two Dixie Belle tournaments, including the big Board Talk Reunion. After Wes and Eileen sold the Dixie Belle, things changed. They had always let me use the office and the Whiskey Room for the money and paperwork, but the new owners didn't want me in there. "

When the Las Vegas tournaments ended, Paul sold three of the boards to Oskars' and helped startup a league there.

Paul had a leg removed a few years ago but still enjoys the game. "I just like to play. Since I lost my leg, it upsets me that I've gained so much weight and I have no stamina for playing singles. "



Paul and his wife Hope, have three children between them; Bruce, who lives in Switzerland, Paula, living in Bellflower, CA and Michelle, who lives in Atlantic City. Michelle lost a home in Louisiana during Hurricane Katrina. There are five grandchildren, Isaiah, Nicole, Catherine, Gracie and Libby.

# A FEW WORDS FROM CSHOF PRESIDENT JIM MARTIN

When I first meet Paul I thought he was either a doctor or a lawyer. He had that smooth, debonair look about him. It didn't take me long to find out that my first impression was very wrong. Paul is quite the sportsman. He is very knowledgeable in football and that's what makes him the player he is in the game of shuffleboard. I had never seen, ever before, so many big cats with their claws sharpened, protruding, and ready to pounce. My whole body was shaking like I had drunk way too much tequila the night before.

Sportsman, auctioneer, promoter are just some of Paul's many tributes. Aside from being a good friend and one of the most congenial people I have ever meet, he is also a good father, husband and most positive when things can sometimes seem to be so negative. As we all know, Paul lost a part of himself several years back. This loss did not stop Paul from continuing his great love for shuffleboard. He over came his loss by learning to play from a wheelchair and soon after with the aid of crutches. It makes me personally, very humble, as I look back over the many years and recall how many of us would not have been able to reach down and turn such a negative into a positive. I know it's very hard for Paul to continue to play as much as he would surely like to. He is a person with much pride. And even though he may not play as much as he once had, he has continued to support the sport of shuffleboard. Paul continues to work with several players, helping them to achieve a higher level of play, transferring to each of them all his knowledge and love he has for the game. He has continued to promote several tournaments around the Bellflower, CA area. Paul is a big reason why the Fourth of July tournament in Exeter, CA is such a great success. Paul has not let pride get in his way.

I personally take this opportunity to congratulate you Paul and to welcome you into the California Shuffleboard Hall of Fame. I thank you from the bottom of my heart. It's because of you, that many of us have come to share many great times together and cherish the wonderful memories. I am looking forward to sharing many more with you.
